Complaints Seek Damages Caused In Area Mishaps
Two complaints seeking damages for injuries suffered in automobile accidents have been filed in Jackson county circuit court.

Seeking \$25,000 damages plus \$237.80 medical expenses is Mrs. Edna Blew, 2573 Meridian rd., from Hugh Coleman, 112 Greenway circle; City Manager Robert A. Duff, City Engineer Vernon Thorpe and Norvel Jones, maintenance man for traffic control signals in Medford.

According to her complaint, Mrs. Blew was northbound on Riverside ave. Feb. 28, 1961, when her car collided with a vehicle operated by Coleman on East Main st. at the intersection. At the time of the accident, the complaint states, Jones was working on the traffic control signals at the intersection so Riverside ave. traffic had a flashing yellow light and East Main st. had a flashing green light.

She charges city officials and Coleman with negligence. According to the complaint, she received neck, chest and back injuries in the accident.

In the second complaint, Kathryn M. Wier, 4291 South Pacific highway, seeks \$20,000 general damages, \$1,500.32 medical expenses, \$3,250 for lost wages, and \$103 for vehicle repair from Mary Adams, 1059 Morrow rd.

According to the complaint, the Wier vehicle was stopped on Table Rock rd. at the intersection of Highway 99 April 4, 1962, when it was struck from behind by the Adams car.

Wilson Favorite To Succeed Gaitskell
London - (UPI) - Harold Wilson, only eight votes short of a first-ballot victory, was the heavy favorite today to win Labor party leadership and a chance to become Britain's next prime minister.

The party's quick-witted foreign affairs spokesman pulled 115 votes in the first round of balloting. Active party leader George Brown, representing Labor's right wing, had 88 votes.

James Callaghan, considered a possible compromise candidate, got only 41 votes and was eliminated from the contest for the party leadership left vacant by the death of Hugh Gaitskell Jan. 18.

A second poll of the 249 eligible Labor members of Parliament begins immediately, with results expected next Thursday.

Strikes Continue To Plague Italy
Rome - (UPI) - Nationwide strikes by industrial and transport workers piled new labor woes on Italy today.

Communists and non-Communist union leaders ordered the workers off their jobs for higher pay and better working conditions.

Demonstrations and rallies were planned in Milan, Rome, Brescia and several other cities.

Thousands of workers in the state telegraph company and architectural offices are either on strike or threatening walkouts.

The nation's hospital doctors are ready to start a three-day strike Saturday.

The government, faced with the prospect of an early general election, has been plagued by strikes during the past year.

Airliner Narrowly Misses Navy Jets
San Francisco - (UPI) - A Western Airlines DC6B carrying 33 passengers narrowly missed colliding with a formation of four Navy jet fighters Thursday night over a Northern California mountain.

A spokesman for the Federal Aviation Agency said Western Flight 167, en route from San Francisco to Los Angeles, encountered the Navy planes in a clear sky over Mt. Hamilton, 40 miles south of San Francisco.

The spokesman said the airliner and the fighters were both flying at an altitude of between 5,000 and 7,000 feet when the near-miss occurred. All were flying by visual controls, he said.

The airliner returned to San Francisco and the flight was canceled.

None of the passengers was injured.
