What Is Poison to a Human May Be Garden Slug's Food
 We had always felt reasonably sure of our identification ability. What we were looking at were certainly healthy specimens of the "death's cap" mushroom, a fungi containing a very virulent poison. A small piece of the mushroom, cooked and eaten, can cause death.

Yet, there were several garden slugs eating the plants with apparent relish. They were the same variety of slugs that often give the home gardener a bad time by nibbling on his favorite plants.
 To be sure of our identification we checked over all our knowledge we had acquired about Amanita verna, the so-called "destroying angel" or "death's cap" mushroom. Next to the death's cap was another bad actor, just as poisonous—the "panther agaric" commonly called the "fly mushroom."
 Point by point we surveyed the features of both. They stood up from the forest floor about six inches; each had a spherical base, roughly set in the familiar "death cap" which was, in several specimens, just above the surface of the ground.
Pale White
 The color was a pale white; the gills were white and free from the stem. Some had pale greenish-yellow caps. By every identifying trade mark we could apply to them, they were destroying angels.
 We turned our attention to the other variety growing in this same environment, the "fly mushrooms" or Amanita muscaria. The caps on some of these were all of six inches across, of a reddish-orange color and sprinkled with reddish bumps or warts. The stem is bulbous and decorated with untidy rings. This mushroom, one of the largest in any woodland, is deadly poisonous. Yet on these, too, the garden slugs were busily feasting.

To a human, eating even a small piece of either of these mushrooms can cause illness or even death. It hardly seemed possible that lowly garden slugs could eat this material with impunity. Perhaps the poor dopes were hungry and their instinct had failed them, and they were committing suicide.
 So, we carefully gathered half a dozen of them, along with the mushrooms they were eating, and carried them home. We watched them carefully for several days, expecting them to die every minute. But they didn't; they lived and appeared as healthy as any slug in any garden. Evidently, what is poison to humans is food for slugs.

Many people have eaten poisonous mushrooms and have died. These mushrooms are dangerous because the victim gives no indication of poisoning until it is too late to give first aid.
 If you like the taste of mushrooms (and what they do for steak is of course, "out of this world,") you would do well to purchase them from the grocery store, or be very sure of your mushroom identification. And even when you are sure, it's best to be exceedingly critical and cautious, for the Amanita genus of mushrooms were aptly named—destroying angels or death's cap, if you like that name better.
