Republicans Present Legislative Day Report

Reports of the recent trip to Salem for Republican women's Legislative day were given at the February meeting of the Jackson County unit, Oregon Federation of Women's Republican clubs, held yesterday noon at Ping's Garden. Several guests from Grants Pass and Rogue River were introduced. Speakers were Mrs. John B. Lynch, who was chairman of the project, Mrs. Fayette Bristol, Grants Pass, Mrs. Lawrence Buonocore and Mrs. Thomas J. Tinsley. The report was coordinated by Mrs. Everett Faber, Central Point, program chairman of the club, and she added comments. Mrs. Lynch spoke of the bus trip to Salem, and praised the Medford police department for sending an officer to aid with the early-morning and late-at-night parking of cars. About 50 women from several southern Oregon towns and cities filled two buses for the trip. Explains Procedures Mrs. Bristol described visits to the Senate and House of Representatives, explained the organization of the parties and noted that "the legislative is run on strictly party lines." She explained the introduction, reading and passage of bills and said the visitors had witnessed a rare occurrence—a suspension of rules to allow all readings of a bill at one time. She brought laughter from the audience when she added that this rare bill concerned an increase in pay for the legislators. It was mentioned that Mrs. Lynch's daughter, Day, had served as a Senate page for the day. Mrs. Buonocore spoke of the luncheon at which Jackson county legislators and state officials had been introduced. She mentioned the notable congeniality of the groups throughout the day, and added that Oregonians needed to learn the state song. Mrs. Tinsley reviewed the tea given by the governor's wife, Mrs. Mark O. Hatfield, in their home, describing Mrs. Hatfield as "attractive and gracious." She spoke of the decor, flowers and furnishings of the home. Mrs. Faber summed up the report by saying that the trip had been a great success and she presented Mrs. Lynch a bouquet of carnations as a gesture of appreciation from the club. Mrs. Nye Speaks Mrs. Stephen G. Nye explained the organization and operation of Girls' State, since the club annually contributes funds toward sending a Medford High school girl to Salem for this project. She said that Boys' State is a project of the American Legion, and Girls' State is conducted by the Legion auxiliary and told how the young people are assigned to fictitious governing bodies, nominate candidates, conduct campaigns and learn how the state's government operates. 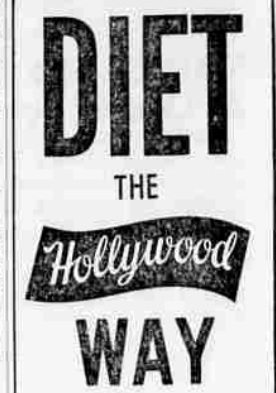
