Rome Subject of Travel Talk Event At Domiciliary

The sixth in the winter series of travel talks sponsored by the American Red Cross at the Veterans Administration Domiciliary, White City, was given this week by Mrs. Russell Herbert in the Domiciliary theater.

Mrs. Herbert, now a resident of Medford, showed color-films of her native city, Rome, Italy, where during World War II she met her husband when he was with the American Forces there.

Her familiarity with the city in its ancient, medieval and modern aspects gave authenticity and added interest to her comments on such familiar scenes as Vatican City, St. Peter's Basilica, and the famous monuments, statues, mosaics and fountains created by such great artists of the past as Michelangelo, Raphael and Bernini.

Of special interest because of the striking contrasts were views of the today's popular Via Veneto with its glitter and glamor followed by some of the less familiar parts of the old Appian Way with its crumbling reminders of the glory of the ancient Roman Empire.

As a bonus, there were color films of Assisi with its many statues, monuments and churches commemorating the life of its most famous native-son St. Francis.

After the talk, refreshments were served from a table on which stood an Italian doll and several pieces of Italian pottery Mrs. Herbert brought back from her trip. Mrs. Leatha Jones, travel talk chairman of the American Red Cross, and Mrs. C. Walters of Medford assisted in the serving.

Sergeant Missile Successfully Fired

San Nicholas Island, Calif. - (UPI) - The Army's Sergeant missile was successfully fired from sea level Wednesday and hit its target 70 miles away.

Army spokesmen said the firing of the 34-foot long solid fuel bird was designed to test tactical operation of the missile under conditions at sea level atmosphere. The missile dropped its nose cone near San Miguel Island off Santa Barbara after reaching an altitude of 25 miles.

The Sergeant, produced to replace the present war-ready Corporal missile, is the first missile acknowledged by the Army as capable of carrying warheads for chemical and biological warfare use.

The missile is expected to be deployed to Army units in Europe this spring.

Student Loans at Oregon State Now Exceed \$1 Million

Corvallis - Student loans have become a million-dollar business at Oregon State university, Dr. James H. Jensen, university president, has reported.

Of the \$1,186,773 available at Oregon State, some \$1,043,862 is in loan to students.

Some \$655,000 will be loaned this year, compared to \$450,000 last year, Jensen said. Loan periods range from 30 days to several years.

The late R. A. Booth, state senator from Eugene, started the OSU student loan fund with a \$500 grant in 1911. Resources available have increased 2,631 times during its 52-year existence.

J. Frank Jonasson, student loan officer, said a \$15,000 fund is available for emergency loans of 30 days. Average loans are for \$75. The fund rotated more than 10 times this past year for a \$107,000 total.

Collection Problems
 Collection problems are small, Jonasson said. Delinquent accounts total less than 1 per cent. Nearly 20 per cent of all students enrolled at Oregon State have made use of the fund at one time or another.

To continue the loan program at its present pace, an additional \$40,000 will be needed next year. The State Scholarship commission is expected to provide funds to make a matching amount available for additional National Defense Student Loans.

Regular and special funds available total \$170,490 from which a freshman may borrow \$300; sophomore \$450; junior \$600; and senior or graduate \$700.

A total of \$766,400 in National Defense Student Loans can be borrowed for repayment within 10 years after graduation, with 3 per cent interest beginning one year after graduation. An individual student may borrow up to \$1,000 a year from this source.
