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Illinois Valley May Get TV Translator On Elder Mountain

Illinois Valley — Word has been received from KBES-TV, channel 5, that to better serve the Holland Loop and Cave Junction areas and subject to the approval of the Federal Communications Commission, the station will install and operate a UHF translator here at its own expense.

The translator will be placed on Elder Mountain. This location is in accordance with findings set forth in a letter to IV-TV Inc. of Illinois Valley. The station will maintain the present UHF translator on Eight Dollar mountain.

It is understood that KBES-TV has filed its application for approval by the FCC and should have authority to start installation soon. During July engineers from channel 5 tested various sites throughout the Illinois Valley to establish the best signal.

Elder Mountain at that time was found to have the best signal strength to provide good translator service to channels 5 and 10. KBES-TV officials feel the UHF unit will bring TV to those now without and improve reception where it is now poor. Don Roschberg of IV-TV Inc. said, "It is heartening to have channel 5 officials showing the interest they are here and the efforts by KBES-TV to bring better reception to the valley are appreciated very much." He said IV-TV Inc. will have a general meeting after the holidays to discuss future action.

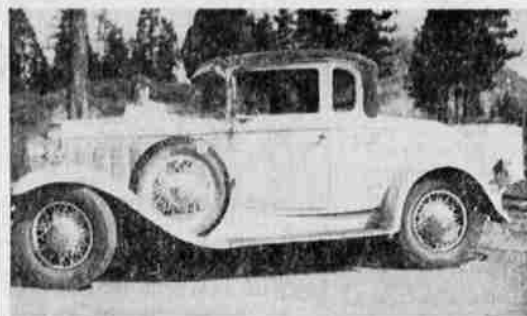

Old Car Still Almost Like New After 31 Continuous Years Of Use

Mount Shasta — Virginia Lyon-Wood, of Scenic dr., Mount Shasta, has an automobile that is unusual on many counts. It was bought in 1931, has been in continual use since, has had but two owners, and two sets of brake linings, the original, and one replacement.

It is now running on its third set of tires, and while it may have been driven by some service station attendant or garage mechanic a few feet, it has never been driven on the highways by anyone but the two owners. These were the original purchaser, Merrill Lyon-Wood, and the present owner, Miss Lyon-Wood.

This old car runs like a well broken-in modern car. Its compression is good, gasoline mileage just under 20 MPG, which for any 8-cylinder car is good. Total miles run: just a few less than 65,000.

Miss Lyon-Wood attributes the car's wonderful condition to its excellent care. She personally does all minor adjustments, such as valve grinding, and spark plug replacement. Too, it has never been involved in an accident. During its 31 years of activity — it will be 32 years next March 20 — the California Automobile Association has carried all insurance. Never has a claim for damages been filed that involved this grand car.

When the car was bought, the Peerless, Packard, and Pierce-Arrow were the big three in the automobile world. With Miss Lyon-Wood, there is but one really good car. That is the one she now enjoys driving, the 4,000-pound Peerless that steps out like a last year's model just broken in.
