When the government of Brazil heard about it, it howled like a wounded wolf.

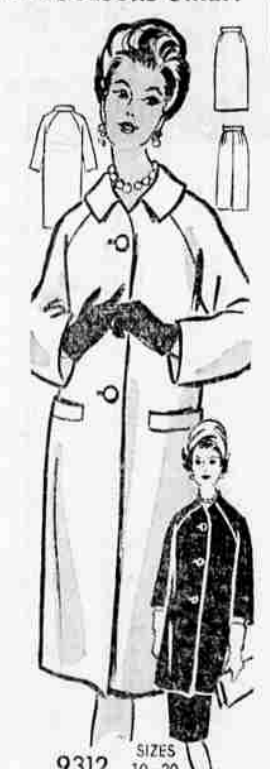
Carpenters to Meet In Grants Pass

Vets Entitled To Tax Exemption Should File

Eligible war veterans and eligible widows of war veterans entitled to the Oregon state property tax exemption were reminded today by Elmer W. Donahoo, veterans service officer for Jackson county, that they must file for their exemption with their county tax assessor on or before April 1.

This is the deadline for applying, according to law, and the deadline cannot be extended.

Thad Hatten, Jackson county assessor, also called attention to the fact that many of the eligible applicants that received the benefit last year have failed to re-apply for this year.

There is a misunderstanding among some veterans who are 65 years of age and over that could result in the loss of their exemption, Donahoo said.

Ticket-Vending Machines Planned for Campgrounds

Portland—Ticket vending machines for collection of a service fee will be in operation this summer at 30 of the 850 campgrounds in the National Forests of the Pacific Northwest region, Oregon and Washington.

The 30 sites include about 1,450 family camping units. Picnicking, boat-launching, and other day-use activities at the sites remain free of charge.

The U.S. forest service has furnished free recreation facilities at campgrounds and picnic sites for many years. But as facilities improved and demands increased, it is probable that charges will be required for use of many of the developed sites, according to J. Herbert Stone, regional forester.

New facilities are being installed at campgrounds, including many of those which will carry the \$1 service charge this summer. Such construction and the job of installing ticket machines may affect the beginning dates for this year's charge program. A list of campgrounds involved and the periods during which charges will be in effect will be announced soon, he said.

Stone said the trend toward establishing service charges

Receipts will go to the U.S. Treasury, as do other National Forest receipts such as those for timber sales and grazing allotments, with 25 per cent returned to the counties in which the national forest lands are located.

Ticket-vending machines were tested last summer at two sites, Paradise camp ground east of McKenzie Bridge on the Willamette National Forest and Tillamook Beach campground between Waldport and Yachats on the Siuslaw National Forest. These two sites are among the 30 scheduled for the charge operation this summer.

In addition to the 30 sites with ticket-vending machines, the charge system at one National Forest recreation area, Diamond Lake campground in Oregon, will continue under operation by a concessionaire.

De Gaulle Calls Cabinet Meeting

Paris—UPI—France's dwindling power supply today increased the pressure on President Charles de Gaulle to find a way out of the worst labor crisis since he took office.

De Gaulle called a special cabinet meeting in an effort to avert a threatened walkout by the country's gas and electricity workers.

But his regime, its prestige at a new low, made no immediate move to settle a strike by 200,000 nationalized coal miners that precipitated the crisis. The miners walked out March 1.

Their strike, combined with a walkout of natural gas workers of the Lacq fields in southwestern France, has depleted the nation's power supplies severely and led to a threatened shutdown of many industries.

'Hate America' Meeting Ruled Out

Rio De Janeiro—UPI—Gov. Carlos Lacerda ruled Monday night that the Communists cannot hold a scheduled "hate America" meeting in Rio this week despite the willingness of the federal government to permit it.

Lacerda charged that the meeting had been organized with the help of foreign elements to incite the Brazilian people to rise against the government.

The ruling apparently took the organizers of the "solidarity with Cuba" convention by surprise. J. Congaza Leite, principal promoter of the meeting, could not be reached immediately for comment.

Although no alert order had been issued to police Monday night, a government spokesman said authorities here are prepared to deal with "any agitation that might result" from Lacerda's order.
