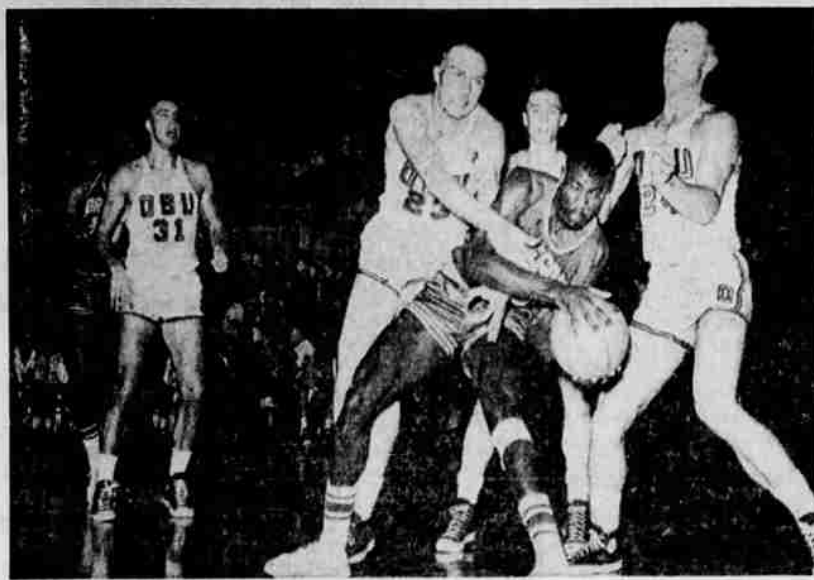

Ducks Spill OSU; Anderson Has 14

Corvallis - (UPI) - Oregon's Ducks used a zone defense and a deliberate offense to post a 54-50 upset basketball victory over the slumping Oregon State Beavers before 9,066 persons Friday night. The teams met at Eugene tonight.

It was the second loss in three starts for the Beavers, who are ranked 10th in the nation by United Press International. They were upset by Portland last week end.

Oregon reeled off eight straight points in the opening minutes of the second half to take a 38-30 lead. The score was tied 28-28 at halftime.

Oregon State came to within two points at 52-50 on a field goal by 7-foot Mel Counts with 32 seconds left but Oregon center Glenn Moore made two free throws with four seconds remaining.

Tied Five Times

The score was tied four times in the first half and once in the second half.

Reserve forward Jerry Anderson scored 14 points and starting forwards Steve Jones

and Jim Johnson tallied 12 and 10 for Oregon.

Counts, who collected four fouls and only three points in the first half, finished with 16 points to lead Oregon State's offense. The junior center also picked off 17 rebounds.

Oregon hit 17 of 51 field goal attempts for a .333 average and Oregon State made 14 of 49 shots from the field for a .285 average. The Beavers held a 47-41 edge in rebounding.

The loss was the sixth in 19 games for the home team. The Ducks now have an 8-11 mark.

NCAA Sets First Round Playoffs

New York - (UPI) - First-round sites and dates for the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) basketball championship playoffs in two regions were announced by Bernie A. Shively, University of Kentucky athletic director and chairman of the NCAA basketball tournament committee.

The University of Pennsylvania will be the host to the traditional tripleheader pairing the six eastern championship contenders with games scheduled for Monday, March 11, at Philadelphia's Palestra, the same site as last year's opening round action.

The two Midwest first-round games will be played at Northwestern University: Evanston, Ill. Last year these games were played at Lexington, Ky.

In the Philadelphia tripleheader the Southern conference champion will meet the Yankee conference winner, the Mid-Atlantic champion will play an at-large team probably the Ivy league winner, and in the third game, two at-large teams will meet for the right to play the Atlantic Coast conference king in the Eastern regional at College Park, Md., March 15-16.

In the other game at College Park, the winner of the Southern conference vs. Yankee conference pairing will play the winner of the Mid-Atlantic vs. at-large winner.

At Evanston, the Mid-American and Ohio Valley conference champions will each be paired with an at-large team. Then in the Midwest regional at East Lansing, Mich., also on March 15-16, the Mid-American vs. at-large winner will play the Big 10 champion and the Ohio Valley vs. at-large winner will play the Southeastern Conference champion.

Two at-large games at sites yet to be determined complete the action for the Midwest regional at Lawrence, Kan., while another pair of first-round games will lead to the Far West regional at Provo, Utah. Both of these regionals also are scheduled for March 15-16.

The four regional champs will meet at Louisville, Ky., March 23-24, for the 25th annual NCAA championship.

Grants Pass Takes Over Second Place in Circuit

Klamath Falls - Grants Pass high's Cavemen, showing their finest poise of this season, ended Klamath Falls basketball "domination" here Friday night and took over second place in the Southern Oregon conference standings.

The Cavemen trimmed the Pelicans 58 to 54. It was the first GP triumph over Klamath on the the hoop court since 1959.

Grants Pass outrebounded and outshot the Pelicans and broke away from a 50-all tie to take the tussle.

The Climate city club was 6-4 in the circuit after Friday's game behind the 7-3 of conference leader Crater. Klamath dropped to third place with a 6-5 mark.

Jim Pippin put in the bucket which put GP ahead for keeps. Al Hutchins made it 54 to 50. Fred Kelley netted two free tosses for Klamath. Then Lyman Kiesecker of the Cavemen and Kelley traded baskets. Hutchins added two free heaves with one second left to play.

Grants Pass had 22 to 19, 36 to 32 and 46 to 43 quarter spreads. Hutchins scored 18 points and Pippin 15 for the victors. Kelley had 15 and

Hal Holman 14 for the Pels.

Klamath held the lead in the game five times, the last at 30 to 29, but was never more than two up on the Cavemen.

The Tornados scored wins in nine bouts actually wrestling, got forfeits in two others and drew in one.

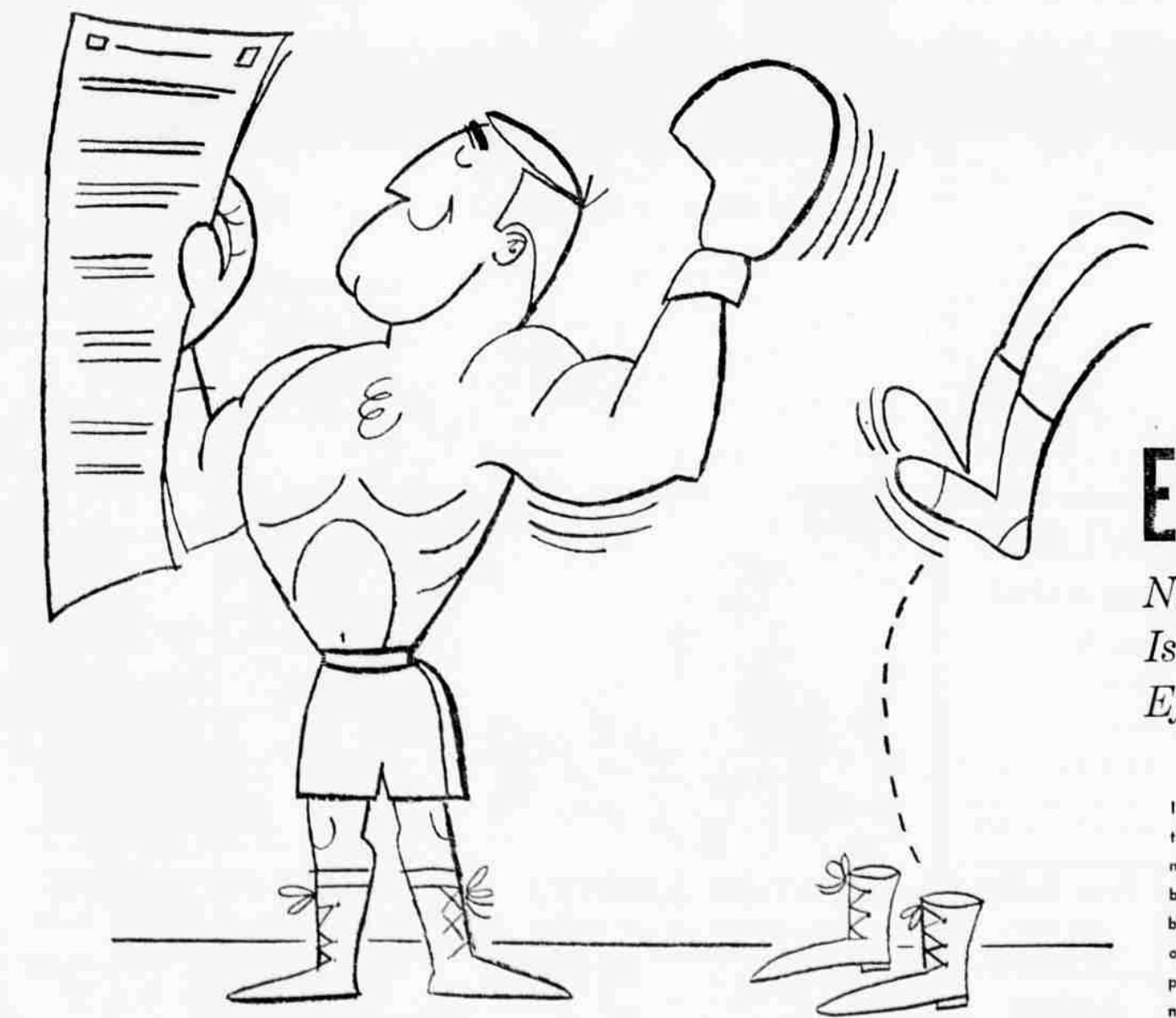
