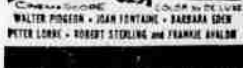

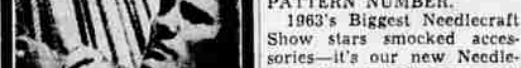

Portland Interests Score Rate Victory

Washington—(UPI)—A U.S. District Court here Wednesday upheld an Interstate Commerce Commission decision which favored the Portland-Vancouver area in a freight rate battle with Puget Sound interests.

The decision was a victory for the Portland Freight Traffic Association and other Portland interests in a hassle which has been in the courts since 1954.

Puget Sound freight interests had attempted to offset the Portland-Vancouver area's

natural geographic advantage in rates to Eastern Oregon and parts of Idaho. The court ruled that the ICC findings were "complete, sufficient and supported by substantial evidence."
