

# Medford Baseballers Travel To GP, Crater To Ashland

Weather permitting, again — A better outlook on Southern Oregon conference baseball prospects will be afforded this week end.

Defending champion Medford makes its 1963 league bow in one of two Saturday doublebills. The Black Tornado will vie at Grants Pass. Crater goes to Ashland. First game times are 1:30 p.m.

Klamath Falls has the bye in the circuit slate and has rivalry with Roseburg.

Rain washed out all but one session involving league teams last week end but one doubleheader has since been made up. Klamath Falls and Crater share league leadership with 2-0 records each.

Ashland and Grants Pass each are 0-2.

There has been feeling expressed in some quarters that the baseball chase could prove as tough and close as the one in basketball this year.

**Hitting Trouble**

Medford's Black Tornado goes into this week end's games bothered by hitting and some arm trouble.

"I hope our hitting comes along," said Coach John Kovenz. "We're a little feeble at bat." But, then he added, "I think the kids will start hitting better shortly."

Stuart Young and Jack Ford probably will get the starting pitcher assignments for the Black Tornado. Kovenz reported Young in good shape and remarked that Ford is coming along real well. Larry Sander has been troubled by elbow soreness and Bill Enyart by a sore shoulder. John Gates, another hurler, turned his ankle in the Yreka game on Wednesday and will miss Saturday play.

# USC Team Favored Over Oregon Ducks

Eugene — (UP) — Southern California's dethroned national champions are favored to gain revenge on Oregon in a dual track meet Saturday.

The Ducks beat USC 75-56 in Los Angeles last season and ended a string of 100 home dual meet victories for the Trojans. A USC victory here Saturday would ruin a streak of 36 home dual meet victories for Oregon. The Ducks haven't lost at home since Bill Bowerman took over as track coach in 1949.

Oregon went on to win the NCAA title last season, but graduation, injuries and bad weather have taken their toll.

Harry Jerome, one of the injured in the British Commonwealth Games last fall and will not run at all this season. Distance man Mike Lehner is out of action with mononucleosis and javelin thrower John Burns has a pulled chest muscle.

The weather could hurt the Trojans as much as it has bothered Oregon. The Ducks were rained out in the Far West Relays last week end and have held only one dual meet, that an unimpressive victory over California.

However, the forecast is for scattered showers Saturday. Even though the track is in good shape, the relatively cool Northwest weather could hold USC performances down.

Bowerman thinks Oregon will get anywhere from 48 to 67 points. It takes 72 1/2 to win.

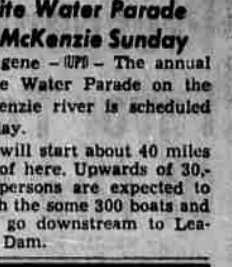

Both clubs will be honored tonight at the sixth annual Baseball Writers Dinner at the Palladium in Hollywood. The top players of the Angels and Dodgers will be saluted and presented trophies voted them by the Los Angeles chapter of the Baseball Writers Association.

With those preliminaries out of the way, the clubs take to the field Saturday in the first of the two games that have divided fans into two camps.

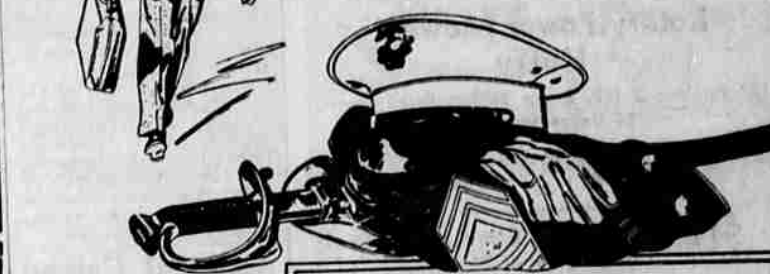
