Crater High Comets Scrap Klamath Pels In Friday Scuffle

Central Point — A pair of teams with equal season records in wins and losses scuffle here Friday night in Southern Oregon conference basketball.

Crater's Comets will entertain the Klamath Union High Pelicans. Tipoff is billed for 8:15 p.m. after a 6:30 p.m. junior varsity preliminary.

The engagement will match the league's second place teams. Each is 2-1 in the circuit. And, for the full campaign each is 8-1. They encountered different pre-conference rivals.

It will be a battle against greater height for the Comets, who rely on speed and firepower against taller teams. Should Klamath mentor Al Keck choose — and it is anticipated — he'll open with a starting lineup which includes no player less than 6 feet tall. This combine may include Fred Kelley, 6-4, Wayne Chamberland and Terry Ash, each 6-3, and Hal Holman, 6-2½.

Fire and Fall Back

Crater's tallest men are Paul Branson and Howard Tomlinson, each 6-1. But, the Central Pointers do have the edge in speed.

The Comet's long range artillery will have to be zeroed in. Basic Klamath Falls strategy is zone defense which keeps the rival offensive threat outside. The Pels then grab the rebounds when the opposition misses.

Crater tutor Lloyd Hoffine said that his crew may have to put to practical application the idea of "fire and fall back."

"Trying to learn how to crack a zone," has been a major objective in drills here this week, Hoffine reported. There has been stress on getting rebound position and on defensive measures against Klamath's "big kids."

"We're going at it hard," said the coach. "We had a hard workout tonight," he stated concerning yesterday's drill.

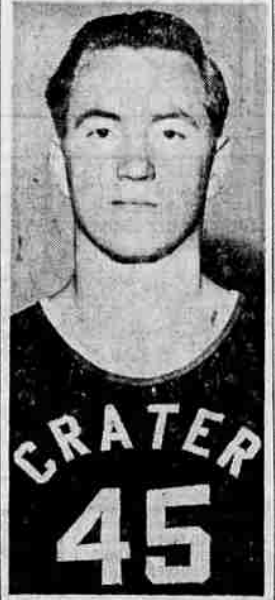
"We need this one pretty bad. It's a pretty big step for us," remarked Hoffine as the Comets looked to a giant-killer effort.

With the exception of Pat

Pepper's bad ankle, Hoffine indicated that his squad is healthy. But, he remarked that Pepper still "will go out and do a job." The mentor stated, nevertheless, that Darryl Summerfield will play a lot, particularly if Pepper can't do much rebounding underneath the hoops.

Hoffine pointed out that KF's Al Keck may go with some of his quicker boys. It was mentioned that the Pels do not have a lot of speed. The Comet coach came back with the reply that Crater "does not have an over-lot of height."

There will be a junior varsity game at 6:30 p.m. Friday. The Friday action is all the Comet cagers have. Klamath goes home to face Ashland on Saturday.

Haru Sasaki, who lost a rugged tangle with Nick Kozak here last fall in a Texas death match, brings his repertoire of judo chops, hip locks and special sleeper hold to pair with the all-around ruggedness of Wild Bill Savage to go against the team of Italians.

Local fans who have requested to see Harold (Buck) Davidson in action again will get their wishes when he goes against tough Irish Pat O'Brien in the 45-minute semi-windup.

A one-fall match will kick off the program.

Oregon Tech Trims SOC Raiders 96-92

Klamath Falls — Sammie Smith scored 30 points and Willie Anderson 27 here last night in an Oregon Tech basketball victory over Southern Oregon college.

Score in the Oregon Collegiate conference game was 96 to 92. The tussle picked up high point making tempo after slow starts at the opening whistles of both halves.

OTI headed by as much as 19 points and held a 44 to 34 halfway lead. The Raiders crept up on the Owls but could not produce that extra surge to catch them.

With Smith pulling 23 rebounds and Anderson 19, Oregon Tech dominated the backboards 56 to 27.

Dave Hughes had 24 points and Jerry Shultz 23 or SOC. Shultz topped Raider rebounding with eight retrieves.

Huskies Invade Stanford Lair

But then Washington swept UCLA at home and earned a split at USC in a quartet of games each settled by four points or less.

The Huskies have been getting a lot of mileage from the tall front-line combination of Dale Enslay and Ed Cornell. The latter leads the Big Six in rebounds.

Stanford is rated number 16 nationally after splitting with 10th ranked Oregon State last week end. Center Tom Dose lately has been getting outside shooting help from Don Clemenson.

Semester finals cut down week end basketball action along the coast but a few other games Friday will find Portland at Nevada, Gonzaga at Seattle, Pepperdine at Hawaii, Oregon at Washington State and a tournament hosted by Cal Poly of Pomona.

Arizona State is at New Mexico tonight in a key Western Athletic conference game.
