Theme for the luncheon will be "Flowers in Springtime."

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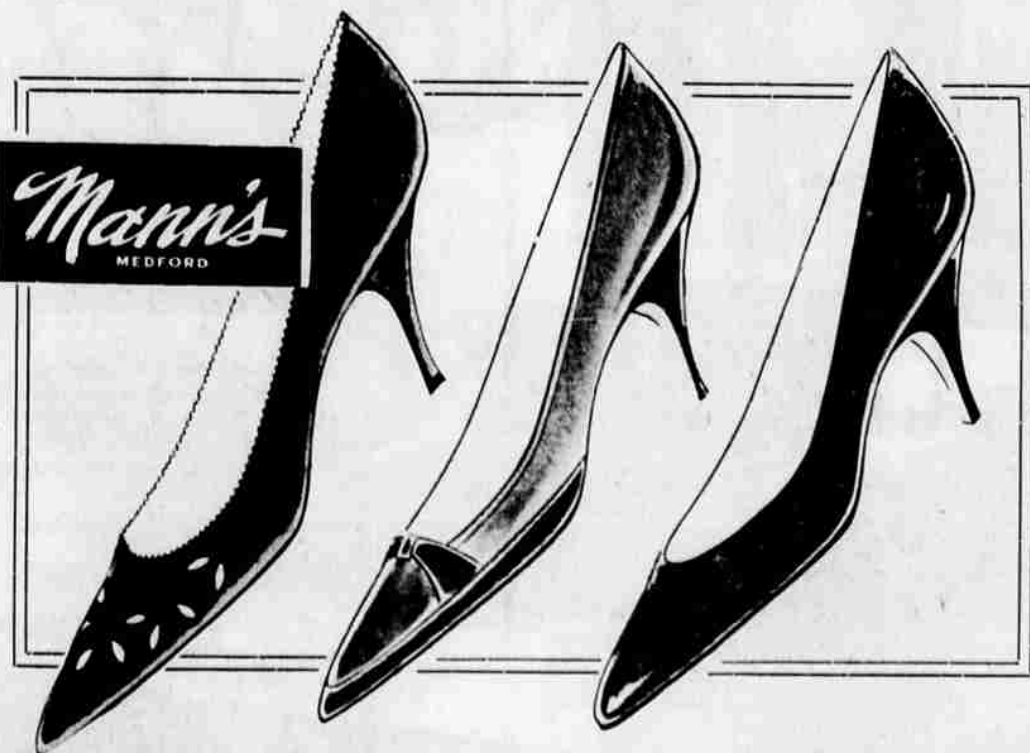
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Honor Society Pledges Student
