

Stanford Tips Oregon Ducks 54-51

Eugene—UPI—Oregon's stubborn Ducks battled Stanford to the finish Tuesday night, but still lost their second basketball game in as many nights to the eighth-ranked Indians, 54-51.

Big Tom Dose, Stanford's 6-8 center, led the way again with 21 points and 13 rebounds. It was Dose who scored 29 points Monday night when the Indians humiliated an error-prone Oregon team 63-44.

The Ducks made a game of it Tuesday night against the unbeaten Californians, trailing by 15 points, 50-35, with 7:28 to play, Oregon's quintet of Jerry Anderson, Steve Jones, Jim Johnson, John Mack and Tom Tuttle turned on the heat.

With 1:07 to go, Stanford was clinging to a 52-49 lead. Dose hit a free throw, but Mack rammed home a rebound to cut it to 53-51 with 12 seconds to go. That was Oregon's closest charge, and Darrell Sutherland sank a free throw with three seconds to play for the final point.

Jones was Oregon's leading scorer with 17 points. Johnson, subbing for 6-7 Glenn Moore, who sat out the game with a pulled back muscle, collected 14 points and matched Dose's rebound total with 13.

Stanford turned in a .369 shooting percentage to .318 for Oregon and had a 48 to 45 edge in rebounds.

It was Stanford's fifth win of the season and Oregon's third loss in five games.

Transplanted Turkeys Appear On Increase

Portland—Wild Merriams turkeys transplanted into Oregon about two years ago appear to be on the increase. Reports of wild turkeys being seen were received from all three transplanting areas during the last month, the White River site, Metolius river, and Wallawa county.

Production on the White River range appears to be excellent, with flocks as large as 50 and 60 birds reported. This is the area that received the heaviest initial planting, with the release of 48 birds in February of 1961. Although most of the birds have remained near the release site, a few birds have been reported many miles to the northward and almost to Hood River.

A total of 13 birds were released in the Metolius area. Occasional sightings are reported and recently two adult birds were observed near Wizard Falls.

Only seven wild turkeys were released in the Troy area. Again, sightings have been reported, indicating survival in this area. During the past month several sightings were reported in the Grossman creek drainage north of Wallawa.

The game commission will attempt to trap and transplant some of the White river birds this winter if weather conditions permit.

Medford Grapplers Down Crater High

Medford dominated the light and heavy weight classes and Crater collected its points in the middleweights here last night in a high school wrestling match.

Final varsity score favored Medford's Black Tornado grapplers 39 to 11.

Medford won nine of the

individual bouts. Crater picked up decisions in three and one tussle ended in a draw. The Tornado took five tests by pins and the others by decisions.

One of the middle bouts saw Crater's Dan McKay, 130, overcome a four-point deficit and score six points in the last 20 seconds of his match to defeat Steve Hall, Medford, 10 to 8. He got an escape, a takedown and a near fall. Hall is a transfer from Crater.

Denny Schmall, Medford, was credited with a good job for a first year man in earning a 2 to 2 draw with Crater's David LaFever.

Medford compiled a team margin of 46 to 24 in 18 junior varsity and exhibition matches.

The Bruins hit 36 of 65 shots for a ringing 55 per cent as they thumped Butler, 81-68, at Indianapolis. Slick Walt Hazzard had 17 points to lead UCLA to its fifth win in seven starts.

The Bruins, now ranked 16th nationally, are at Northwestern Thursday and Wisconsin Saturday in rugged tests that should prove if UCLA has a chance to repeat its 1961-62 performance. Last year the Bruins came out of nowhere to win the Western regional NCAA joust.

Yoshinori Takahashi Defeats Gonzales

Tokyo—UPI—Second-ranked Japanese welterweight Yoshinori Takahashi won a unanimous 10-round decision tonight over World Boxing association sixth-ranked junior welterweight, Johnny Gonzales of Oakland, Calif.

A crowd of 5,000 saw the 23-year-old Takahashi out-punch the 32-year-old Californian throughout the bout. There were no knockdowns.

Referee Nicholas Pope, a U.S. Department of Army civilian worker, and two Japanese judges all saw the fight 49-47 in favor of Takahashi. UPI had it 49-45.
