Stanford Defeats Oregon By 63-44

Big Tom Dose led Stanford to an easy 63-44 basketball victory over an outclassed and error-prone Oregon basketball team here Monday night.

It was the fourth victory of the season for the undefeated Indians, ranked eighth in the nation. Oregon suffered its second loss in four games. They meet again tonight.

Dose scored 29 points, including 13 in a row, before he was taken out of the game with five minutes to play with Stanford leading 57-36.

The combination of the 6-8 junior center, Stanford's pressing defense and their own mistakes was too much for the Ducks.

Stanford grabbed a 26-4 lead in the first 13 minutes and coasted to the victory.

Oregon didn't score a field goal until forward Steve Jones connected after six minutes and 16 seconds of the game. That made the score 13-4 but the Ducks then went another eight minutes before getting another two pointer.

The 6-5 forward from Portland was Oregon's only scoring threat. He finished with 16 points.

Jim Johnson, a reserve center, scored 10 in relief of Glenn Moore, who couldn't get untracked against Dose. Moore hit only one of 10 shots from the field and one of four free throws before leaving the game with three points.

Stanford hit 49 per cent of its shots from the field to 29 per cent for Oregon and had a 47-35 edge in rebounds. Stanford led at halftime 33-20.

Nationally ranked Arizona State went down to its first defeat Monday night. At Wichita, the Shockers down the Sun Devils 92-90, in overtime despite Art Becker's 25 points.

Other touring western teams also had a tough time. Pepperdine, a team that goes a long way for a club without a big man, was nipped by powerhouse Colorado State at Fort Collins, 69-67. Lee Tinsley led the Waves with 19 points.

San Jose State was at seventh ranked Illinois, and wound up on the short end of a 90-64 count. Bill Yonge

of San Jose had 14 points, but the Spartans were in trouble when three regulars fouled out.

St. Mary's had difficulty figuring out the zone defense of lightly regarded St. Norbert and just managed a 78-75 victory.

Steve Gray was held to 19 points, but his teammates picked up the slack as the Gaels hit the bucket at a .539 clip.

San Diego State was fed into the meat grinder at Logan, Utah, as Utah State emerged with a 101-57 decision. Bob Mackey had 11 points for the Aztecs.

Alameda State, only in its second year but one of the West's best small schools, upended highly ranked Tennessee State, 58-54, at Hayward. Larry Lauritzen, a guard any team could use, had 21 points to lead the winners.

One of the coast's most underrated players, Idaho State's Art Crump, ran wild Monday night at Pocatello. Crump hit 30 points and hauled down 25 rebounds to lead the Bengals past Gonzaga, 78-67. The 6-foot-4 Crump is scoring at a 28 point average.

Eastern Oregon rolled up its fourth straight basketball victory by defeating Whitman 74-59 at La Grande Monday night.

Bob Myers and Dick Turley sparked the Mountaineers with 22 and 17 points. The winners, running their season's record to 4-3, were ahead 35-26 at halftime.

At Forest Grove, Ken Alcorn scored 26 points to pace Pacific to a 72-51 victory over Portland State. The win was the third in a row for the Badgers and left them with a 5-2 mark for the year.

Other scores included these: Northern Illinois 82, Whitworth 70, Carroll 78, St. Martins 75, Seattle 76, Xavier 74, Pacific Lutheran 67, Concordia 66.

Other games tonight include UCLA at Butler, San Francisco State at Murray State, Fresno State at Sacramento State in a battle of small college powers, and Southern Oregon in a rematch against Humboldt State.

Dodgers Walk Off With Most Of National League Honors

Cincinnati —UPI— Southpaw Sandy Koufax and right-hander Don Drysdale of the Los Angeles Dodgers performed the niftiest two-man haul of the year today when they walked off with practically all of the National League's pitching honors for 1962.

Koufax, who looked like a cinch to break his own league modern strikeout record until he came up with a finger injury in July, compiled a 2.54 earned run average that was by far the best in the circuit.

And Drysdale not only won the most games, 25, but also started the most, 41, pitched the most innings, 314, faced the most batters, 1,289, and led the league with 232 strikeouts.

Official averages released at NL headquarters here revealed that despite the individual brilliance of Koufax and Drysdale, the Pittsburgh Pirates finished first in team pitching with a 3.38 earned run average. The St. Louis Cardinals were second with 3.55 and the Dodgers third with 3.61.

Struck Out 218

Koufax, out of action for almost two months, still struck out 216 batters while posting a 14-7 record last year he struck out 269 batters to break Christy Mathewson's NL strikeout record of 267. Bob Feller of Cleveland established the all-time strikeout mark with 348 in 1946.

Bob Shaw of Milwaukee was runner-up to Koufax in the ERA department with 2.80 while Bob Purkey of Cincinnati was third with 2.81. Drysdale fourth with 2.84, and Bob Gibson of St. Louis fifth with 2.85.

Purkey, with a 23-5 record, had the best won-lost percentage in the league, .821, and veteran Warren Spahn of Milwaukee pitched the most complete games for the sixth year in a row, 22, although he failed to win 20 games for the first time since 1955. The 41-year-old Spahn won 18 and lost 14 and his earned run mark of 3.04 was eighth best in the league.

Ron Perranoski of the Dodgers appeared in the most games, 70, and Pittsburgh reliever Roy Face finished the most games, 57.

Jay Hook of the New York Mets yielded the most runs, 137, and rookie Jack Hamilton of the Phillies issued the most walks, 107, and made the most wild pitches, 22. Hamilton's teammate, A. J. Mahaffey gave up the most homers, 36.

Share Shutout Lead

Bob Friend of the Pirates and Gibson each hurled five shutouts to tie for the lead in the category.

The only other 20-game winners besides Drysdale and Purkey were Jack Sanford of the Giants, who won 24 games and lost 7, and Joey Jay of the Reds, who had a 21-14 record.

Sanford put together the league's longest winning stretch when he won 16 in a row from June 17 through Sept. 11. He beat every team in the league during that stretch with the exception of Cincinnati.

Koufax pitched the league's only no-hitter on June 30 against the Mets. Alvin Jackson of the Cubs and Cal Koonce of the Reds each hurled a one-hitter.

OTHER STATISTICS

In other statistics, the Dodgers also had a great year—on paper.

Although they lost the pennant to the San Francisco Giants, they swept most of the statistical honors released by National League headquarters.

Tommy Davis won the batting crown, led the league in runs batted in and collected more hits than anyone else.

Another Dodger, Maury Wills, electrified the baseball world by setting a modern major league record of 104 stolen bases during the 1962 season.

It was a banner year for the Dodgers all around except for one thing: somehow they missed getting into the World Series.

Davis Batted .346

Davis, who shuttled between the outfield and third base, won the batting title with a .346 mark and the RBI crown with 153. His total of 230 hits made him high man in that category, too, and marked the first time any National Leaguer led those three departments since Stan Musial of St. Louis did it in 1948.

Willie Mays' 49 home runs was tops in the Circuit and Frank Robinson of Cincinnati led in runs scored with 134, as well as finishing first with 41 doubles.

Robinson was runner-up, batting with a .342 average, followed by the 42-year-old Musial, who hit .330. Bill White of the Cardinals, with .324, and Hank Aaron of the Braves, with .323, rounded out the first five.

Wills, whose base-stealing accomplishments resulted in his being named the National League's Most Valuable Player, just missed batting .300. He wound up .299 but

hit 10 triples to tie for the lead in that department with teammate Willie Davis, Bill Virdon of the Pirates and Johnny Callison of the Phillies.

Four Ironmen

Wills also was one of the four players in the league to appear in all of his team's games. The others were Robinson, Ron Santo of the Cubs, and Dick Groat, whom the Pirates recently dealt to the Cardinals.

Aaron put together the longest hitting streak when he connected safely in 25 straight games from Aug. 1 through Aug. 25.

San Francisco was the team batting leader with a .278 average, followed by St. Louis with .271 and Cincinnati with .270. Easiest team for the pitchers was the New York Mets, who batted only .240 to finish last in that department.
