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CORDA Function Explained During Chamber Lunch

Ashland—The functions and purposes of the Cal-Ore Recreational Development Association (CORDA) were explained to members of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce Tuesday by Charles Collins, executive vice president of the organization.

On display at the meeting was a scale model of the proposed Mt. Ashland ski area, depicting the slopes and ski tows as they will appear when developed. The model was made by CORDA to be turned over to the group of Ashland area residents developing the ski area.

CORDA is a non-profit corporation formed by the county officials of four Oregon counties (Jackson, Josephine, Klamath and Douglas) and one in California (Modoc) to stimulate development of recreational facilities in the member counties, Collins explained.

The group, which also has members from major industries in the area, is not designed to undertake development projects itself but rather to coordinate plans for developments.

Collins indicated that the organization is particularly interested in eliminating overlapping in recreational development plans.

In the area of dealing with government agencies, our five counties can act as a united group and thereby gain more attention than a single county would," he also noted.

CORDA is working on drawing up an overall map, Collins said, showing all the recreational facilities in the five counties—maps which can be stocked and distributed by all chambers of commerce in the area, thereby eliminating duplication of effort and expense.

The maps will not be ready for the 1963 tourist season, he added, however.

Abilities Are Sought In 1921 Jones' abilities in the field of fire control were sought by the state of Oregon and he accepted an appointment as district fire warden for Jackson county in a cooperative effort to help the state in controlling the fire situation.

After a year as forest warehouseman, he started 1923 as the first superintendent of construction, a position now called forest engineer. He was in charge of all construction work on the forest. In July of that year, following the resignation of the district ranger on the combined Butte Falls-Dead Indian district, Jones assumed the responsibility of both jobs for the following two years.

The "Flying Squadron," the first group of trained fire-fighters whose mobility gave them their name, was assigned to Jones in 1925. The squadron was made up of expert fire-fighters and they assumed charge of project fires on the Crater Forest during their tenure, forest officials noted.
