

Brown Submits Examples of Why Death Penalty Is Futile

Sacramento — (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown used the case of two convicted murderers today as a "shocking example" of why the death penalty doesn't prevent crime.

The governor wrote Chairman Gordon Winton of the Assembly Criminal Procedure committee pointing out that a federal judge had ordered an indefinite stay of execution for Manuel Joe Chavez and Clyde Bates.

Winton's committee set April 9 for a full-dress hearing on Brown's bill to grant a four-year limited moratorium against the death penalty. Chances are that the measure, introduced by Assemblyman Lester McMillan (D-Los Angeles) and sent to the assembly floor, where its future also appears bright.

Winton, who said he favors abolition of the death penalty except when the murder involved is during commission of another felony or when a prisoner is in custody, predicted the bill would clear his committee on a 6-4 vote.

"I'm basing this on the past voting records of the members," he said.

But in the Senate, the measure will run into strong opposition.

In an attempt to argue his

case for abolition, Brown's letter to Winton called his attention to the Chavez-Bates case. The two were convicted of setting a fire that caused the death of six persons on April 4, 1957 — nearly six years ago.

Brown said the case "illustrates my deep interest in this matter" and that it was a "timely and striking example of the failure of our present laws on capital punishment to carry out the end which society seeks."

The governor pointed out

that the latest stay of execution for the two slayers came 24 hours before their scheduled execution yesterday.

And, he said, two previous execution dates had been set for the pair — Aug. 14, 1959 and Feb. 27, 1963 — only to be stayed by courts.

"All judges, lawyers, law enforcement officials and penologists agree that in order to be effective, criminal sanctions must be swift and they must be sure," Brown said. "Justice delayed is justice thwarted."

Jeep Association Opposes Forest Bill

Salem — (UPI) — The Pacific Northwest Jeep association said Wednesday it would be "discriminatory" to pass a law aimed at toughening enforcement of federal forest regulations.

The bill is aimed specifically at scooters and four wheel drive vehicles that have been roaming federal forests and fields in growing numbers in violation of federal closures. The bill would let such state courts. At present, they are subject to endless delay in federal courts.

Africans Prefer Speakeasies To Legal Bars

Johannesburg, South Africa — (UPI) — Despite the lifting of African prohibition last August, many Africans here still prefer to drink their liquor in the speakeasy atmosphere of the illegal shebeen.

The shebeens have flourished in the cities of South Africa for decades. Their customers range from gangsters and prostitutes to African city workers and even the occasional white man who enjoys the free wheeling, no-holds-barred aura of illicit drinking.

Live Jazz Some shebeens have reputations for providing the best live jazz in Africa today.

The survival of the shebeens had been predicted even before the new liquor act came into force, theoretically putting them out of business. Psychologists, both amateur and professional, said the lure of "forbidden fruit" and sheer force of habit would keep the shebeens busy.

Now a sociological survey by the University of the Witwatersrand has confirmed this. The study was made by four sociology students, all non-whites. They worked independently and came to identical conclusions.

According to the researchers, the shebeen, selling its liquor illegally, without a bar license, at prices up to double the official price fulfills the function of an African social club.

Still Crowded With few exceptions, the scores of shebeens in the Johannesburg area are still crowded.

The Johannesburg City council has provided "drinking areas" for the city's 700,000 Africans, but they are drab, antiseptic places compared to the riotous atmosphere of the shebeens. The "drinking areas" are all in the African townships ringing Johannesburg. They do not cater to the mass of Africans working and living in the city.

The findings of the research project were summed up by sociologist Lawrence Schlemmer in the newsletter of the University's Institute for the Study of Man in Africa.

He said the shebeens flourish because of the inadequate facilities for Africans in European areas.

"In the absence of adequate meeting places, many of these people have to use the shebeen not only as a drinking haunt but as a place where friends are entertained," he said.

Justice Potter Quips During Prayer Case

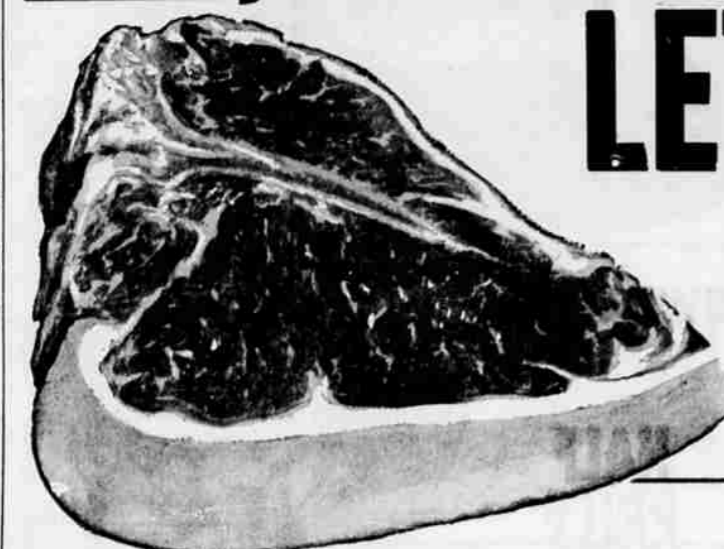
