

# Jackson Opposes Plea for 'Have-Not' Highway Bonds

Salem - (UPI) - Pleas for up to \$37 million in highway bonds to finance construction of "have not" highways were voiced Tuesday before the House Highway Committee.

Opposition to the plan, which would be financed by a 1-cent increase in the gasoline tax, and a \$5 increase in license fees, was expressed by Highway Commission Chairman Glenn Jackson.

Coastal area residents and officials threw their support behind the program.

Rep. Edward Ridderbusch

(D-Tillamook) said there were about 37 miles of U.S. 101 in Tillamook county which require reconstruction. He termed the present roadway "deplorable."

Sen. Andrew Naterlin (D-Newport) said "we want the bonds because the Highway Commission hasn't the money to do the work now."

He said he favored both the gasoline tax hike and license fee increase.

Jackson reminded the committee that 92 per cent of the interstate highway construction cost is financed by federal funds.

He said the gasoline tax increase would return to the commission only \$4.2 million a year, and the license increase \$2.9 million.

He said "over \$80 million would be needed to rebuild U.S. 101, "an area of limited population. We must consider the state as a whole."

"Speedways are not needed in recreation areas," he added.

Ridderbusch asked Jackson how he explained the governor's stand in favor of bonds to build dormitories, but against bonds for highways.

Jackson smiled and replied: "That's a trap I don't propose to walk into."

Major goals of the bond issue's proponents are reconstruction of U.S. 101 in Tillamook county, and major improvements on Highway 20 between Corvallis and Newport.

# Balloting Device Demonstrated To Election Groups

Salem - (UPI) - A small, inexpensive device that could revolutionize balloting and vote counting procedures was demonstrated Tuesday to the House and Senate Election committees.

Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. termed the device a "distinct improvement over the present archaic system" of voting and ballot counting.

The machine was demonstrated by Dr. Joseph P. Harris, professor of political science at the University of California.

Legislation Pending

He explained it had been shown to the legislatures in California and Wisconsin, and that legislation is now pending in California to authorize its use.

The device, about 15 inches square and 1 inch thick, weighs about five pounds.

It serves as a rack to hold a printed ballot which is affixed to the machine, and into which is inserted a data processing machine punch card.

Voters, instead of marking an "X" on a ballot, use a stylus to punch holes in the data card.

Counted Fast

The cards then are fed through a standard data processing machine where the votes are counted and tabulated in a few minutes.

Harris, a recognized authority in the elections field, said a voting machine should have these qualifications:

"Be easy to use, foolproof, inexpensive, and secure from tampering."

He said the machine he was demonstrating had all of these features.

Production of the devices is expected to start later this year. He said the cost would be \$50 or less a machine.

Appling said the punch cards used by the machine would be less expensive than the printed ballots now used.

# Wheeling Steel Turnover Heavy In Mixed Market

New York - (UPI) - Steels were strong in an otherwise narrowly mixed stock market today.

Wheeling Steel rose roughly 1 1/2 points on heavy turnover in the wake of its decision to boost some steel prices an average of \$6 a ton.

U.S. Steel rose over a point to a new 1963 high and Bethlehem gained a large fraction. Virtually every other steel issue on the board gained.

The major blue chip groups showed autos narrowly mixed along with chemicals and international oils. Rails firmed, led by New York Central, and utilities managed a minor gain in their average.

Vern Ayers, manager of the Oregon Coast Association, said the coast economy depended upon improved roadways.

He reminded that bond issue moneys were used for the Gold Beach-Brookings project, and the Astoria bridge.

He said so much money was being diverted to the interstate system there was not enough left over for "have not" highway areas.

"We do not feel that a commission of three men, no matter how fair they may be, can judiciously spend the state's road user tax for the greatest good of the entire state," Ayers said.

The committee took no action.

# Revised Street Map Costs Are Noted

Revised street maps for nine Oregon cities now available through the Oregon state highway department are 25 cents per map sheet for large reproductions and 10 cents per map sheet for the small reproductions.

The state highway department noted that six sheets are required for the complete map of Medford. The large reproductions of the Medford maps cost \$1.50 and the small reproduction costs 60 cents.

Other city maps available are Antelope, Dufur, Grass Valley, Shaniko, Wasco, Winston and Yoncalla, all of which are on one sheet, and Sutherlin, which requires two sheets.

The maps are available from the traffic engineering division, state highway building, Salem 10, Ore. Checks for the maps should be made payable to the Oregon state highway department.

# Local Man Pleads Guilty in Court

# U.S., SEATO Allies Make Pledge To Continue Fight Against Communism

Paris - (UPI) - The United States and its Southeast Asia Treaty Organization allies pledged themselves today to continue fighting Communist subversion throughout the vital strategic area.

In a communique winding up a three-day SEATO council session, they reiterated their support for a "neutral and independent Laos under a government of national union."

They noted that the government of embattled South Vietnam has succeeded in checking the Communist Viet Cong rebellion.

They voiced the hope that Viet Nam will progress further towards "internal stability and national security."

In Laos, where neutralist troops have suffered sharp reverses in renewed fighting with Communist Pathet Lao forces, the communique said the council reiterated its support "for the cause of a neutral and independent Laos under a government of national union."

It expressed the hope that

"these who have the responsibility in Laos and also the signatories of the Geneva accords will succeed in insuring the maintenance of peace, neutrality and national unity which the people of Laos so earnestly desire."

**Reedsport Man Named Masons Grand Master**

Eugene - (UPI) - Herman Husen of Reedsport was chosen grand master of the Royal and Select Masters of the York Rite of Masonry of Oregon Tuesday.

Husen, who succeeds Theodore Roake of Salem, was named at the organization's annual meeting attended by about 175 delegates. Bend was chosen as the site of the meeting next year.
