

Oregon's House Democrats Vote With Majority in Rules Committee Fight

Washington-Special - Oregon's House delegation helped tip the balance in favor of

President Kennedy Wednesday when the roll was called on the fight over the House rules.
Democratic Reps. Edith Green and Al Ullman were

joined by newly elected Robert Duncan in voting to retain a 15-man House Rules committee, which Kennedy had said was essential to assure action on his legislative program.

relected in November, was then sworn in with others who are starting new terms.
Mrs. Neuberger was the only Oregon member of Congress who did not need to be sworn in, inasmuch as her present term runs through 1966. Moreover, the opening day of Congress fell on Sen. Neuberger's 56th birthday.

Rep. Walter Norblad, Oregon's only Republican, voted with the GOP party decision to oppose the move, explaining: "I thought it was packing the committee in favor of (Speaker John) McCormack. Minority rights are better protected under a 12-man committee."

"Congressman Duncan cast the first vote of his new career without hesitation, noting that in the Oregon House where he twice served as speaker all bills reported from legislative committees automatically come up for debate. He said he regarded the House Rules committee as a restriction on the Democratic process because it has sometimes blocked committee-approved bills from being debated."

"Rules should facilitate action, not retard it," Duncan said.
In the Senate, Sen. Maurice Neuberger escorted Sen. Wayne Morse down the center aisle in the traditional ceremony by which newly elected or reelected Senators are presented for swearing in. Morse,

While the House was resolving its rules fight, the Senate deferred consideration of fresh attempts to revise rules by which filibusters can be choked off. Sen. Morse was among those who announced plans to start this fight next week after the President delivers the State-of-the-Union message Monday.

Morse said he would propose that cloture be invoked upon the vote of a simple majority, allowing each Senator an hour to debate the pending issue before forcing a final vote.

Musa Favors Cigarette Tax; Opposes Hatfield's Net Receipts Income Tax

Portland - (UPI) - State Sen. Ben Musa (D-The Dalles), president designate of the Oregon Senate, said Wednesday night he favors a cigarette tax.
Musa addressed a meeting of the Oregon Society of Certified Public Accountants, of which he is a member. He said a cigarette tax, also

avored by Gov. Mark Hatfield, would bring in \$18 million every two years at 4 cents a pack.
However, Musa indicated he did not see eye to eye with the Republican governor on a net receipts income tax which he said could more properly be called a "gross receipts" tax.
Musa said his wife, Ren. Katherine Musa, would intro-

duce a House bill to effect his ideas on tax reform. Tax measures must be introduced in the House.
Musa also said he did not believe the state's education system has been "making the best use of education facilities" and criticized proposals to add more than 200 welfare workers to decrease the welfare case load.

RUSSIA EXECUTIVES SHOT FOR CORRUPTION

Medford Banks Note Record Deposits

The downtown Medford branch of the U.S. National Bank recorded total deposits of \$25,347,549.07, according to year-end figures released by Allan F. Perry, manager. Loans and discounts for the local branch totaled \$11,985,719.46.

The U.S. National's North Medford branch showed deposits totaling \$2,385,383.91 and loans and discounts in the amount of \$2,457,383.84. Dwight L. Houghton, manager, reported.

Total resources for the U.S. National system, with its 85 banking offices throughout the state, were \$1,079,346,587 compared with \$1,002,086,875 on Dec. 30, 1961. The total resources figure is up more than \$77 million over last year's total.

During 1962, U.S. National opened branches in Gladstone, Seaside, Burlingame (Portland) and Stayton, and completed a new building for the branch in north Medford.
