

### Terry Towel Bunny Rabbit Easily Made, Useful Gift

Rubber bands a pretty piece of ribbon, two white terry towels and a quart bottle of aqua blue fabric softener are the inexpensive and handy ingredients which make a cheery little Bunny.

He's so easy to put together that a child might like to make several to present to his female relatives this Easter, a traditional time to make such little gifts. Of course, Bunny's also cute just sitting on a table anywhere!

For this novel decoration

the towels should be very soft and white and about 17 by 26 inches. Start with one towel, fold it in thirds and wrap it around the base of the fabric softener bottle, fastening it with a stout rubber band. Lay the wrapped bottle on the other towel about two inches from the end. Draw these bottom corners together around the bottle and fasten with a rubber band to make Bunny's tail.

Now at other end of flat towel, draw center down until corners take the form of ears. Twist rubber band around them in a figure eight to keep them in shape. Smooth rest of the towel around the bottle. Tie ribbon around the "waist" of the bottle for Bunny's neck. Set bottle upright and balance ears on bottle cap. Arrange towel folds to suggest face.

One of the nice things about this particular bunny is that his ingredients are useful after the holiday. Nobody ever has enough face towels and the aqua blue fabric softener will help keep them (and other things) soft, fluffy and new-looking through 32 launderings. However, be sure to use it only in a final clear rinse; fabric softeners are not effective in combination with soaps, bleaches or detergents.

## Princess Alexandra's Wedding Set April 24; Costs Cited

London—There is no father of the bride to pick up the \$30,000 or so tab for Princess Alexandra's Westminster Abbey wedding to wealthy and handsome Scots business man Angus Ogilvy April 24. The Princess's father, the Duke of Kent and brother of the late George VI, died in a wartime air crash.

But the 26-year-old "Princess Alex" has the right connections for the right kind of wedding and what tab there is will be picked up mostly by her cousin, Queen Elizabeth II. Some of the expenses will be absorbed simply as part of the bill for supporting the British royal establishment.

Because so much of the cost of a royal wedding such as the Queen is giving the tall and extremely popular Alexandra is hidden in the normal round of royal expenses, no exact figure can be given for what this one will come to.

Cost estimates are estimated fairly accurately what a similar wedding would cost a private citizen—if it were one who could afford it and wanted to give the daughter of the house a truly royal sendoff.

The cost in such circumstances would come to somewhere between 10,500 and 10,800 pounds or \$29,400 to \$30,240, give or take a thousand or two. Here's an itemization:

—Westminster Abbey and the Archbishop of Canterbury will come free (as would a church for a commoner) but an honorarium to the church is customary and on occasions such as this 100 pounds (\$280) would be normal, plus 50 pounds (\$140) to the organist, etc. Altar flowers would cost about 20 pounds or \$56.

5,000 Invitations

—Engraved invitations—5,000 are going out for the wedding or the two receptions (some lucky ones get all three)—would cost about 400 pounds or \$1,120.

—Receptions. Queen Elizabeth is giving the couple a pre-wedding reception April 22 at Windsor castle and 1,800 guests are expected. Allowing for champagne this would come to about four pounds per person (6,400 pounds or \$17,920). This will be paid for personally by the Queen. Then there will be a post-wedding buffet luncheon at St. James's Palace for 800 guests at about three pounds per person including champagne, or 2,400 pounds (\$6,720). The wedding cake would be a good 50 pounds (\$140) and flowers for the receptions would run about another 200 pounds or \$560.

—Transport. The Queen is loaning Alexandra the Irish state coach for the bride's and bridegroom's ride from the Abbey to the St. James's reception. Similar transportation, if a private party could hire such a coach, might be estimated at 60 pounds, including rental and tips to the coachman, or \$168. Cars for wedding attendants could be rented for about 20 pounds or \$56.

—Trousseau. A trousseau fit for a princess might be estimated conservatively at 1,000 pounds or \$2,800. To this add 200 pounds (\$560) for going-

away costume and accessories. The bridal coiffeur would run perhaps 30 pounds (\$84).

—Wedding gown. Alexandra's is being made by Couturier John Cavanagh. Such a gown by such a man would run something like 400 pounds (\$1,120) counting 50 pounds for the gown and 50 for veil and accessories.

That's the hard cash such a wedding would cost a doting father of the bride if he were to match Alexandra's wedding. It comes to \$31,724.

Although the queen is paying for most of the reception cost and providing through her grace and favor the Abbey, a couple of castles, horse guards and other accoutrements, Alexandra's mother

the Princess Marina will be billed for some of the expenses.

Some American millionaires have given their daughters weddings that cost more money than will Alexandra's—but they didn't have castles for their receptions, a royal coach for the bride to ride in, or the royal horse guards as bridal escorts.
