

Dallas, Houston Place 13 Of 22 on AFL All-Star Team

New York (UPI)—Halfback Abner Haynes of the Dallas Texans and 280-pound defensive tackle Bud McFadin of the Denver Broncos both were chosen on the American Football League All-Star team for the third straight season to play in the All-Star game on Jan. 19.

Haynes, a colorful star since the founding of the league, and Carlton Cooke Gilchrist of the Buffalo Bills, who joined the AFL this year after eight seasons of Canadian football, were the most popular choices on the 1962 team.

Haynes and Gilchrist each attracted 20 votes from the panel of 24 AFL writers who chose the All-Star team for UPI; McFadin was next with 18 votes.

The Texans and the Houston Oilers, who meet next Sunday for the league championship, combined to place 13 of the 22 players on the offensive and defensive teams. Each team in the league had at least one representative.

This year's team was chosen strictly according to the specialized functions which make up a pro football team in action. The panel of three writers from each league city was required to vote for a quarterback, two running backs, two pass-catchers, flankers or split ends and one tight blocking end.

The backfield thus was made up of Len Dawson of the Texans at quarterback; Haynes and Gilchrist at the running back spots; Charlie Hennigan of the Oilers and Christ Burford of the Texans,

Cincinnati Still Tops Ratings; Oregon State Slips to 13th

New York (UPI)—The University of Cincinnati's basketball team, which has bowled over six straight opponents this season and 24 in a row over two years, was again ranked No. 1 today in the United Press International major college ratings.

Cincinnati, which defeated Kentucky and Kansas State last week, received 33 first-place votes from the 35 coaches from seven geographical areas who comprise the UPI board. The Bearcats' other votes were for second place, giving them a total of 348 points out of a possible 350. Last week they had 349.

Duke, also possessing a 6-0 record, held on to the runner-up spot in the third weekly voting, gathered the remaining two first place votes, Loyola of Chicago (4-0) maintained its hold on third place, Ohio State (5-0) stayed in fourth and Mississippi State (5-0) remained fifth.

Bowling Green (4-0) and Arizona State University (5-0) show the biggest improvement. Bowling Green jumped from ninth to sixth while Arizona State vaulted from 13th to ninth.

Arizona State replaced Oregon State in the top ten. The Beavers, who suffered their second loss to California Friday night, plummeted to 13th.

Illinois, eighth a week ago, advanced a notch to the No. 10 spot.

Colorado again headed the second 10, followed by Kentucky, Oregon State, Seattle, Minnesota, Notre Dame, UCLA, Wisconsin, Marquette and Princeton.

Big Game Hunt Applications Due Jan. 15

Portland-Oregon big game hunters interested in taking part in emergency big game hunts which may be held during the 1963 calendar year have until Jan. 15 to file their county applications according to the game commission.

Application should be made on a post card and the name, address and telephone number of the applicant plus the county applied for should be on the card. A hunting license is not necessary to file the application but is required if the hunter is called for an emergency hunt. Applicants are cautioned to file for only one county since duplicate or extra applications will be discarded.

Emergency big game hunts were authorized by the legislature in 1957 to control crop damage, and since the need for such hunts cannot be predicted, county list of applicants must be established at the first of each year. Actual experience during the past few years indicates there is little chance for a hunter to be called. However, to have this chance if it does arise, a hunter's name must be on the list.

After the applications close on Jan. 15, a public drawing will be held to establish the order of eligibility for each county. This list will not be published but will be available for inspection at game commission regional offices and the Portland headquarters. All applications should be sent to the game commission in Portland.

San Francisco (UPI)—Oregon State, with a 2-2 cage record, isn't moving as fast as had been anticipated by the experts, but coach Rene Herreras of California warns that they will come back.

Herreras, just back from splitting a pair with the Beavers at Corvallis, says the team will be off and running when Terry Baker gets back on the job as the leader.

Baker, the All-American quarterback, joined the squad for workouts today and will be playing with the team when it participates in the Kentucky Invitational at Lexington this week end.

"We are grateful for the split in the two-game series," said Herreras. "Their Mel Counts (7-feet) is improved over last year. He is fine on the jump shots from 30 feet out."

"Oregon State will be up among the best when Baker gets back to direct the team. And there aren't too many men in college basketball today who can handle Counts."

The California coach made his remarks to the weekly luncheon of the Northern California Basketball Writers' Association.

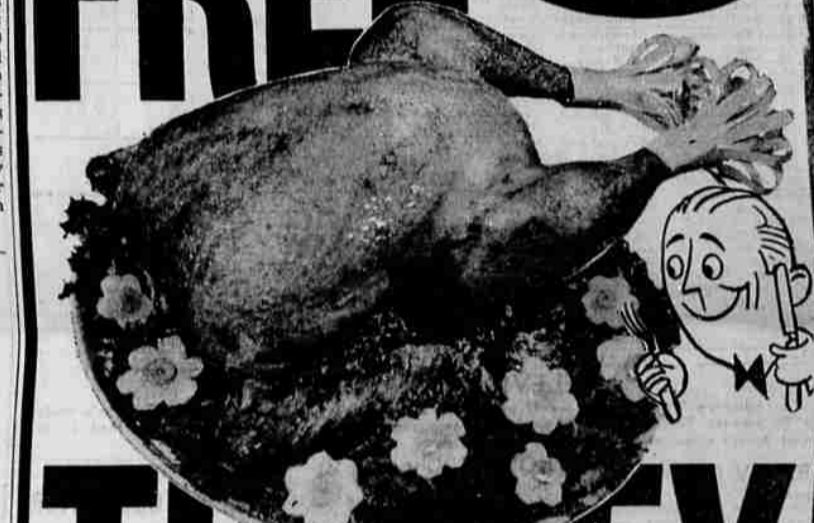
