Citrus Crop Said
Cut 25 Per Cent
By Hard Freeze
Washington—The Agriculture Department estimates the hard freezes in December and January cut the 1962-63 citrus crop 25 per cent below the previous year. The March 1 forecast of the 1962-63 orange crop indicated a production of 105 million boxes, 24 per cent smaller than the 1961-62 record high output. The grapefruit forecast of 35.4 million boxes was 18 per cent less than the 1961-62 crop. The lemon crop, at 11.5 million boxes, is nearly one-third smaller than last year. The department said orange prospects in Florida declined an additional 4 per cent in February because of continued loss of freeze damaged fruit. Valencia Crop Down Of the total orange crop for 1962-63, an estimated 60.2 million boxes are early, mid-season, and navel varieties, 10 per cent fewer than last year. A Valencia crop of 45.2 million boxes now is forecast less than two-thirds as large as the 1961-62 crop. The department's general crop report as of March 1 said continued cold weather during February over the eastern half of the nation caused further losses of fall sown oats and barley. Cold also slowed development of winter vegetable crops, delayed peach blooms, and accentuated shortages of roughage for livestock by eliminating most of the winter pasture in the southeast. In sharp contrast, relatively mild February weather in western regions favored crops and livestock. The winter potato crop, grown in California and Florida, is 8 per cent smaller than last year, the department said. The start of field activities was delayed in most of the area east of the Rockies. Many private firms also are participating in the plans to welcome out-of-state visitors to Oregon. They include Portland Federal Savings, Pacific Power and Light company, Portland General Electric company, Pacific Northwest Bell Telephone company, Northwest Natural Gas company, United States National Bank of Portland, First National Bank of Oregon, and many others. As part of the enlarged program, Donald E. Seeley, Salem, has been employed by the highway department's intrastate coordinator for the tourist program. He is working directly with these associations, firms, chambers of commerce, and other groups in plans to encourage visitors to stay longer. The highway department will gain provide full-color window posters for use in business windows and the "tent" cards for display on restaurant tables. These posters and cards will have space for imprinting information on local vacation activities. The department also is providing color brochures on scenic attractions, camping areas, community events, sports activities, and other activities for distribution by chambers of commerce and other offices.

'Blue Laws' Held Unconstitutional By Missouri Court

St. Louis, Mo., (AP)—With the "blue laws" of Missouri unconstitutional in Missouri, a "show me" Sunday shopper will be able to buy baby bottles—as well as a bottle of beer. The State Supreme Court ruled at Jefferson City the 137-year-old "blue laws" were so "vague" and "backwoods" as to render themselves incapable of reasonable enforcement. A traveler in St. Louis complained recently he could buy a bottle of 3.2 beer but he could not get a baby bottle to replace his child's last broken one because such items were not listed as "other articles of immediate necessity." Plans in the legislature call for the Senate to continue to study blue law proposals, but limiting itself only to a bill which would redefine what could and could not be sold. For the present, Missouri stands without a Sunday closing statute. Language of Pioneer Judge C. A. Leedy Jr. pointed out in the unanimous written decision some of the provisions of the statute "are couched in the language of the pioneer, backwoods era during which it was originally enacted." He said a portion of the blue law prohibited the keeping open on Sunday of "any ale or porter house, grocery or tipping shop." The court based its reversal of a 1961 decision on the phrase in the statute on "other articles of immediate necessity." It said the phrase was "so vague and indefinite that it cannot be ascertained with any reasonable degree of certainty what sales are permitted, and what sales are interdicted, thus making the statute incapable of reasonable enforcement, and hence void." Spokesmen for some discount chains here said they plan to open for business Sunday.
