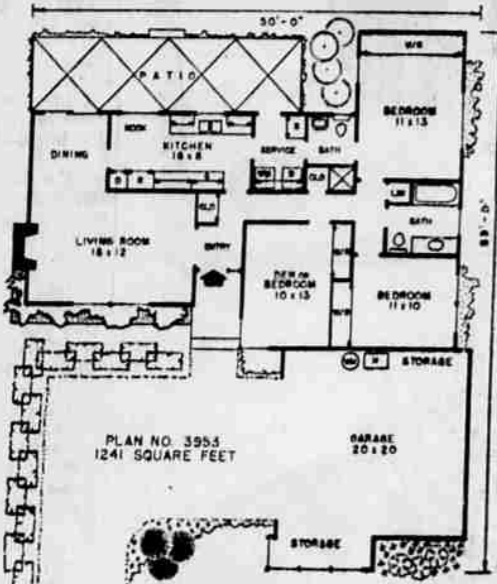


# This Week's Plan for Home Builders

This compact design for a three bedroom home is moderate in size but high in livability. This plan proves that an enormous amount of living space can be had in only 1,241 square feet.

By eliminating a partition between the living and dining rooms, both areas appear larger. Additional living space has been provided by the sliding glass doors which open to the patio from the dining. This patio is convenient to the kitchen and can double as an outdoor dining and family room.

A house of true quality always reflects attention to detail. For instance, the fireplace has been located on an outside wall of the living room so as to occupy a minimum of space in the house. The planter at the front wall

of the living room wraps around the corner of the house and ties in with the fireplace.

**Efficient Center Hall**

A minimum of hall space provides an efficient center hall plan and excellent circulation. Traffic from the rear entrance can reach the center hall without walking through the length of the kitchen.

Indiscriminate placement of windows and doors can easily reduce the useable wall space in a room and cause difficulty with furniture arrangement. Since furniture cannot be located in front of a wardrobe, this is an ideal location for a window or door. A door to the den is located in such a spot as is the window in the rear bedroom. A shoulder-high window that provides cross ventilation and does not interfere with furniture arrangement is on the opposite wall.

The efficient three-quarter bath is accessible from both the service - kitchen - rear yard areas and the master bedroom. This is unusual in a home of this size. The family bath features a pullman lavatory with a large amount of storage below.

The roof lines on this snug home hug the ground and compliment the exterior of the rustic ranch exterior. The group of windows at the corner of the garage especially enhance the overall beauty of the home.

## Mining Industry Urges Stockpiles

Washington - (UPI) - The American Mining Congress urged the government Wednesday to retain its \$8 billion strategic stockpile despite mounting criticisms of wasteful surpluses.

The industry group defended the program of purchasing minerals and strategic materials for the stockpile. It also said wholesale disposals would damage the industry.

It presented its case in a booklet one week after a special Senate stockpile subcommittee concluded a 10-month investigation that brought to light instances of profiteering and alleged political favoritism in stockpile buying during the last decade.

The mining association urged Congress to retain strict control over sales.

# Misunderstanding Of Good Will Meal Deductions Noted

Washington - (UPI) - The Internal Revenue Service is being asked to be a little more explicit in describing when the clinking of cocktail glasses is for business and when it is strictly for fun.

The National Restaurant Association claims confusion on this point plunged restaurant sales downward in January, and the situation may get worse.

The source of the association's apprehension is the new expense account regulations that went into effect this year. The real issue may be the survival of what the restaurant group calls the "good will" business meal.

The association's counsel, Thomas W. Power, said the good will lunch definitely is deductible as a business expense, if the public only understood the "clarifying" information being put out by IRS.

But he added: "Proper understanding is virtually nonexistent."

This was promptly denied by IRS Commissioner Mortimer M. Caplin, who said he felt the revenue service had been pretty clear on the issue. Caplin said the business meal is deductible.

Caplin and Power collided on the issue in an exchange of letters. Ironically, the friction seemed to be caused by the words "good will."

Power used them almost every time he referred to the touchy subject. Caplin avoided the term, referring to the issue as "the quiet business meal."

In an interview Power defined the subject of the dispute as "a meal where food and beverages are furnished for the creation of good will alone."

Caplin said the lunch he was referring to was treated in IRS literature as follows: "Business meals furnished to an individual under circumstances which are generally considered to be conducive to a business discussion may be deducted..."

Power claimed that a spot check by the association in some of the nation's big cities showed that restaurant businesses dropped in these establishments from 10 to 30 per cent in January.

He said Caplin didn't help the situation any when he told a recent lunch meeting here that "good will entertaining is out."

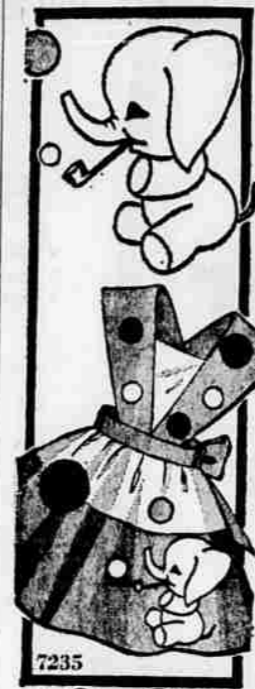
"It is absolutely not," Power added. He said that legislative documents on the law show that the business meal exception includes the expenditure which "merely promotes good will."

"A majority of the business

entertaining in America is of that nature," he said. "It is designed not to discuss business but merely to promote good will. In many instances, it isn't even desirable or appropriate to discuss business."

A check with the IRS revealed that the agency's lawyers are studying this conflict of interpretations. A spokesman said the IRS would issue another clarifying directive in the near future.

## Parts of Oregon Due for Drought

Portland - (UPI) - The worst drought in 29 years may be in store for parts of Oregon, according to a forecaster of the Soil Conservation Service.

W. T. (Jack) Frost, Oregon snow survey supervisor, said actual snow cover was about 25 per cent of normal for the first of February. Of 53 key snow courses, 27 were as low as ever recorded, or lower, he said.

Frost said the Rogue River Basin snow cover was 21 per cent of average, the Willamette Basin 16 per cent and the Lake County Basin only 3 per cent on Feb. 1.

The northeast corner of Oregon has the best snow cover, he said.

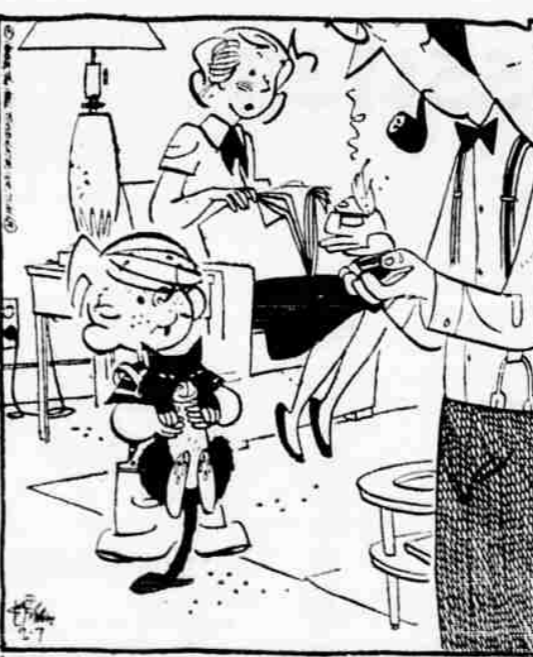
## Accused Slayer Undergoes Tests

McMinnville - (UPI) - Accused slayer Larry Richard Waibel, 17, has been returned to the Yamhill county jail here after undergoing 45 days of psychiatric examination at the Oregon State Hospital at Salem.

Waibel is charged with first degree murder in the fatal shooting of Mrs. Mae Pinnell, 69, Carlton, at her home last Dec. 13. He is scheduled to appear in Circuit Court at McMinnville next Monday.

Results of the psychiatric examination have not been disclosed.

Broiled King Crab Legs with Tabasco Butter Sauce

1 Package (12 ounces) frozen Alaska King Crab Legs  
1/2 Cup butter, melted  
1/2 Teaspoon Tabasco

Defrost and drain crab legs according to package directions. Make a sauce using butter and Tabasco. Arrange split legs on broiler rack, pour a tablespoon of sauce over each leg. Broil, not too close to the flame, until crab meat is hot and shell edges begin to brown (15-20 minutes). Baste the meat 3 or 4 times with Tabasco butter during cooking. Serve in the shells with extra sauce. Yield: 2 servings.
