Grants Pass, St. Mary's High Defend in Rogue Relay Meets

Grants Pass and St. Mary's High schools will defend championships on Saturday in track and field competition. The events are the Rogue Valley relays at Medford high stadium and the Little Rogue relays at the Phoenix high field. Both are afternoon events.

Activity in the Big Rogue will start at 12:30 p.m. with the first running event at 1:30 p.m. Little Rogue field events have 1:30 p.m. beginning time. First race will be at 2:30 p.m.

Grants Pass will be out to make it three in a row in the Rogue Valley encounter and will vie against Medford, Crater, Klamath Falls and Ashland. As usual, Medford and Grants Pass are expected to battle it out for the Medford Kiwanis club trophy.

St. Mary's will aim for its fifth straight Little Rogue diadem. Championship trophy

is provided by Phoenix Lions club. Entered in the meet along with SM and host Phoenix will be Eagle Point, Illinois Valley and Rogue River.

The Class A-1 school meet here will offer a 13-event program. However, three field events, the shot put, discus and javelin, will be staged at Jefferson school at 12:30 p.m. because the high school football field is torn up for replanting and the baseball diamond will be in use.

There will be seven running events, six of them relays. Of the six field events, three, the high jump, broad jump and shot put, will be scored as relays with the top three marks of three performers of each school combined. The Little Rogue meet will offer 11 events. There will be five relay races. The six field events will be scored on an

individual basis.

While the two southern Oregon contests are full-fledged and traditional meets in their own rights, they will serve to prep the teams for participation on the following week end in the Hayward relays at Eugene. The Rogue meets are patterned after the Haywards.

Medford Kiwanis club serves as sponsor of the Rogue Valley relays and will have a crew of men on hand under the chairmanship of the Rev. Clifford Young.

All 10 teams involved in the two meets are expected to have full teams on hand. First event to start within the Medford stadium on Saturday will be the pole vault at 1 p.m. High hurdles are set for 1:30 p.m. First race at Phoenix will be the distance medley.

Oregon Staters Have 10 Bests

University of Oregon, Eugene—Oregon State track and field performers have posted the best effort in 10 of 16 individual events among Northern Division schools.

Oregon's defending NCAA champions, hampered by weather thus far, boast the top mark in three events, the University of Washington has two athletes in the lead and Idaho lists one leading performer.

Several outstanding efforts have been turned in this spring with Dave Steen of Oregon leading the way. Steen has the best shot put performance among ND athletes with a throw of 60-2 1/2 and also tops the discus throwers with an effort of 174-7.

Norm Hoffman of Oregon State has been checked in 1:49.5 in the 800 and Morgan Gotoh of the Beavers lists a 4:04.7 best in the mile to his credit.

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NY Yankees Choice for 3rd in Row

New York—UPP—The New York Yankees are the choice of the UPI board of baseball experts to make it three world championships in a row under the leadership of manager Ralph Houk.

The 24-man board, including four UPI sports writers and one writer or broadcaster traveling with each of the 20 major league teams, foresees a coast-to-coast World Series between the Yankees and the Los Angeles Dodgers. The Yankees were tabbed as shoos in the American League while the Dodgers were picked to win a three-cornered battle also involving the Cincinnati Reds and San Francisco Giants in the National League.

If the experts are right, the Yankees will win breezing and the Dodgers will win after a virtual three-way tie with the Reds and Giants.

No less than 20 of the 24 experts tabbed the Yankees for first place and the New York team's total of 235 points was only five short of the "possible" 240 it could have received from the board.

Tigers Figured Second
The Detroit Tigers were picked to finish second with 191 points and the Baltimore Orioles were tabbed for third with 183. Following in order, were the Minnesota Twins, Los Angeles Angels, Chicago White Sox, Cleveland Indians, Boston Red Sox, Kansas City Athletics and Washington Senators.

The National League race will be one of the most fantastic in the league's history if it's anywhere near as close as the experts' voting.

With points awarded on the basis of 10 for a first-place vote down to one for a 10th place, the Dodgers wound up with 216, the Reds with 214 and the defending champion Giants with 213.

Strung out in order, behind the top three in the NL were the St. Louis Cardinals, Pittsburgh Pirates, Philadelphia Phillies, Milwaukee Braves, Chicago Cubs, Houston Colts and New York Mets.

Big Game Hunting Views To Be Aired Here April 9

Medford meeting on Tuesday evening, April 9, to allow interested persons to give their views on fall big game hunting seasons, will be held at 7:30 p.m. at the Oregon state extension service auditorium, 1301 Maple Grove dr.

The Medford meeting and one at Klamath Falls on April 8 will follow up game commission-sponsored "show-me" trips to eastern Oregon. Field inspection of the Silver Lake and Klamath county mule deer ranges is slated Saturday, Sunday and Monday, April 6, 7 and 8.

The inspection jaunts will be no-host affairs with each individual providing his own bed and board. Shelter will be available in the Summer lake game management area but each person will need a sleeping bag, an air mattress and warm clothing. Meals and lodging will be available at Summer lake lodge and the H and F motel at Silver Lake.

Three Assembly Points
Persons wanting to examine points of interest en route to Summer lake may assemble at 1 p.m. at the Bend-Portland truck terminal at Klamath Falls, the U. S. 97-Fremont highway junction at LaPine and the game commission office at Bend.

Program at Summer Lake Grange hall from 7:30 to 11 p.m. will include research findings, statements by livestock men and national forest and bureau of land management men and discussion. The tour will assemble at 8 a.m. Sunday at Silver Lake ranger station and load onto trucks for tour of the winter range. A discussion will take

place during the lunch stop. Some of the Klamath winter deer ranges will be inspected on Monday.

Portland—Oregon big game hunters can mark May 24 and June 7 on their calendars as important dates regarding the fall big game hunts. These are the dates scheduled in Portland by the game commission for the annual public hearing prior to setting the big game regulations for 1963.

Phil Schneider, state game director, advised the meeting will be held at the commission's headquarters, 1634 S.W. Alder st. Tentative regulations for the fall hunt will be established following the public hearing on May 24. The tentative rules will be published so that all interested persons will have an opportunity to check them over before the final rules are set.

Series of Meetings
Final regulations for the fall big game seasons will be set two weeks later on June 7. Any changes or modifications to the tentative rules will be made at this time following the public hearing.

Prior to the scheduled public hearing in Portland, the commission will hold a series of informal meetings in various districts of the state to give all interested persons a chance to voice their views on the fall hunts. Cities selected for the informal meetings are Enterprise and Baker in eastern Oregon, Bend in central Oregon, Klamath Falls in south central Oregon, and Medford, Coos Bay and Gold Beach in southwestern Oregon.

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
