IV Ranger Station Building Finished

Cave Junction—Construction of the Illinois Valley ranger station office building at Cave Junction has been completed, at a cost of \$25,837.

Sidewalks, curbs, parking space and landscaping will not be completed until late spring, but forest service personnel have moved into the building.

J. K. Cook of Grants Pass was contractor on the job. The building has a floor area of 2,488 square feet plus an 18 by 30 foot basement.

In other projects, a complete new water system is being installed at Grayback Forest camp, according to Elwin Frye, acting district ranger. The water will be chlorinated. Work also has begun on four new comfort stations at the camp. Contractor is Clyde Hamilton of Grants Pass.

Included in the project are installation of new barrier posts and removal of dangerous trees. All work will be completed by May 1, when the campground will be opened to the public.

Plans also are under way to install a chlorinated water system at Store Gulch campground and two toilets on the south side of the river at Illinois River falls for the convenience of fishermen and hikers, Frye said.

A contract for construction of three residences west of the Forest service office has been let to B. D. Green of Ashland, successful bidder.

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
