Concert Set For Sunday

Ashland - The Southern Oregon Little Symphony orchestra will play its annual winter concert Sunday, March 10 at 2 p.m. in Churchill auditorium. Featured performer for this concert will be Karlin Rhees, flutist. Mrs. Rhees will play the solo part in "Concerto for Flute, Strings and Harpsichord" by Vivaldi, and "Night Soliloquy" by Kent Kennan.

Under the baton of Dr. Herbert Cecil, director, the orchestra will play Beethoven's "Symphony No. 1 in C Major," "Dove-tail Overture" by Robert Muczynski, "Perpetuum Mobile" by Johann Strauss and "Sleeping Beauty Waltz" by Tchaikovsky.

There will be no admission charge although an offering will be accepted for the benefit of the music scholarship fund at SOC. Coffee will be served at intermission by Alpha Sigma chapter of Beta Sigma Phi.

Thespians To Present Ancient Greek Tragedy

Antigone, one of the great tragedies of the ancient Greek dramatist, Sophocles, has been scheduled as a readers theater presentation by the Thespian troupe of Medford Senior High school. A single public presentation, under the direction of Mrs. Lenore Zapell, on March 12 will begin at 8 p.m. in the arena theater, Room 61 in the High school annex.

Readers theater, which depends primarily on vocal interpretation and facial expression to convey the impact of a play, is a new device for the high school group. Within recent years, however, the producer, Paul Gregory, has successfully used this means to bring to theater goers "John Brown's Body" and "Don Juan in Hell" with stars such as Charles Laughton, Tyrone Power, and Agnes Moorehead.

Tracy Blackstone, recently selected as best actress in one-act plays at the Oregon Thespian conference, has been cast as Antigone. Creon, the tyrannical ruler of Thebes, will be interpreted by Greg Keith, president of the local troupe. Carolyn Bowser will be seen as Ismene, the young girl who urges her sister not to defy the edict of Creon.

Haemon, the son of Creon, will be played by Bill Houston. Tiresias, the blind prophet, will be portrayed by John Hettiga. Others in the cast are Mike De Salvo, the sentinel who captures Antigone; Jim Kerber, the messenger who reports the tragic events of the play to the audience; Judie Brookman, Eurydice, the wife of Creon and mother of Haemon.

Members of the chorus are Frank Williams, the first senator, Paul Goodwin, and Judy Foreman. The narrative which introduces the play and several scenes of the play will be handed by Richard La Fleur.
