

European Reaction Over De Gaulle's Maneuvers Increases

London—(UPI)—French President Charles de Gaulle's maneuvers to organize a French-led European bloc stirred demonstrations in West Germany, brought a protest from Moscow and provoked official huddles throughout Western Europe today.

While European capitals still boiled with reaction, the parliament members of the six-nation European Common Market met for a stormy debate in Strasbourg, France, following the French veto of Britain's bid to enter the market.

In Munich, hundreds of West German students demonstrated to protest the French action and express their sympathy with Britain. Students in the capital of Bonn called a similar demonstration outside the French Embassy with police permission.

The Soviet Communist party newspaper Pravda, which had previously assailed British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, turned on De Gaulle today because of his increased flirtation with Gen. Francisco Franco's Spain.

Pravda charged De Gaulle intended to create a Paris-Bonn-Madrid axis that would only heighten international tension.

The paper's broadside came after Gen. Charles Ailleret, chief of the French defense staff, flew to Madrid for talks with Spanish officials after similar visits by other French emissaries.

Pravda alleged that the French officials sought to establish a political, military and economic alliance with Franco.

In Bonn, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, in a government policy re-

port, said his government hopes Britain will become a member of the European Common Market. His report apparently was written before the collapse of Britain's negotiations to enter the market.

Adenauer said unity was and must remain the highest principle for European institutions.

"The entry of England into the market has special importance," he said.

In London, Macmillan, who Sunday night termed the French blackball of Britain's market entry as "foolish as well as ingratitude," briefed his cabinet today on his unity talks with Italy.

In Paris, the afternoon newspaper Paris-Press, charged the British were unleashing "psychological warfare" against De Gaulle.

Throughout Western Europe, diplomats and statesmen began reweaving allied strategy under the pressure of virtual French rebellion against U. S. leadership.

In Bonn, U. S. Ambassador Walter C. Dooling sounded out Adenauer on how West Germany, as a key member of the Common Market six, intends to maintain Britain's ties with Europe.

Alfred Mueller, Armack, No. 2 man in the West German Economics Ministry, was so angered at the French veto against British membership he resigned his job over the week end. So far Adenauer has expressed friendship for Britain but has not con-

demned France's action. Forty politicians from Italy, West Germany, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg all the Common Market members but France—held an emergency secret meeting in The Hague over the week end.

Dutch government sources reported they decided French President Charles de Gaulle poses "a more deadly threat to Western Europe and the free world than Russian communism."

The Dutch feared De Gaulle's bid to dominate Western Europe would "kill the growth of the Dutch economy" by cutting contact with the United States and Britain.

Liberal Wins in Nicaragua Election

Managua, Nicaragua—(UPI)—Rene Schick, candidate of President Luis Somoza's liberal party, was an apparent easy winner today in national presidential elections marred by police clashes with anti-government demonstrators.

Schick, who ran on an anti-Castro ticket, claimed victory almost immediately after the polls closed Sunday night. Opposition candidate Diego Manuel Chamorro of the traditional Conservative party conceded at 9 p.m., although returns were known from only three of the country's 1,386 precincts.

An Organization of American States mission observed the election.

Three Persons Hurt in Accidents

Hurt were Thomas Lowell Boyd, 25, his wife, Lois Grace Boyd, and the couple's 13-month-old son, Todd Anthony Boyd. The youngster was treated as an out-patient at Sacred Heart hospital. His parents did not require hospitalization.

Driver of the other car involved was Harold Whitney Little, 67, of 4074 South Pacific highway. No citations were issued, officers said.

Delegates From 87 UN Countries Discuss Underdeveloped Lands

Geneva—(UPI)—Delegates from 87 United Nations countries opened a 16-day meeting today on ways of increasing and streamlining aid to underdeveloped nations.

The meeting, billed as the largest of its kind ever held, began in the hall of the UN's European headquarters here. More than 2,000 delegates were on hand for the opening plenary session.

UN Secretary General Thant, scheduled to open the conference, cabled his regrets that illness had forced him to postpone his trip. But in an opening address read for him by Philippe de Seynes, UN undersecretary for economic and social affairs, he called for "a spirit of humility" in the work of the conference.

"We suspect that science and its applications may be the major instrument of change in the contemporary world," Thant said. "We know at least that it is one of the principal agents of modern history. Yet we have not given sufficient thought to the relationship between science and society."

President Kennedy, in a message to the conference read by U. S. delegation head Dr. Walsh McDermott, said the United States had come to Geneva "to learn, to share experiences and to probe jointly with the other delegations the great opportunity which we all share to seize on the technological achievements of the industrialized world and reshape them for the benefit of the newly developing nations."

A message from Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev said "I hope that this conference will mark an important event in the historic process of pooling all efforts of mankind to speed up the economic and social progress of nations which have liberated themselves from imperialist oppression."

FLOODS IN PHILIPPINES LEAVE MANY HOMELESS

Manila—(UPI)—Floods set off by torrential tropical rains have left more than 53,000 persons homeless in seven provinces of the Southern Philippines, reports reaching here today said.

ISRAEL APPOINTS ATTORNEY GENERAL

Jerusalem—(UPI)—District Court Judge Moshe Ben Zeev was appointed Israel's attorney general Sunday to succeed Gideon Hausner.

Hausner prosecuted ex-Nazi Adolf Eichmann who was executed for the wartime murder of Jews. Hausner resigned because of a jurisdictional dispute with Justice Minister Dov Joseph.

DYNAMITE DAMAGES POWER PYLONS IN ITALY

Bolzano, Italy—(UPI)—Two power pylons were damaged by dynamite explosions in the Lake Caldaro area Sunday, according to police.

They also said they found at Castelvichi unexploded charges and pamphlets calling for self-determination for the residents of South Tyrol (Alto Adige). The pamphlets were signed "South Tyrolean Freedom Fighters," police said.

Brown Cuts Request For Corrections, Youth Authority

Sacramento—(UPI)—Gov. Edmund G. Brown today asked the legislature for just over \$100 million during fiscal 1963-64 for the State Department of Corrections and Youth Authority.

Due to a big reduction in capital outlay in the corrections department, the request was some \$10.5 million below last year's.

The governor requested a shade under \$61 million to operate the Department of Corrections—an increase of \$5.1 million from the current fiscal year—and \$25.5 million to operate the Youth Authority, up \$1.3 million.

The anticipated increase in youth authority expenditures of 5.2 per cent contrasted with an expected rise in the number of inmates of only 1.9 per cent. Youth authority institutions will house 4,824 juvenile delinquents next fiscal year.

However, the youth authority was allotted \$10.7 million for capital outlay, up about \$600,000 from last year.

Rails Lead Drop In Stock Market

New York—(UPI)—Weakness in rails fed a slightly lower stock market today.

Chesapeake & Ohio, which has assumed control of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, lost nearly 1½. Baltimore & Ohio, however, added nearly a point. The two roads will initiate a \$250 million rehabilitation program for the B&O.

Elsewhere in the rail section, Louisville & Nashville, Southern Pacific and Southern Railway lost large fractions to a point.
