

Cincinnati Wins After Poor Start

Too bad Cincinnati can't play all its NCAA games on its home court.

It's also too bad, strictly from the Bearcats' point of view, that they're not playing as well as they did earlier in the season.

Cincinnati won again Tuesday night, overcoming a mediocre Xavier team, 72-61, to register its 88th consecutive home court victory extending over six seasons. But winning isn't solace enough for the Bearcats as they attempt to muster their forces for an unprecedented third straight NCAA basketball championship next month.

It's true that top-ranked Cincinnati already has clinched the Missouri Valley conference title and is exercising nothing more than getting in the final games of the regular schedule. However, a let-down now may prove costly as every team in the NCAA will be gunning for Bear.

For the second game in a row, the Bearcats had to overcome a shaky start before claiming victory, their 22nd of the campaign against a single loss. Crosstown rival Xavier, now 10-15, enjoyed a 10-point lead in the first half before Cincinnati could rally for a 27-28 advantage at intermission.

LaSalle, which accepted a bid to New York's National Invitation Tournament Tuesday afternoon, had a tougher fight than expected but finally withstood Georgetown, 75-72, in the most exciting game.

NIT-bound Wichita, edged NCAA-bound Texas Western, 60-58, on a goaltending charge in the final two seconds of play.

WCAC Race Dead Heat

Thomas, who had made six straight free throws, stepped to the line and missed both his efforts.

Funny Thing—Boston, LA Drop Tilts in NBA

A funny thing happened to Boston and Los Angeles on their way to the National Basketball association division title Tuesday night—they both lost.

Boston was toppled by lowly San Francisco 128-112, while Los Angeles fell to another team going nowhere, New York. Score was 125-116. In Tuesday night's only other NBA action, it was St. Louis 114 Cincinnati 107.

San Francisco's win over Boston was its first in nine tries this year and took the Warriors to within a game and a half of third-place Detroit in their battle to get into the playoffs.

Wilt Chamberlain paced the Warriors with 34 points and Guy Rodgers hit 20 and turned in his usual spectacular floor game. Bill Russell had 20 for the Celtics, who appeared tired after a rough road trip.

The San Francisco crowd of 6,491 gave Celt super star Bob Cousy a long ovation. He is retiring after this season and Tuesday night's game was his final appearance in San Francisco.

Stuart Displays Hitting Power

The hope that springs eternal in the spring leads the Boston Red Sox to believe that in Dick Stuart they've acquired their most powerful right-handed hitter since the days of Rudy York and Vern Stephens.

They don't pay off on practice home runs, of course, but the tremendous power Stuart is displaying in the Red Sox's Scottsdale, Ariz., training camp has Manager Johnny Pesky thinking that his rookie year as a manager could be a howling success.

"I haven't seen such a display of power since the days of Ted Williams," said Pesky Tuesday, invoking the name of the greatest Red Sox slugger of 'em all. "It's just fantastic."

Stuart had just hit 10 batting practice "homers" in 10 minutes bringing to 25 the number of balls he has hit out of the Scottsdale park in three days. Obtained from the Pittsburgh Pirates during the winter, Stuart is being counted on to hit between 35 and 50 homers for the Red Sox this season. No Red Sox player has hit 50 homers in a season since Jimmy Fox did it in 1938.

Eugene — The Oregon Ducks are on the threshold of a .500 season after shooting the Portland Pilots into submission 83-75 Tuesday night.

The Webfoots now have won 11 games and lost 12 with three remaining. Unhappy for the Ducks, though, the three are against Oregon State and Seattle university, two of the best teams on the West Coast.

Oregon made 35 of 62 shots from the field for a .565 shooting average against the Pilots. Portland shot a good 455 on 30 of 60 attempts.

Pilot center Steve Amstett led all scorers with 32 points, while teammate Cincy Powell scored 21. Jim Johnson led Oregon with 25 and Glenn Moore chipped in 17 as five Ducks scored in double figures.

Oregon made its last 10 shots in a row before intermission and grabbed a 44-39 halftime lead.

Custer had his troubles with Crazy Horse and Sunny Jim is having his difficulties with one, too.

The only difference is that Custer's Crazy Horse was an Indian but it all comes out close to being fatal in the throbbs department when Sunny Jim sends his goofy galloper, Royal Ascot, to the post.

Like Saturday, when Fitzsimmons will saddle Royal Ascot in the \$100,000-added Flamingo, first of the major three-year-old classics leading up to the Kentucky Derby. For nobody will really be surprised if this strapping son of Princequillo stops to nibble daisies along the backstretch.

Has Bolted Twice

Twice to date he has plumb bolted. At other times he zigs when he should zag or drifts out when he should go straight. He seems usually to be playing a whimsical game with his jockey.

"I had him down on Florida pangora hay," said Sunny Jim. "It tastes good to him. So he winds up eating his mares. When his tub of rations is put in the stall he knocks it over every time. He's a crazy one, all right."

But he wins, too. His four victories in 19 starts, and nine in the money efforts, includes first place in the Hibiscus Stakes in mid-January. Jockey Johnny Sellers still doesn't know how he does it.

"We were pinched back to last leaving the gate," Sellers recalled. "He tried to go out on me all the way. We made more turns than a guy on a bad detour. We were 40 feet wide turning for home but somehow we made it under the wire two and one-quarter lengths on top."

Giants Sign Sanford

Casa Grande, Ariz. — With Pitcher Jack Sanford under contract, the San Francisco Giants turned their attention today to their three remaining holdouts — Orlando Cepeda, Matty Alou and Juan Marichal.

The 32-year-old Sanford, who piled up a brilliant 24-7 record for last year's pennant winners was signed Tuesday for a reputed \$37,000.

Exact figures are never quite forthcoming regarding salary hassles, but it was believed the Giants offered the big right-hander \$35,000 while he wanted \$40,000. Then they split the difference.

It was a good raise for Sanford, who received \$24,000 last season.

Alou and Marichal were reported on their way to camp, but Cepeda and vice president Chub Feeney talked the situation over a few days ago by phone and got nowhere. The San Francisco club is reportedly asking Cepeda to take a pay cut after his bad late season skid in 1962. But Cepeda still hit .306 and feels he deserves a better break.

Wildlife Expert Says Commission Merits Confidence

Salem — The Oregon game commission, and its request for more money, were commended Monday by one of the few men in the Northwest with a doctor's degree in wildlife.

Dr. William H. Lawrence, now a wildlife and forest management expert for Weyerhaeuser Co., addressed the House fish and game committee, which is considering a bill to raise hunting and fishing license fees.

The game commission has asked for the additional money to finance a 10-year expanded program.

Lawrence said the commission merits the confidence of Oregon sportsmen.

He concentrated on three areas where he said expanded work is particularly needed: Intensified management, research, and "people management" to lead to better understanding with sportsmen and what they want.

AFL Picks 32 Players

Dallas — (UPI) — Thirty-two more players were added to the American Football league draft list this week in the loop's third annual "redshirt draft," the league office announced today.

The draft is limited to fifth-year collegiate players who still have a year of eligibility
