

# State Tax Office To Open Mondays

Beginning Monday, Jan. 7, the local office of the Oregon State Tax commission will be open each Monday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. to assist taxpayers in filing their 1962 Oregon tax returns, according to O. D. Binegar Jr., auditor-in-charge.

The Medford office is located at 108 North Grape st. The commission has requested that taxpayers seeking help complete their returns as much as possible before going to the office. They should take copies of their 1961 and 1962 federal tax returns and of their 1961 state tax return with them. Anyone paying additional federal income taxes in 1962 must be able to state date and amount of each payment.

Taxpayers having refunds due should mark "refund" on the envelope to speed handling. Those returns sent by mail should be sent directly to the State Tax commission in Salem, as sending them through the local office only slows up the handling process.

Returns are processed as they come in to the commission, and taxpayers must file a return to be eligible for a refund.

# Gale Force Winds Batter New York

New York — (UPI) — Everything that wasn't nailed down tonight was airborne in the Metropolitan area today as gale force gusts whipped arctic cold New York with relentless fury.

Winds of 30 to 40 miles per hour with gusts of 60 miles per hour struck the city early Sunday and were expected to continue unabated until the early hours of the New Year. Temperatures, which plummeted to zero Sunday night, were not expected to go above 15 degrees until midday Tuesday.

One of the first victims of the storm, part of winter's worst punch at the eastern states, was the big illuminated Christmas tree at the Washington Square arch at the foot of Fifth ave. The wind knocked it flat. In the suburbs the storm uprooted trees from the frozen ground, and a giant construction crane was flattened in a Bronx street.

# Portland Zoo Gets 11 Storks, Cranes

Portland — (UPI) — Eleven storks and cranes flew into Portland Sunday — aboard a Pan American Airways plane. Morvan Berry, animal dealer, bought the birds in India and shipped them to the zoo here.

Zoo Director Jack Marks said the birds would be kept in the warm enclosure of the feline house until they acclimated themselves to the climate. One of the cranes died a few hours after arrival.

Marks said it was not likely the Jabiru stork and the Sarus cranes would become regular inhabitants of the zoo. They require special quarters not available here.

Berry, currently in Singapore, is expected to return in February and will decide at that time what to do with the birds.

# Birth Control Ad In Church Magazine

Washington — (UPI) — A leading Protestant magazine has accepted a full-page advertisement for a new contraceptive product, it was disclosed today.

It is believed to be the first explicit advertisement of a birth control product ever published by a nationally circulated family magazine in the United States.

The ad appears on page 19 of the January issue of the Christian Herald, and interdenominational Protestant monthly edited by Dr. Daniel A. Poling.

It was placed by the Emko Co. of St. Louis, Mo., manufacturers of an aerosol vaginal foam which has been widely tested in Puerto Rico, and which has been reported in medical literature to be effective as a birth control device.
