

Foreign Briefs

BRITISH CONSUL REPLACED
 London—UPI—The Foreign Office announced yesterday that Derek Dobson, British consul in Elisabethville, The Congo, will be replaced by William Wilson of the Foreign Office staff here.

The Central Congolese government last January ordered Dobson to leave the Katanga provincial capital for his part in lifting the house arrest of Katanga President Moïse Tshombe. Later it gave him permission to stay until a replacement was sent.

SOVIET PREMIER ATTENDS BANQUET
 Moscow—UPI—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev attended a dinner in honor of Laotian King Savang Vatthana last night, according to the Soviet news agency Tass. The king, Premier Prince Souvanna Phouma and other officials of the Laotian coalition government are visiting the 14 countries that signed the Geneva accord on Laos.

RHODESIA TO END SUBSIDY
 Salisbury, Southern Rhodesia—UPI—Rhodesian Federal Premier Sir Roy Welensky said yesterday that his government will stop paying its annual \$14 million subsidy to Nyasaland beginning July 1. Britain has given Nyasaland the right to secede from the federation.

COMMON MARKET TALKS SLATED
 The Hague—UPI—British Lord Privy Council Edward Heath will meet the foreign ministers of The Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg in Brussels tomorrow to discuss the Common Market, according to authoritative sources here.

FIRE RACES THROUGH LINER
 Barranquilla, Colombia—UPI—A \$100,000 fire raced through the 4,200-ton Colombian timber freighter Christian two days ago in the shipyard where it was undergoing an engine refit. It was reported today. An engine-room fire started by a spark from a welding torch spread rapidly through the ship, but none of the 30 workmen aboard was injured.

THREE DIE IN NICARAGUA BLAZE
 Managua, Nicaragua—UPI—Fire in the beach resort of Pochomil, 80 miles southwest of here, killed three persons yesterday and burned out 13 shops, it was reported today.

Search Conducted in East River For Bus Crash Victim

New York — (UPI) — Police searched the fog-shrouded waters off Welfare Island early today for the only unaccounted-for passenger of a bus which plunged into the East River Monday killing six other persons.

Authorities said they would have to wait until dawn before bringing in grappling equipment in their quest for the body of Beatrice Sturdevant, 34, missing in the unusual accident and presumed dead.

The bus, carrying 10 hospital employees to lunch, careened through a guard rail on Welfare Island, plunged down a 25-foot embankment and disappeared below the surface of the river seconds after the driver collapsed at the wheel.

Four of the passengers made it safely to shore through an emergency exit.

Welfare Island is a huge hospital complex about a mile and a half long and two-thirds of a mile wide located in the East River between Manhattan and Long Island.

Survivor Saves Woman
 One of the survivors, Richard Haas, 36, senior physical therapist at Goldwater Hospital located on the island, fought his way through the rear exit of the bus and up to the surface with a woman grasping his coat tails.

The woman, Mrs. Elizabeth Newton, a ward clerk at the hospital credited Haas with saving her life.

"It was a horrible experience because I can't swim," Mrs. Newton said. "He pulled the rear door open and climbed out. I got hold of his coat. When we came to the surface, he pulled me up to the rocks."

Lt. Frank Fitz, a fire department skin diver, who plunged under the murky ice-clogged river to mark the bus so it could be raised, brought up the body of bus driver John Albert.

"I found the front window of the bus and smashed it," Fitz said. "I managed to grope my way inside. You could see only three or four inches ahead."

"I suddenly felt a hand. His body was floating at the top of the ceiling of the bus. I grabbed hold and pulled the body out."

Four Bodies In Bus
 The other dead were identified as Robert Perez, 41, a physiotherapist; Rose Porter, a volunteer worker; Al Reichheld, 56, occupational therapist; Rosa Tate, 48, ward clerk; and Catherine Quann, 57, ward clerk.

When the bus was lifted out of the river by a U.S. Army engineers boat four bodies still were in it, one hanging out of a window.

Under the plan a student may borrow up to \$1,000 per year with the total not to exceed \$3,000. The total borrowing capacity of SOC is \$25,000.

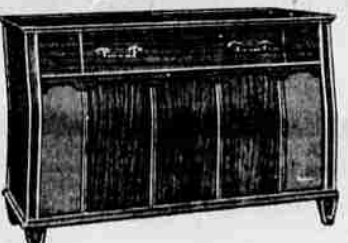
Application for USAF loans may be obtained in the office of the director of student affairs and submitted to area banks for completion of the processing, Dr. Stevenson said.
