Callaghan Takes Over As Eagle Point Mayor, Assigns Duties

By DOTTIE HARBISON Mail Tribune Correspondent Eagle Point—Shirley (Shy) Callaghan was sworn into office as mayor, Eldon Nave, Le Roy Regester, and Leland Meyer as councilmen and Meyer reelected by unanimous vote as president of the council for 1963 at a meeting of both old and new council officials Tuesday night.

Meyer was elected to his second term of office last November and was elected president of the council during the last few months of his previous term.

Mayor Callaghan commended outgoing Mayor Ernest Gregg for the excellent work he did as mayor of Eagle Point and as a city councilman on the sewage lagoon system now in operation by the city.

City administration, Oran Chastain, assistant chief of police, Robert Moore; maintenance superintendent, David Hannaford; recorder and treasurer, Marian Vannice; judge, William Rice; attorney, Farrell, Blackhurst, and Hornecker, and building and plumbing inspector, David Hannaford.

City charter, finance and budget committee Eldon Nave, Laura McFall and Theodore Hoffman. Fire: Le Roy Regester, Donald Kimmel. Police: Theodore Hoffman, Eldon Nave, Leland Meyer.

Several important decisions were made by members of the city council at their first meeting of 1963 including the authorization of selling two city owned lots next to Brown's Market on Main st. for a medical-dental building.

According to Administrator Chastain the dentist will be open for business around the first of June, 1963 with a drug store and doctor within the next two years.

The council instructed an agreement be made and signed by the city and Hoyle Jordan, permitting Jordan to pasture his cattle on the city owned lagoon property with certain conditions which would protect the city from any damage caused by his animals.

A resignation from councilman Le Roy Regester as a member of the city planning commission since he was now a councilman was accepted and appointments were made to fill his vacant office and that of Mrs. Elbert (Betty) Hefley who resigned earlier.

Appointed and approved were Keith Sherrer and Mrs. Walter (Betty) Howell. The city council voted to sign an agreement for Johnny Johnson of the Northwest Manufacturing company to the effect that the recently converted fire truck enable the city to go outside the city limits in providing fire protection to his business as long as it is not needed in the city at that time.

This agreement was promised all people of the area at the time the truck was purchased and reconverted for that purpose. The city administrator presented a set of standards for the duties of his office to the council for its approval.

These standards are the same as used in other cities with the same type of governmental system and were approved by the council. Since this is a new office, being tried temporarily by the council, no set rules or standards had been set up to allow either the city officials or the administrator to know just exactly where they fitted into the pattern.

The city administrator will take orders only from the mayor and council, with all other city officials taking orders and coordinating their work through him. Charter Study Following a recommendation that a charter committee be appointed to review the city charter and make recommendations for changes to bring it up to date, this committee was incorporated with the finance and budget committee. It was pointed out that all changes in the city charter must be voted on by the people.

A sealed bid from Tidewater Oil company for pumping gas for the city was tabled for one month to allow other interested companies an opportunity to submit their bids.

The Prospect Junipers were set around what will soon be a parking strip. These trees are a low growing evergreen shrub.

Club members also set out some Acuba and Holly seedlings that had been donated to them. The park is beginning to take shape, club members feel, and in time it is expected to be a beautiful place for everyone to enjoy.

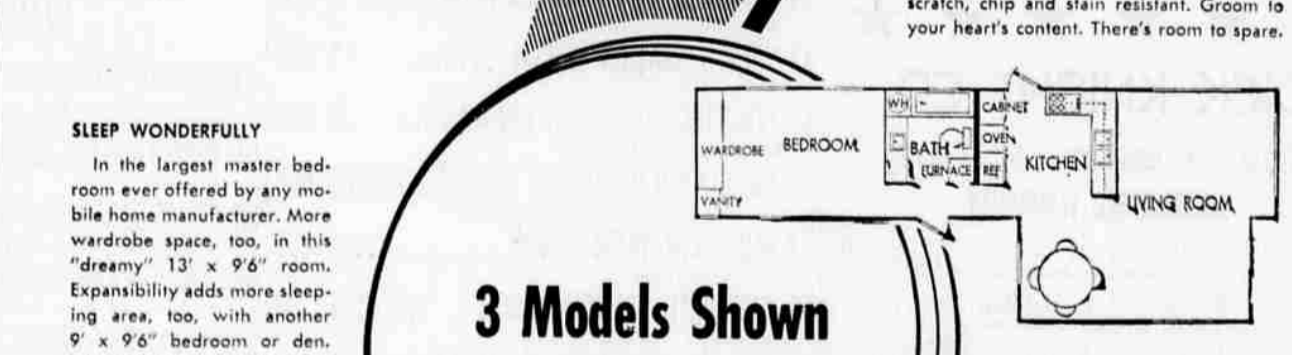
