



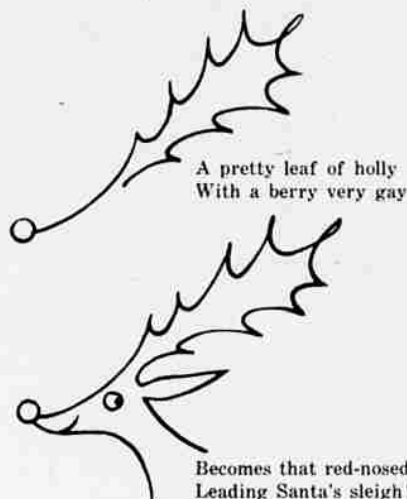

Alphabet Puzzle

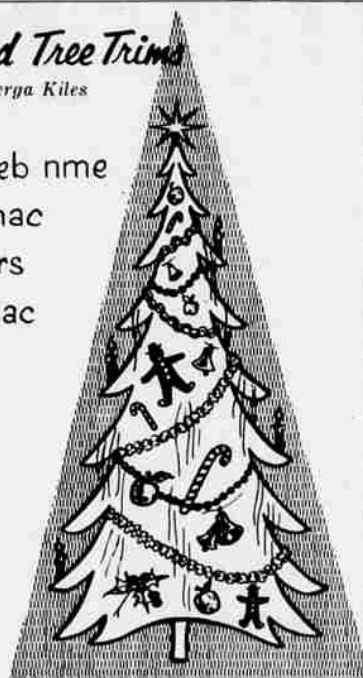


Mr. Jolly Old Elf is hiding something besides the surprises in his sack. Can you find the letters that spell his full name?
