

PSC Second In Tourney At Ashland

Ashland — Oregon State university, with two individual victors, became champions here Saturday for the fifth year running in the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Wrestling tournament.

The Beavers ran up 83 points to take the mantle by a decisive 24 points over their nearest challenger.

For the second year in a row Portland State, which garnered one individual toga, was second. The Vikings had 59 points.

Third in the 18 team field was Central Washington State college with 36. University of Oregon scored 34. Long Beach State 33 and California Polytechnic (San Luis Obispo) 30.

Len Kaufman, 191 pounds, and Lee Rosenberg, 157, were champs in their weights for OSU. PSC's winner was Len Pettyjohn, 137.

Outstanding wrestler trophy went to Dick Bell, 177, University of Washington. He won the title in his weight for the second successive year.

Other champions were Dale Deffner, Long Beach State, 115; Roy Stuckey, Fresno State, 123; John Arnold, UCLA, 130; Gerald George, Central Washington, 147; Robert Kenney, University of Oregon, 167, and Randy Cooper, heavyweight.

Portland State had a 15 to 12 edge after Friday matches in the two-day tourney in the Southern Oregon college gym but the defending champions from Corvallis were well on their way to triumph after Saturday afternoon consolation bouts.

OSU had seven men still in action after Friday tussles, five of them went into finals. PSC also advanced seven Friday and had four in final matches.

Alex Munson, 191, who took a fourth place for Long Beach, received the coaches' award for most pins.

Charles Warren, ex-Crater high matman wrestling for U of O, was fourth at 137 pounds. Rick Burns, 191, U of O, and also ex-Crater, took a fifth place. Another U of O competitor, heavyweight Terry O'Sullivan, ex - Medford high, was eliminated in Saturday consolation.

Eagles Tip Cougars In Rogue Playoff

Douglas high won the Umpqua Valley league's second spot in the District 6 A-2 tournament Saturday night by defeating Sutherlin 62 to 42 while Riddle was winning from Glide 51 to 43. Myrtle Creek previously had earned a berth.

Central Point — A third quarter scoring splurge spearheaded by rugged Bill Hoeft turned the tide here Saturday night and the Eagle Point high Eagles subdued Illinois Valley 62 to 52 in their Rogue league playoff game.

The two clubs had tied for second place in the Rogue standings and Saturday's outcome earned the Eagles a berth in the District 6 A-2 championship tournament on Friday and Saturday, March 8 and 9, at Southern Oregon college in Ashland.

Illinois Valley got an eight-point jump in the first quarter here but the Eagles pulled up and the tussle was evenly fought through the second period. Then, in the third canto, EP rolled in nine points before IV's Cougars could score and 15 before the Cave Junction club could get a field bucket.

Hoeft 11 In Third
Eagle Point out-tallied IV 19 to 10 in the key period with Hoeft pumping in 11. The Eagles once led by 12 points in the panel. Illinois Valley cut its deficit down to five in the closing stanza but EP compiled a 13 to 10 scoring edge in that period.

Quarter scores were 15 to 13 and 32 to 30 for Illinois Valley and 49 to 42 for Eagle Point.

Stellar guard Darryl Gellert of the Cougars was the game's high point man with 17. His teammate, John Baumgardner had 12. For the Eagles Hoeft led with 16, Charles Pomeroy had 14, Wilbur Boatwright 12 and Richard Short 11.

Stiffer defense and a drop-off in Illinois Valley shooting helped the Eagles in the second half. Field goals, 24 to 19 for Eagle Point, made the scoring difference as each team hit 14 free tosses. The Eagles shot 400 from the field and IV 302.

Ahead For Good
The Eagles' two-point lag at the start of the second half was wiped out in the opening seconds. Pomeroy rebounded a missed Cougar shot and Boatwright tabulated off the resulting fast break. Hoeft's jumper put EP ahead for good at 34 to 32.

Boatwright sank a long push and Hoeft a rebound and then a free toss for 39 to 32. Gellert and Baumgardner gained IV gifts but jumps by John Linder and Hoeft made it 43 to 34. Baumgardner chucked in the Cougars' first field basket for the period. Short hit twice from the free line and Hoeft a third rebound in the quarter from the field. Score was 49 to 37.

Boatwright's foul heave and field points on a goal-tending charge and Gellert's rebound shot established the 49 to 42 count at intermission.

Widen To 10
Gellert shot a corner pusher and a half-minute into the final quarter for 49 to 44 but Short and Hoeft both put the ball back up for goals on missed EP shots for 53 to 44. IV got no closer than within seven points after that. The Eagles led by 10 at 56 to 46. Eagle Point had a 5 to 2 early lead but the sharpshooting of Gellert and Charles Versteeg enabled the Cougars to go out in front. The adept Gellert hit four successive buckets. He drove off a re-

Stanford Sure of Tie At Least

Bad news for the coin-flippers and students of sports oddities — there's no chance of a five-way tie for the Big Six basketball championship.

Most of the credit for eliminating this intriguing possibility goes to Stanford's Tom Dose. He sank a field goal with three seconds remaining Saturday to give the Indians a 60-58 win over Southern California and clinch at least a tie for Stanford.

The only other squad with a crack at the Indians is UCLA. The Bruins, who belted Washington 80-52 Saturday, must win their final two games this week end against Stanford and California, and then hope that USC knocks off Stanford Saturday.

If all those things happen, Stanford and UCLA would finish the season with identical 7-5 conference slates and play off for the title.

The flippers had been alerted when Big Six officials announced that more than two teams tied for the championship, the league delegate to the NCAA tournament would be decided by a toss or two of some small change.

The West Coast Athletic Conference is also steaming down to the wire all angle and probably won't be decided until Saturday, when the co-leaders, USC and Santa Clara, meet one another.

St. Mary's, which had a two-day honeymoon in first place last week, was deposited in third Saturday when the Gaels crumbled before USC 70-57. NSF and Santa Clara now have 8-2 marks and St. Mary's has 8-3.

The Gaels play their final conference game tonight, against San Jose State. Pepperdine meets Loyola Tuesday while Pacific hosts Santa Clara, and Wednesday San Jose visits NSF with a chance to do a little spoiling.

The final two games Saturday find Santa Clara at NSF and San Jose at Pacific, which is trying to do something about its 0-10 record.

Oregon State's NCAA play-off-bound Beavers and the Oregon Ducks end their regular basketball seasons next week end — against each other.

The Beavers and the Ducks tangle next Friday night at Eugene and meet next Saturday night at Corvallis. The archrivals split two earlier games this season.

Oregon State defeated Washington State 74-65 at Pullman and Oregon dropped a 78-71 decision to Seattle at Eugene Saturday night.

Playmaker Terry Baker scored 21 points and 7-foot Mel Counts tallied 18 as the Beavers rolled up their 17th win in 24 games. They were ahead 37-32 at halftime.

It was Oregon State's fourth win in four starts against the Cougars.

Sharpshooting Eddie Miles propelled Seattle to its victory over Oregon with 32 points. He hit 14 of 26 field goal attempts.

The Chieftains, trailing 38-32 at halftime and behind most of the second half, recorded their 20th win in 25 starts. Ernie Dunston scored 19 points and collected 13 rebounds for the winners.

For Oregon, forwards Steve Jones and Jim Johnson each scored 21 points and grabbed 11 rebounds apiece and Glenn Moore tallied 18.
