Man and Space

Air Force Fondness For Blase-Soar May Give Way To Gemini

By ALVIN B. WEBB JR. Cape Canaveral-AP-A half-dozen young jet pilots stand a good chance of becoming the world's first unemployed astronauts.

These are the men chosen last year for the Air Force's Dyna-Soar space glider program. They are ready to take a ride through space any time. The trouble is, their space flivver isn't finished. It won't be for another two or three years.

And if Air Force enthusiasm for the project - sometimes called simply the X20 - continues to wane at the present rate, it may never be. The Air Force, it seems, has a roving eye for attractive man-in-space programs.

This has been going on for years and the Air Force is still grounded, as far as manned spaceflights are concerned. The Air Force's infatuation with Project Dyna-Soar began when the space age was born in 1957.

Good On Paper It looked good on paper. But there were some problems-no rockets, for one-and the Air Force lost interest. It had been caught up in a fascinating project called Mercury.

The Mercury capsule simplified things. It had no wings and thus saved a lot of weight. True, its landing was a little erratic and thousands of men had to run around under it like so many firemen with a big net, to make sure the capsule and astronaut were recovered safely.

About two years ago, the Air Force reunited with Dyna-Soar. Enthusiasm ran high. The Mercury capsule simplified things. It had no wings and thus saved a lot of weight.

Three Requests Are Considered During Planning Meeting

Three requests before the subdivision committee of the Jackson county planning commission were considered at the commission's meeting last night.

Approved was a request by Ross Adams, subdivider for the Splendor View subdivision, to sell vacant lots to present adjoining property owners in his original subdivision.

The committee approved his subdivision addition 1, subject to the condition that homes only be constructed on alternate lots until provision is made for community water and sewers.

In the original subdivision, the committee approved the recommendation that the alternate unbuildable lots may be sold to adjoining property owners provided the restrictions are filed to prevent homes being built until community facilities are provided.

Rejected was a request by Cal-Ore Ranches Inc. for proposed roads in an area nearly two miles from the proposed Agate dam site. The roads, all dead end, were on steep land and were objected to by the county engineering department.

The subdivider, according to the subdivision committee, said that he would resubmit the plan.

Another proposed road, also a dead end which would be 1,300 feet long, was approved on the condition that provisions be made to tie this road in to Sky View dr.

In other action, the commission approved naming Holcomb Springs rd., a road northwest from the intersection of Ramsey Creek rd. and Sams Valley rd.

The road, it was explained, has been called Fitzgerald, Hall, Edgington and Holcomb Springs rd. The road terminates at Holcomb Springs.

The commission made the recommendation to the county court so a public hearing could be held on the proposal. The commission also requested that the spelling of the suggested name be checked since maps show the spelling both as Holcolm and Holcomb Springs.
