

Oregon Staters In Front Going Into Coast College Mat Finals

Ashland — Oregon State University, the defending titlist, led the way into the Saturday finals of the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Wrestling association tournament at Southern Oregon college gymnasium here.

The Beavers of Corvallis, who were shooting for their fifth straight title and their ninth in the PCIWA, had a total of 67 points through yesterday's matches in the two-day competition.

Portland State college followed with 53. Central Washington State ran third with 31 and Long Beach State was right behind with 30. University of Oregon held fifth with 28.

Other scoring in the coast's top collegiate meet included California Polytechnic (San Luis Obispo) 23, University of Washington 22, UCLA 21, San Jose State 14, Washington State 12, Fresno State 10, Southern Oregon 5, Stanford 4, Los Angeles State 2, Oregon college.

Four Each in Finals

Portland State and Oregon State each had four men in last night's championship finals. Central Washington State placed three in the titular matches, Universities of Oregon and Washington each two and Long Beach State, Fresno State, UCLA, California Polytechnic and Southern Oregon one each.

Oregon State's finalists were Gary Greenfield 115, Gary Head, 123, Len Kaufman, 191, and Mason Fries, heavyweight. Portland State's fighting for individual crowns were Ron Calhoun, 130; Len Pettyjohn, 137; Les Brown, 157, and Terry Fenton, 191.

Those from Central Washington were Gerald George, 147; LeRoy Johnson, 167, and Ken Sawyer, 177. University of Oregon finalists were Doug Muck, 147, and Bob Keeney, 167, and those of Washington were Ron Johnson, 157, and Rick Bell, 177.

The others were Dale Deffenner, Long Beach, 115, Roy Stuckey, Fresno, 120, Sam Arnold, UCLA, 130, Sam Huerta, Cal Poly, 137, and Randy Cooper, WSU, heavyweight.

Bell, defending champion in his class, decided on Nelson, Fresno, 11 to 0, in his semi, after a Friday quarterfinal win by 10 to 2 over Tom Allen, Stanford. He had a first round bye.

Huerta bumped Charles Warren, U of O, out of the running 5 to 1. Warren, ex-Crater high, had decided on Bryce Cook, Washington State, 9 to 2 in the semifinals. Two other Ducks, Dave White and Rick Burns, also ex-Crater, lost in the championship quarters. Fran Allbritte, Washington State, decided White, 3 to 2 at 130 pounds, and Len Kaufman, Oregon State, pinned Burns at 191.

Warren, White and Burns all had first round byes. Terry O'Sullivan, U of O

heavyweight, up from Medford high, lost to Randy Cooper, WSU, in an opening bout.

Portland State had a 15 to 12 lead on Oregon State after Friday night semifinals.

Long Beach State ran third with 9. California Polytechnic of San Luis Obispo had eight. Other Friday totals were UCLA 6, San Jose State, University of Washington and

University of Oregon each 5, Washington State 4, Stanford, Los Angeles State and Fresno State each 2 and Oregon college and Southern Oregon each 1.

Klamath Pels Hold Off Ashland Grizzlies 55-51

Klamath Falls-Klamath Union high's Pelicans built up a wide lead then outlasted a strong Grizzly comeback Friday night to down Ashland 55 to 51 in a Southern Oregon conference basketball game here.

Victory gave the fourth place Pels a break even 7-7 mark in the circuit. Ashland was 2-12.

The Pelicans ran up a 19-point stanza at 43 to 24 in the third stanza before the Ashlanders caught fire. Then, the Grizzlies settled down for a steadier performance. They shot and rebounded better. With six minutes left in the game, sparked by Rick Pierce and Dale Tepper, Ashland was within four points at 47 to 43.

At that point Klamath Falls began a stalling game and picked up all its remaining markers at the free throw stripe. All 10 fourth canto points of the Whitebirds were on gifter shots.

Klamath had 14 to 8, 33 to 22 and 43 to 33 quarter differences. Wayne Chamberlain scored 16 points for Klamath Falls. Grover Dahn, 13 and Don Piper, 11, for the Bruins Pierce had 12, Jim Lamb 11 and Tepper 10.

Free tosses made the difference in the total scoring. The Pels made 23 of 34 and Ashland 17 of 26. Ashland gained a 17 to 16 lead in field goals. Klamath put in 12 of 25 field shots in the first half but only four of 17 in the second. KF hit 381 from the field and Ashland 321.

Rebounding favored Klamath 26 to 22.

Klamath won the javyee contest 45 to 40 and the sophomore game 52 to 27. Dennis Rose put in 15 points for KF in the javyee tilt and Ron Boyce nine for Ashland. Bill Hardy had 15 for the Grizzlies and John Jendzrejski and Bud Coon eight each for the Pels.

Monmouth—UPF—Lewis and Clark's Pioneers—playing nearly all the way without hobbled Jim Boutin—defeated Oregon College of Education 56-50 in the first game of the District 2 NAIA basketball playoffs Friday night.

Boutin, star 6-5 center who sprained his ankle last week end, played only two minutes. Bill Henselman and Bill Maurer each scored 10 for Lewis and Clark. Toby Wolf topped the Wolves' scoring with 14. The Pioneers were ahead 32-26 at halftime.

Statistics through Feb. 18 prepared by League President Harry Chipman, showed Jim Allen leading with 148 points. Allen started with Glendale and is now the Grants Pass Merchants.

Larry Stevens, Grants Pass, had 138 points, and Don Reese, of the same team, 135. Dick Copple had 131 for Wheeler's and John Payne 120 for Drews'.

Stevens led in average with 19.7 per game while GP's Davis had 19.5 and Reese 19.3.
