

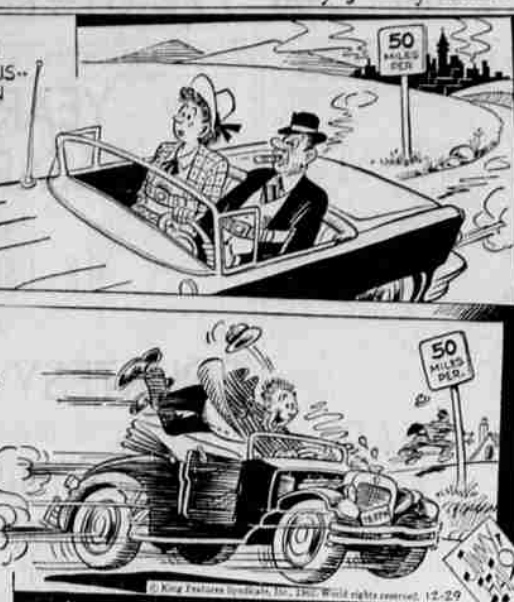

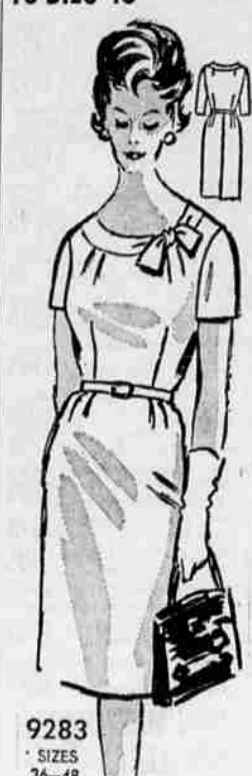

Somerset Maugham Disowns Daughter

Nice, France—UPI—Novelist Somerset Maugham, 88, has disowned his daughter, denied he was her father, and adopted his secretary as his son, it has been disclosed.

An examination of court records here showed the millionaire British author has started an action against the daughter, Elizabeth, 47, wife of Lord John Hope, for the return of all gifts to her, estimated at several hundred thousand dollars.

Five Cent Postage Will Commence on January 7

The new 5 cent letter rate recently enacted into law is the same postage rate Americans paid for letters when the United States issued its first postage stamps 115 years ago, according to Inspector John A. Eidswick. The new rate goes into effect Jan. 7.

Research shows that, in 1847, the post office department issued its first stamps, including a nickel stamp for the basic prepaid letter rate, Eidswick said.

Since 1932, Eidswick said, while living costs for the American family have skyrocketed by 118 per cent, the cost of mailing a first-class letter has only increased by 1 cent, or 33 per cent. At 5 cents, he said, as in 1847—it will still be one of the greatest bargains in American history.

Of the total volume of first-class letter mail handled locally and in the nation, 75 per cent, he said, is generated by business concerns. The remaining 25 per cent, he continued, generally consists of personal letters to friends and relatives, and individual business correspondence.

The one-cent increase on first-class mail, he noted, will only cost the average family about one-half cent per day, or about \$1.80 a year.

He cautioned, however, that patrons after Jan. 7 must affix an additional penny stamp when using 4 cent stamps to send first-class letters.

The new 5 cent stamp, he said, will bear the picture of George Washington and will be printed in blue. In all, he added, more than 70 different George Washington stamps have been issued and the number of such Washington stamps sold totals more than 405 billion.

The new medical investigator system replaces the Jackson county coroner Jan. 1. Dr. A. Erin Merkel, public health officer, has reminded County residents.

D. Merkel will become the county's chief medical investigator. An assistant medical investigator is yet to be appointed, Dr. Merkel said.

Operating under the new system will be deputy investigators consisting of all state policemen and whoever other law enforcement agencies may designate, Dr. Merkel said. The deputy investigators may conduct the investigation into a death, but may not sign the death certificate, according to the new law.

Dr. Merkel said a bill will be considered by the new

state legislature to change this.

"I see no great change in procedure except each death will be personally investigated by a physician or whoever he may designate," Dr. Merkel said.

"Dr. Robert Buck and Dr. Thomas Tinsley, both certified pathologists, will do the post-mortems or make the autopsies," he added.

"The county must pay half the cost of each autopsy, plus the cost of the assistant medical investigator at so much per call plus one-way travel. Otherwise there will not be much change in the costs," the public health officer said.

The new system in this county becomes effective at the expiration of the term of office for Carlos Morris, present county coroner until Jan. 1.

Paula S. — I'm 16 and a high school senior. For the past four months I have been going steady with a boy who is 18. To my great delight he presented me with an ankle bracelet for Christmas. In view of that I decided not to give him the LP record I had bought for him, but instead to knit him a skating sweater.

My mother says no. First of all, she says, it's too expensive a gift because the wool alone will cost \$22. Then she claims it's too personal a gift. But why can't I give him something extra-special? I feel quite serious about him.

Mrs. D. S. — A handmade, custom-fit sweater made by a girl for a boy is too important a gift to be handed out to a high school friend. I told Paula she can knit a boy a sweater when he's the boy she's engaged to. Meanwhile she should keep things light and changeable.

Her friend was wrong to give her such a personal item as a sweater for her leg. In my days kids that age gave each other books and stationery. But for Paula to reciprocate with another intimate gift would be just as wrong. And two wrongs don't make a right.

Actually it's a cheap ankle, not worth more than \$3. Giving back a sweater worth at least \$50 all told is like trying to "buy" the boy.
