Celebrezze Urges New Mental Health Program Be Set Up

Washington—UPI—Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Anthony J. Celebrezze Tuesday urged Congress to embark

on a "bold and imaginative" new mental health program. It is time, he said, for the nation to quit crowding mentally ill persons into antiquated 19th century state mental hospitals. He called for establishment of community centers that would not isolate patients from their friends and relatives.

Celebrezze testified before a Senate subcommittee which opened hearings Tuesday on President Kennedy's mental health program.

In the U.S.A., we call our national law-making body the congress and our state law-making bodies legislatures.)

90th State Grange Meeting Scheduled

Oregon City — The 90th annual session of the Oregon State Grange will be held June 10 to 14 in Oregon City Senior High school, Allen P. Wheeler, state master, has announced. The site and dates of the meeting were chosen by the State Grange executive committee upon recommendation of the Clackamas County Pomona Grange, host organization for this year's session. The 1963 meeting of the State Grange will have particular significance, Wheeler said, because the National Grange will convene in Portland Nov. 11 to 20, inclusive, for its 97th session. Several thousand persons are expected to take the order's seventh, or highest, degree at that time. Oregon Grangers will receive the sixth, or state, degree either at the Oregon City session or at special meetings to be held for the purpose for Grangers who are unable to make the trip from distant portions of the state. Workshop Set To Form Set of Library Standards

Salem — The Oregon State Library and the Oregon Library association will conduct a workshop at the State Library in Salem March 7 and 8 in an effort to establish a set of public library standards for the state of Oregon.

The workshop is an outgrowth of the survey of 118 public libraries in the state made by the University of Oregon's Bureau of Business Research at the request of the state library.

Participating in the workshop will be a number of southern Oregon people. Section Chairman Omar Bacon, librarian of the Public Library of Medford and Jackson County, is chairman of the section on structure and government. Florence Moberly, Josephine county librarian, will be chairman of the work group on physical facilities.

Mrs. Edwin Gebhard of Central Point, member of the advisory board of the Public Library of Medford and Jackson County, is one of the work group members on personnel. Cora Mason, Ashland librarian, is a member of the work group on books and non-book materials, and Mrs. Ed Kienstra, Josephine county library board member, is a member of the structure and government work group, which will be chaired by Bacon. Miss Rose Baine of the school of librarianship, University of British Columbia, will participate in the workshop.

All Stumped on Who Shot Billy the Kid

Washington — UPI — Michael G. Beckett, a new State Department Foreign Service officer, told inquiring senators Tuesday that he had no way of knowing who killed Billy the Kid. "I don't have a television set," Beckett explained. Beckett, 22, of Long Beach, Calif., was being questioned by the Senate Foreign Relations committee as a "sample member of the newest class of Foreign Service officers" up for routine confirmation by the Senate. Sen. George Aiken (R-Vt.) asking questions about American history said "Who Killed Billy the Kid." Beckett replied he didn't know. Sen. John J. Sparkman (D-Ala.) turned to Aiken and asked who, indeed, did kill the Kid. "If I knew I wouldn't be asking him," Aiken retorted. When the hearing ended, the senators still had not unearthed the information that Sheriff Pat Garrett shot Billy the Kid to death at Fort Sumner, N.M., on July 13, 1881.
