Political Groups Seeking Executives

Portland — (UPI) — The two major political parties in Oregon will begin the new year in a search for top state executives.

Jerry Clausen announced he will resign Dec. 31 as executive secretary of the Oregon Republican party. He said he was resigning to go into public relations work.

Miss Joan Baker, executive secretary of the Oregon Democratic party, will leave Dec. 31 to start a four-year law course at Georgetown university, Washington, D.C.

Republican State Chairman Phillip Roth said a successor to Clausen will be discussed when the GOP central committee meets Jan. 12 at Salem. Democratic State Chairman E. D. Spencer said it was undecided when Miss Baker would be replaced.

Jeannace Freeman Decision Soon

Salem — (UPI) — There will be no "eleventh hour decisions" regarding child slayer Jeannace June Freeman who is slated to be executed Jan. 29, Gov. Mark Hatfield said today.

"I will make my decisions known in plenty of time," he said.

The governor expects soon to receive an official plea for commutation of Miss Freeman's death sentence to life imprisonment.

Hatfield said he was still studying the lengthy transcript of Miss Freeman's trial. He said "I have read every letter on the case," and said he had received some letters from foreign countries.

Miss Freeman, 21, would be the first woman executed in Oregon's history. She was convicted of throwing a six-year-old boy to his death in the Crooked River gorge last year.

Area Telephones Increase by 1,761 During Past Year

Medford extended area phones increased by 1,761 in 1962, raising the total number now serving the area to 30,411, according to Pacific Northwest Bell's local manager, J. H. Creager.

The number of phones served by the company in Oregon is 631,570, an increase of 27,500 during the year. Long distance calling went up about 7.9 per cent. 1962 construction figures hit \$31 million.

Construction plans in 1963 call for \$27.1 million to be spent on phone service improvement and expansion in the state.

"This construction program underlines our belief in Oregon's economy, its present business outlook and its long term growth prospects," according to T. E. Bolger, vice president and general manager.

Looking ahead, Bolger said major undertakings for the company in Oregon during 1963 would include completion of the multi-purpose office building in the Portland South Auditorium urban renewal area, a new dial system in St. Helens and a new central office unit in the Eugene-Springfield exchange. Work also will start on a manual-to-dial conversion for Independence.

Direct distance dialing is programmed for Bend, Prineville and Madras customers. Public telephone service in airplanes will be inaugurated in Oregon with the construction of an air-ground station in Salem. With this new service, calls can be made between airplanes and telephones anywhere in the country.

California Remains First In Agriculture

San Francisco — (UPI) — California continues to maintain its number one position in agriculture with almost nine per cent of the nation's cash farm receipts, according to the state Economic Development agency.

In 1961, the state's farm cash receipts exceeded \$3 billion for the third consecutive year.
