Darkhorse Label Attached to Phils

(This is the 18th of 20 dispatches on the 1963 prospects of the major league baseball clubs.)

Clearwater, Fla.—The darkhorse of the 1963 National league pennant race?

A lot of baseball people are picking the Philadelphia Phillies' Manager Gene Mauch says "it's with good reason" although he realizes full well that the club has a long way to go.

"I'll say one thing, we aren't going to be what you baseball writers refer to as the forlorn Phillies a year more," he adds. "We definitely are on our way up."

Last season, playing the best ball in the league over the last month of the year, the Phillies wound up seventh, 20 1/2 games behind the winning Giants. For four straight years prior to that they had finished in the cellar—eighth place. Last year the cellar became 10th place as the league expanded to 10 clubs with the addition of the Houston Colt and New York Mets.

Happy About Finish "I was happy about that finish," Mauch recalls. "I believe a year ago at this time a lot of people were wondering whether we could beat out those new clubs. Well, we did, and the established Cubs as well."

"I realize it is going to be harder this year to beat out any of the clubs who finished ahead of us last year, but I think we can do it."

His chances would be better if he could count on a full year's production out of pitcher Dennis Bennett and first baseman Roy Sievers. Bennett, a nine game winner in 1962 who looked like one of the coming hurlers in the league, was injured in an automobile accident in January and his status for 1963 is doubtful.

Sievers, the power hitting first baseman, was hurt in an exhibition game and the preliminary report was that he would be out three weeks. But at his age of 36, one doesn't always recover from injuries as quickly as predicted.

Mauch remains optimistic. Despite those blows, Mauch remains optimistic. He thinks the club solved a big problem when they got third baseman Don Hoak from the Pirates, freeing Don Demeter for full-time outfield duty.

With Demeter in left, Johnny Callison in center and Tony Gonzalez in right the Phillies have one of the best outfields in the league. Although he played out of position at third most of 1962, Demeter hit .307 with 29 home runs and 107 runs batted in. Callison, rapidly coming into the stardom forecast for him, batted an even .300 with 23 HR's and 83 RBI's while Gonzalez slumped off to a .202 average with 20 HR's and 63 RBI's.

But you couldn't get any bets that Gonzalez will not do better than that in the HR and RBI department this year.

For outfield reserves there are the veteran Wes Covington and probably rookie John Herrstein, up from Buffalo where he hit .293 with 23 HR's and 82 RBI's.

Left Infield Strong The left side of the infield is strong with Hoak at third and Ruben Amaro, an extraordinary glove man, at short. The veteran Tony Taylor will

be at second. Backing Sievers at first they have Frank Torre, who hit .310 last year, and they have an outstanding utility shortstop in Bobby Wine.

Clay Dalrymple came on as fast as a catcher last season and the Phillies acquired Eric Averill, who also can play the outfield, to back him up. Holdover Bob Oldis will be the third stringer.

Art Mahaffey, who won 19 games last year, will anchor the hurling staff. Jack Baldschun, the hardest working reliever in the league last season with a 12-7 record, will head the bullpen.

For starters along with Mahaffey there will be Chris Short (11-9), Jack Hamilton (9-12), Dallas Green (9-6) and old-timer Cal McLish (11-5).

Billy Smith, 7-1 at Buffalo, probably will back up Baldschun in the bullpen.

The rest of the positions on the pitching staff are wide open with a lot depending upon Bennett, John Bozzer, 8-6 at Buffalo; Paul Brown, 2-0 at Buffalo; veteran Johnny Klippstein, picked up from the Reds, and Joel Gibson, who was overall 12-11 at Buffalo and Williamsport are the leading possibilities.

Duke Mathews, Eugene, leader after the first day and lead shareholder after the second, carded a three-over-par 75 at Rogue Valley Country club here yesterday to capture top money in the three-day Southern Oregon pro-amateur tournament of the Oregon Golfers association.

His score gave him a composite of 218, two strokes better than the totals of fellow pros, Jerry Cloninger, Prineville; Bunny Masson, Columbia-Eggwater, Portland; and Harvey Hixson, Hidden Valley, Cottage Grove.

Dr. Ralph Odell, Medford, led yesterday's best score, a one-under-par 71 and took the three-day amateur low gross honors with a 221.

Tom Shaw, Portland, 1962 Southern Oregon amateur champ, who has turned pro, was the low scorer among play for pay men yesterday with a 72.
