The recent controversy over the so-called sociology tests given to fifth graders in the Grants Pass city and Josephine county school districts has reached its melodramatic conclusion.

The Josephine County Veterans council asked permission of school authorities to burn the test papers filled out by students. Permission was granted. And so a week ago last Thursday the veterans patriotically put a match to them.

There were the tests that asked students to identify those among their classmates who were the leaders, bullies, lonely ones, etc. They were administered at the request of Dr. Frederick Frost of Southern Oregon college and are part of an overall program that in other parts of the country has been credited with cutting juvenile delinquency by as much as 80 per cent.

Some parents objected merely because they thought they should have been let in on the tests before they were given. Others went farther, branding the tests as un-American and communistic. We're glad to see that communism is being stamped out—or should we say burned out—in Josephine county.

Rogue River Youth Chosen for Concert

Gold Hill Sewage Treatment Plant Study Is Authorized

Gold Hill—Mayor Milton Steinmetz was authorized by the Gold Hill city council to sign papers to accept a federal grant which has been approved by the government to pay engineering fees not to exceed \$1,500 for preliminary investigation and report of the city's sewage treatment plant.

This action gave the green light for R. T. Worthington & Associates, Corvallis, to go ahead with preliminary survey work. It and the report are to be completed within 100 days after the city receives notification from the Housing & Home Finance agency that an application for advance for public works planning has been approved.

Richard T. Worthington, engineer from the firm, was present to explain important factors and stressed that the council should keep in mind the fact that although this loan for engineering fee and report is a federal grant with no certain date of repayment, unless actual construction modification results from the

investigation, the city is still obligated to repay this financing even though no work commences, because it is an indebtedness to the city. When the investigation is completed and the report made the mayor and council will inform the public as to the next step, so residents within the city who are concerned with the project will receive accurate information, it was stated.

Engineering services will include a review of the city potential for future development of residential and commercial areas. Population trends of the city will be reviewed and probable long range growth determined.

The present and estimated future collecting system requirements of the sewage treatment plant will be determined. Physical features of the existing sewage treatment plant will be investigated. The survey will determine what modifications in the existing treatment facility are essential and required, and prepare a preliminary design arrangement of the recommended modifications. Estimates of cost on the recommended modifications and

preliminary design arrangements will be prepared. The financial condition of the city as related to potential indebtedness and financing for the improvements contemplated will be investigated. Offered will be recommendations on project financing; sewage connection fees, rate structures, and system operating costs.

The above information will be compiled in report form and recommendations will be offered the city for a fixed program, initiating the contemplated project. A complete engineering report will be submitted to the Oregon State Board of Health for review and approval when the preliminary survey is completed.

The present council is making an effort in cooperation with previous study by the former council to comply with recommendations for improvements that were made by the state May 15, 1962, to bring the 30-year-old plant up to date.

Action to accept the federal grant was made during the March 4 council meeting. This climaxed work and study started by the previous council.

One Post Open on Eagle Point Board

Eagle Point.—One position will be open on School District 9 board this year, according to Superintendent Glenn D. Hale. This position is now occupied by Merton Bradshaw who will file a petition to run again. Bradshaw was appointed by the board to fill the unexpired term of Jack Reed when he moved to Medford last year.

Any person desiring to run for this position must file a petition with the Eagle Point school district clerk in her office at the administration building on West Main st. by April 5.

The candidate must be a legal voter, registered, and with continued residence in the district for the preceding six months before he files his acceptance of the signed petition.

A petition may be secured from the clerk at which time necessary information on obtaining legal signatures will be given.

Three Candidates File For Grants Pass School Board

Grants Pass—Three candidates have filed for positions on the Grants Pass City District No. 7 school board, it was announced here by Superintendent Ralph E. Jones. Running for the three positions to be filled at the May 6 election will be Dr. R. Ray Johnson, physician; Robert P. Busch, plywood mill executive; and Ed Malone, radio and TV executive.

Johnson, who served as chairman of the board last year, is seeking reelection for a five-year term. A veteran and ex-Navy doctor, he has been a member of the Naval Reserve for the past 13 years. He is past president of the Grants Pass Active and Kiwanis clubs.

Busch is now assistant general manager of Josephine Plywood Corp. He was formerly office manager of Grants Pass Plywood before it was sold to the new firm. He has been active in civic affairs, and is currently chairman of the District 7 budget committee.

Malone is vice president and technical director of the Southern Oregon Broadcasting company, which operates KBES-TV in Medford and KOTI-TV in Klamath Falls. He also has broadcasting interests in northern California. A former Grants Pass city councilman, he recently completed fourteen consecutive years of service with that
