

Burglary at Medford High Said Cleared

The burglary of Medford High school March 16 was cleared Tuesday afternoon after a man now being held by authorities for another burglary in the county admitted entering the school.

Melvin Edwin Snodgrass, 23, of a motel in Ashland, admitted the burglary in a signed statement, according to Medford police.

Snodgrass, who was arrested last month with J. R. Allen, 31, also of Ashland, and a 17-year-old girl, was charged with the others for the burglary of the Jeddah Brothers Sweets Mills Inc., Gold Hill.

Snodgrass has pleaded guilty to the Gold Hill burglary and is awaiting the completion of a pre-sentencing report.

In his statement Snodgrass implicated Allen, police said.

Allen had been arraigned on the charge, and a attorney has been appointed. The girl was lodged in the Jackson county juvenile detention home and a hearing is scheduled this week.

A few dollars was taken in the high school burglary. Allen is being held on \$1,500 bail but is not eligible for release, authorities noted, because a charge of parole violation has been filed against him by Washington state authorities.

50,000 New Signs Required

Salem - It required 50,000 new highway traffic signs to keep Oregon's motoring public on the right road during 1962. This many signs were built and installed on the 7,500-mile Oregon highway system last year, according to

Forrest Cooper, state highway engineer. The sign division of the state highway department also painted more than 350 different types of legends. The signs range from the largest, including installation costs.

Most highway signs are made of plywood and aluminum. Average life of the plywood sign is five to seven years. Letters and numbers on the reflectorized aluminum signs must be cleaned about every five years.
