



HERE SATURDAY—The Eugene Highlanders will visit the Rogue valley Saturday to play in Phoenix during the intermission at the Phoenix Volunteer Firemen's hall. Joint School-City Park Setup In Central Point Discussed

The School District 6C board of directors met with representatives of the Central Point city council and planning commission March 12. Discussion was continued on the possibility of joint use and maintenance of school playgrounds and city parks.

Because of the growing need for expansion in the school system, district 6 officials have offered to purchase six acres of city property for a building site to eventually house 500 students. The property is located on West Pine st. and is presently being used as a city ball park.

Board members also proposed to lease the remaining 4.2 acres at this location. In exchange four acres behind Jewett school would be leased to the city. The leased acreage would be jointly used and maintained as city parks and school playgrounds.

School superintendent C. A. Meyer pointed out that a combined program would better utilize both parks and playgrounds at a saving to the taxpayer.

Leo Ghelardi and Bill Anhorn, board members, will meet with Don Patterson, councilman, and Harry Tonn, planning commissioner, to study all aspects of the plan.

Following the discussion with city officials, school board members proceeded with their regular meeting.

The 1963-64 budget of \$1,427,295.00 was accepted. The budget hearing will be in the Central Point Junior High cafeteria April 4 at 2 p.m.

Eagle Pt. Council Approves Contract

Eagle Point - The Eagle Point City Council adjourned until March 19 following a short business meeting Tuesday evening.

During the evening the council voted to sign a contract with Pacific Power and Light company allowing it to cross city property to bring a power line to the chlorinator at the sewage lagoon site.

Discussion on the fast traffic now in the Fifth and E sts. area brought about the decision to place counters at these two streets to determine the feasibility of placing stop signs in the vicinity before a serious accident should take place. The council also agreed to apply for federal street funds.

Prices on three available vehicles for the street and water department use that could be locked were presented for the council's consideration, with no action taken.

A letter from the Medford Water department approving the request for approximately 40 acres of water for a subdivision in Eagle Point was approved providing Eagle Point does not go over its allotted amount of water in the original contract.

Following a report that residents were hooking up to the new sewer system each week, it was noted that all residents under the sewage disposal system must be hooked up by September of 1963.

We were among the many visitors at Bill Duggan's Land of Many Oaks, smogless homes for eye irritated Californians. The air was so pure and the vision to crystal clear that one interested spectator almost walked through a closed glass door.

Civil defense we believe is all right and could be a great help in emergencies, like floods, fires, and accidents, if it would get on the ball and be there when needed, but it has been our experience that in emergencies it is the state police and the Red Cross that get there first.

Although many do not know it, wheat supports are not a new thing and are not used only in the U.S. Nearly all wheat producing countries use government price support systems. In 37 wheat producing countries with price supports, the highest support is \$2.97 per bushel in West Germany, and the lowest, Argentina, with \$1.18.

Recently, we listened to a man going to great lengths telling over the radio that we were fast losing our rights of free speech, but at the same time he was lambasting to the high heavens some of our government agencies, particularly those who regulate radio time. This reminds us that the right of free speech doesn't mean that you can make speeches that are of a seditious nature and inclined to incite riot.

At the close of the local ballot theft trials here, Judge Skipworth of Eugene, Oregon, who was the presiding judge, gave this advice. The next time someone mounts your courthouse steps and starts making an inflammatory speech, arrest him on the spot. L. A. Banks had done this, and had a yard full of listeners. Skipworth believed if we had lowered the boom on Banks at that time, we would not have had the trouble, turmoil, and trials that cost the county some \$80,000.

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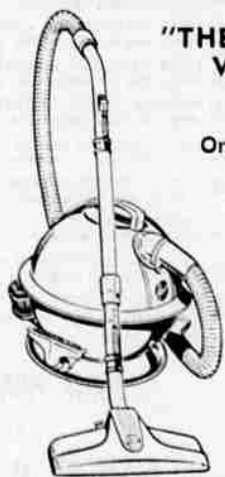
