



Crowd Mourns Davey Moore At Services

Springfield, Ohio — (UPI) — Mourners overflowed the Baptist church of Davey Moore's boyhood Saturday as the good little guy of boxing was laid to rest.

"My message is to comfort the family," Bishop Carl Smith said in the eulogy, "For God will not forget them."

Outside, friends of long ago and the plain curious stood along the street or waited in cars parked half-a-mile along the streets in all directions.

The minister made no reference to boxing and to demands to abolish the sports that arose in the wake of Moore's fatal injury in a Los Angeles boxing match March 21.

Gonzales TKO's Rubin Carter
 New York — (UPI) — Jose Gonzales made a brilliant bid for middleweight ranking last night when he scored a technical knockout over the fifth-ranked Rubin (Hurricane) Carter. The fight was stopped at the end of the sixth round.

Gonzalez, a windmill-type fighter, cut Carter over the right eye with a hard smash in the second round and blood continuously streamed from Hurricane's eye until Dr. Samuel Swetnik, ring physician, ordered referee Petey Della to halt the fight.

Gallant Gonzalez of Puerto Rico, considered a powder puff puncher, was behind on points when the fight was halted.

Bids Called for Correction Work

Bids for more than two miles of slide correction on the Lake of the Woods highway will be received by the bureau of public roads in Portland until 2 p.m. April 16.

The project is a segment of an east-west highway routing under development extending from Eagle Point on State Highway Route 62 north of Medford, easterly to the east forest boundary southeast of Odessa creek along the west side of Upper Klamath Lake road. Site is about 25 miles southeast of Eagle Point.

When reconstructed and surfaced the road will offer an alternate route between Medford and Klamath Falls. The work consists of the correction of landslides within a 2.195 mile segment that has developed since completion of the grading project.

Forest highway funds are financing the project.

Burrell To Spearhead Comedy For Clown Quintet at Phoenix

The Court Jester! This is the sobriquet that has been bestowed upon "Chico" Burrell, veteran comedy star of the frolicking Harlem Clowns.

The Court Jester will lead the famous casaba cut-ups when they play in the Phoenix high gym at 8 p.m., Monday, April 1.

He was christened Stanley but somewhere along the line during his 15-year career he picked up his nickname and that's how he's been known ever since.

Chico stands six feet, two inches and weighs a trim 190 pounds. He is from Long Island City, New York.

Burrell began his career back in the late 1940s and as a rookie, he was taught how to clown by Al (Runt) Pullins, owner - manager of the Harlem Clowns.

Chico then joined the Harlem Globetrotters and for years was the top comic and pivot man for their western unit.

Burrell is a natural comic. He loves the horse play and tom foolery which goes along with the Clowns' routines during a basketball game.

Deposits, Loans Show Increases

The Medford branch of the First National Bank reported first quarter deposits of \$30,393,850 and loans outstanding of \$16,609,527, for 1963, R. C. Ross, branch manager and vice president, has announced.

Central Point branch deposits totaled \$3,384,350 and loans \$3,990,447. Comparable totals, announced by Manager F. C. Ayres, were deposits \$4,477,074 and loans \$3,353,777 for a year ago.

The Medford figures for a year ago were \$29,917,427 in deposits and \$14,881,978 in loans.

Comparable figures, released by the Phoenix branch, showed first quarter deposits of \$1,436,546 and loans of \$1,154,601 for 1963 and deposits of \$1,233,424 and loans of \$636,968 for 1962.

Ralph J. Voss, president of the First National Bank of Oregon, said the deposits and loans were record high throughout the state for the quarter.

Fire Leaves Family Of 11 Homeless

Prineville — (UPI) — A family of 11 was homeless today after a wind-whipped blaze destroyed their two-story frame home one mile north of here Friday afternoon.

Homeless were Mr. and Mrs. Walter Reddekopp, their seven children and two grandchildren.

The fire was believed to have started from an overheated wood furnace in the basement.

Firemen were hampered by the wind and lack of water. There were no injuries. No estimate of loss was immediately available.
