Committee Votes Youth Job Bill

Washington — (UPI) — The Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee Monday approved a liberalized version of President Kennedy's top-priority youth employment act.

Democratic Majority Leader Mike Mansfield (Mont.) predicted the bill would be passed by the Senate next week.

The committee vote of approval was 11-3 with Sen. Jacob Javits (R-N.Y.) joining Democrats in support of the measure which previously had solid Republican opposition.

It would put up to 75,000 youngsters to work in conservation camps and on home-town projects the first year and would leave the door open for unlimited expansion of the program thereafter.

The House Education and Labor Committee recently approved a less-extensive measure.

First-year work of the program would be up to \$420 million in federal funds. The measure also would allow a step toward reducing the high unemployment rate among young people by providing for labor market.

The President's Council on Economic Advisors has urged Congress to give the bill the best possible chance, but the prospects of this measure are dim.

More opposition is expected in the House.

Lakeview Man Serving Sentence

"The imperialist scum challenges peace and democracy and drives clouds on to the blue sky over the Caribbean Sea."

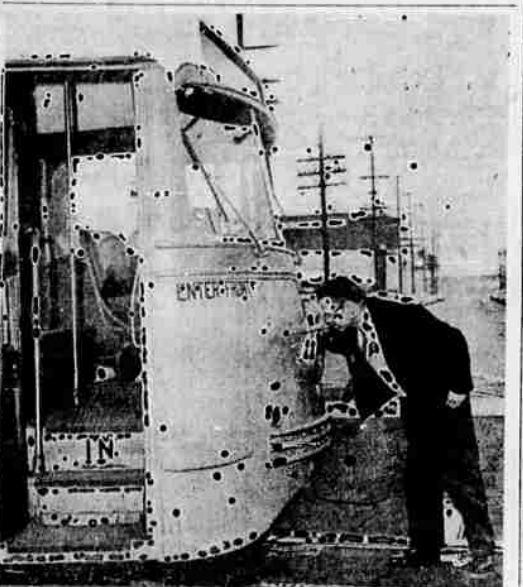
Greenwood, Miss.—Negro comic Dick Gregory, addressing a crowd of 1,000 cheering Negroes at a voter registration rally:

Nat G. — This is between my wife and me. She agreed to the car.

Mrs. I. K. — Now I have to slip money to my daughter for the important things like feed and doctor bills. He's a gardener with only a seasonal income; you'd think he had enough sense to get an inexpensive, inconspicuous car the whole family could enjoy. But no. This one is a racer with a jump-seat, so there's room for Astrid if he leaves her alone. He wants a car to make him look like a big shot. Well, he'd better sell it and start looking like a better bet to his creditors.

Nat G. — We figured I could join a racing club and enter the competitions. There's good prize money to be won, and it's a wonderful hobby during my slack seasons. Of course it's proving more expensive than we realized, what with dues and accessories. Yes, we're in debt now. If my mother-in-law doesn't

want to help us, okay. I'm up to a loan shark. At least he won't be calling me names and nagging me about what to do. Astrid and I will decide whether to sell the car. Mrs. K. will get her money back.

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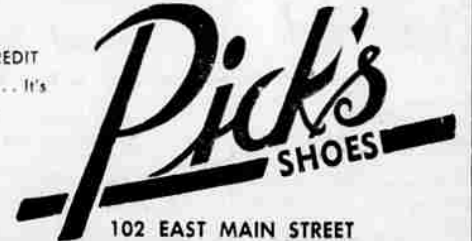
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
