**SPEECH RESTORED TO RUSSIAN MAN**  
Moscow—UPI—The official news agency Tass said yesterday that a surgeon restored speech to a man who had been voiceless for 18 years by grafting "porous plastic plates" in his vocal cords. Tass said the operation was performed by Dr. Ivan Utrilip in Kiev, the Ukraine. The patient was not but the agency said his treatment took "over a year."

**NEW COMMANDANT OF WEST POINT ANNOUNCED**  
Frankfurt, Germany—UPI—Brig. Gen. Michael S. Davidson, chief of staff of the 3th U.S. Army Corps, will return to the United States to become commandant of cadets at the U.S. military academy at West Point, N.Y., according to an announcement here. The departing general, son of Col. (ret.) and Mrs. Paul R. Davison of La Jolla, Calif., was honored here in formal ceremonies yesterday. He graduated from West Point in 1939 and was a regimental commander there from 1954 to 1957.

**SOVIETS TRIM BROADCASTS TO CUBA**  
Moscow—UPI—Russia has cut its Spanish language broadcasts to Cuba from 10 to 5 1/2 hours a day, Moscow radio said yesterday.

**CUBAN MAGAZINE'S FREE EDITIONS TO REAPPEAR**  
San Juan, P.R.—UPI—Miguel Quevedo, refugee publisher of the Cuban magazine Bohemia, announced last night that three "free" editions of the weekly which suspended publication in January will reappear this month. Quevedo said Puerto Rican Bohemia, Dominican Bohemia Continental Bohemia all will resume publication March 26.

# Skeptical Attitude Prevails Over GOP Presidential Vows

Washington—UPI—Republican leaders maintained a skeptical view Tuesday toward disavowals of interest in the 1964 GOP presidential nomination. Among men regarded as possible contenders, only Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York is acting like a candidate. And he is holding his troops in check. Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona has said he intends to run for re-election next year. In any case, he has asked his supporters to give him until the end of the year before he makes final decision on bidding for the nomination. Govs. George Romney of Michigan and William W. Scranton of Pennsylvania both told the Republican Con-

vention Site committee Monday that they did not intend to become candidates.

Romney accompanied a Detroit delegation and Scranton a Philadelphia delegation making bids for the 1964 National Convention. It was pointed out to them that political parties, in choosing convention sites, generally avoided the home states of serious contenders for presidential nominations.

In its closed sessions Monday, the site committee heard delegations from Chicago and Dallas, Tex., as well as Detroit and Philadelphia.

San Francisco and Miami Beach, Fla., were invited to submit their resumes at Tuesday's final sessions.

## Services Set for Former OSU Auditor

Santa Cruz, Calif.—UPI—Funeral services will be held here Thursday for John Clifford, 79, former auditor of Oregon State university, who died Tuesday in San Leandro, Calif. Clifford moved to Los Altos upon his retirement from the university and later moved to Capitola. He leaves his widow, Inez, and three brothers in Pennsylvania.

# Local College Group Opposes Hatfield Budget

Salem—UPI—The Oregon Association of Community Colleges supports the Education department's community college budget proposals, not the smaller budget proposed by Gov. Mark Hatfield. Dr. Don Pence, president of Central Oregon college, and chairman of the Community College association, made the statement at a Senate Education committee hearing Tuesday.

The Senate and House education committee met together at a public hearing on the community college program.

Dr. Robert Hatton, assistant superintendent of public instruction, said the nine currently operating community colleges enrolled 19,444 vocational, technical and lower division collegiate students during the 1961-62 school year.

He forecast major increases in enrollments in the years ahead.

Blue Mountain College Board Chairman Ralph McEwan said he felt the community college program "fills a gap in the educational system."

Eugene Voris, president of the Treasure Valley Community college at Ontario, said they hoped for 50 students when the college opened last fall, and they got 200.

He said present enrollment was 327, with students ranging from 17 to 67 in age.

Representatives of private schools said they were not opposed to community colleges, but warned "we are attempting to make all queen bees, and not enough workers" by stressing college attendance for students not adapted to college training.

## New Tax Restrictions May End 80,000 Jobs

Washington—UPI—The National Restaurant association said Tuesday that 80,000 restaurant employees might lose their jobs this year because of new tax restrictions on expense account spenders.

Thomas W. Power, association counsel, said a survey of 387 "expense account" restaurants in 40 major cities showed that customers were spending at least 33 per cent less in business entertaining. He said restaurant sales would drop \$666 million a year "unless something is done."

# 'Lawrence' Wins Five Top Awards

Hollywood—UPI—"Lawrence of Arabia," a major contender in the Academy Award race this year, Tuesday night won five awards including the year's best dramatic movie at the annual Hollywood Foreign Press Association Golden Globe awards.

Rock Hudson and Doris Day received Golden Globes as the most popular movie stars in the world while Bob Hope was given the annual Cecil B. DeMille award in recognition of outstanding work in motion pictures.

"The Music Man" was named the top musical of 1962 and "To Kill a Mockingbird" won three awards, including the top dramatic acting role to Gregory Peck. Geraldine Page was named top dramatic actress for "Sweet Bird of Youth."

Many top performers in the entertainment industry attended the 20th annual awards ceremony which saw the top foreign film awards go to "Divorce - Italian Style," which won Marcello Mastroianni the best acting award for comedy or musical; "Best of Enemies," winner of the Silver Globe, and "Sundays and Cybele," which earned the Samuel Goldwyn award.

The foreign press chose David Lean as best director of "Lawrence of Arabia," and also selected Omar Sharif of that film as best supporting actor. Angela Lansbury was selected as best supporting actress for "Manchurian Candidate."

"That Touch of Mink" was accorded recognition as the best motion picture comedy, while Rosalind Russell was selected as best actress in a musical or comedy for "Gypsy."

# Demoralized State Civil Defense Organization Starts to Break Up

Salem—UPI—A demoralized Oregon State Civil Defense organization is beginning to fall apart.

Director Robert Sandstrom revealed that all seven of the agency's clerical employees have given notice, and that the first one leaves her job next Tuesday.

"We also have two vacancies," Sandstrom said, "but I am not filling any vacancies now."

Sandstrom's comments came in the wake of wide-ranging legislative criticism of his agency and threats to cut the CD budget to the bone. The agency was lashed in legislative debate for alleged failures during the 1959 Roseburg explosion and the Columbus Day windstorm last year.

Sandstrom said there is a demoralized feeling throughout all of the state's Civil Defense organizations.

**Query From Coos**  
Sandstrom said the Coos County CD director called to "find out how to get rid of Civil Defense property."

"I encouraged him to keep his office open and to keep the program going in spite of lack of leadership shown by the Ways and Means subcommittee," Sandstrom said.

The state Civil Defense director, who took over the agency's leadership on Jan. 1, said "never has the legislature shown so much interest in civil defense."

"I'm not being sarcastic. I think it's good that they are interested," he added.

Sandstrom explained "no member of the legislature, with one exception, has been in this state office for years."

The exception, he said, was Sen. Vern Cook (D-Gresham) who visited the office just before opening Senate military affairs hearings on the agency.

"Obviously the legislators are not familiar with our program," he said. "I think they should become familiar with our program, and our problems."

"We've never used a hard-sell program, and we don't cry wolf to panic people into joining Civil Defense activities."

"Maybe that's been our problem. Maybe we should have used some hard-sell."

"But I think the jobs of the 20 people here are to work on plans to save 1,800,000 lives."

"I think we need a Civil Defense program."

## Valley Student Is Author of Article

Ashland—Southern Oregon college student, Loyd C. Morrow, Jr., Rogue River, is the author of an article appearing in "The Teke," a monthly journal published by the international fraternity, Tau Kappa Epsilon.

According to Morrow, a senior, and student manager of the Britt Student center, the history of the SOC chapter began in 1956 with an informal association known as TKa which was composed of a group of Korean War veterans attending the college.

Organizational and fraternal activities occupied the members until May, 1962, when the official charter installation took place under the advisement of Dr. F. D. Haines Jr., of the SOC faculty, and the chapter president, Mort Scripser, a student from Ashland.

Among the events sponsored by the fraternity was the dance at last year's Skiasta at which their candidate for queen of the annual event, Miss Marty Wyatt, emerged the winner. Miss Wwatt, a coed from Jacksonville, later went on to place in the top 10 of the national Miss America contest at Atlantic City.
