New Ocean Research Vessel Will Replace Present 'Acona'

Corvallis - An ocean research vessel five times the size of the present "Acona" is on the way for the Oregon State university department of oceanography.

An aircraft maintenance and supply ship which has been in "moth balls" in the West Coast Army Ship Depot at Rio Vista, Calif., has been allocated to OSU for conversion into an ocean research vessel.

The ship will be towed to Portland in the near future to await final approval of a request made to National Science Foundation for funds to equip the vessel for ocean studies, according to Dr. Wayne V. Burt, head of the oceanography department.

Cost of Conversion
Conversion will cost about \$600,000 with a good share of the money going into such things as winches, cranes, and electronic navigating gear needed in ocean studies, Burt said. It is hoped the conversion will be accomplished within a year.

The 20-year-old ship cost \$1,200,000 to build and is still in excellent condition, Burt noted. Its release from surplus was speeded by the efforts of Mrs. Edith Green, Oregon Congressional representative.

The vessel will be named "Yaquina" when it is ready for commissioning, Burt announced. It will be docked at

Newport-on Yaquina Bay and with it, OSU will be able to further expand its already broad ocean research program, he added.

OSU's present research vessel, the Acona, then will go to the University of Alaska. The Acona was built in 1961 with a grant from the Office of Naval Research, and equipment funds from the National Science Foundation. Total cost was \$300,000.

Larger Displacement
The Yaquina is 180 feet long with a displacement of 750 tons, five times the 150-ton displacement of the 80-foot-long Acona. The Yaquina will have a crew of 16-18 and space for 20 scientists; the Acona, seven crew members and eight scientists. The Yaquina will have a winch capacity of 33,000 feet, which would allow probes into deep water of the ocean; the Acona winches will go down 18,000 feet.

Allocation of the bigger ship to OSU is in keeping with the rapid growth of ocean studies at Oregon State university, it

was pointed out. OSU now has one of the five largest graduate programs in oceanography in the nation.

Research projects under way with the research vessel include inventories of plant and animal life; currents off Oregon and how they change; temperature, oxygen content, and salinity of the water; bottom sediments and the ocean floor; pollution problems in coastal estuaries; and defense-type research on underwater factors affecting submarine operations.

Receive Larger Vessel
Oregon State is scheduled to receive a still larger ocean research vessel in 1968 under the long-range national program of the Office of Naval Research. It is expected to be a \$4,000,000 vessel that would

rank among the largest and best equipped in the country and world, Burt stated.

A new \$959,590 OSU Marine Sciences Laboratory will be started later this year on Yaquina Bay as the center for coastal work in fisheries, water resources and oceanography. The Yaquina will be docked there once the vessel and the Laboratory are built. Work now under way by OSU represents the first intensive research ever done on the ocean off Oregon. It is part of a giant 10-year national program of ocean research launched in 1959. OSU was one of 10 universities picked to carry out the studies. The 10 schools are spaced up and down the East and West Coasts and along the Gulf of Mexico.

Loaded Log Truck Goes Off Highway

A loaded logging truck went over a 10-foot bank of the Crater lake highway yesterday between Trail and Prospect, state police reported.

The driver, Floyd Clifford Evernden, route 2, box 764E, Central Point, was apparently unharmed.

The chain holding the front "cheese blocks" broke and caused the front of the log load to drop to the highway. The truck went out of control, crossed the highway and went over the bank.

State police are investigating a hit and run accident in which a three-weeks old Black Angus heifer calf was killed.

Easter Peace Walk Planned by Local UN Organization

The Jackson county chapter of the Oregon United Nations association, in cooperation with several national groups, is planning an Easter Peace Walk in conjunction with the observance of the holiday.

The chapter has made available petitions supporting President Kennedy's call for a nuclear test ban and is asking every individual who agrees with this appeal to bring the signed petition to the Medford park east of the library and post it in a special mail box.

It is hoped that thousands of petitions can be forwarded at one time to the President, local chapter members emphasized.

Signatures of Everyone
The signatures of every member of the family along with neighbors and friends can make this declaration count, spokesmen declared. The President and Congress need this support, they noted. To join the Easter Peace Walk, residents are asked to bring their petitions, signed, and walk with families and

friends from church or other engagements to the library park.

Anyone unable to join the Easter Parade may mail the petition directly to the President. Additional forms will be available at many of the local churches in the valley.

An Easter appeal in the form of a petition to the President of the United States appears today in the Mail Tribune.

"To bring peace and order in our chaotic world we must focus the concern and interest of all peace loving citizens on this important task. Signing a petition is one opportunity to help our leaders pursue and achieve the steps toward peace." Omar Bacon, vice president of the Jackson county chapter of the Oregon United Nations association, stated in endorsing the appeal.

VA Domiciliary Employees Receive Service Recognition

White City-More than 40 Veterans Administration domiciliary employees at White City were given recognition recently for having rendered from 10 to 35 years of federal service, and for suggestions they had submitted for the improvement of the domiciliary operation and the federal service.

A special program was conducted and awards, consisting of service pins for years of federal service, cash awards for suggestions submitted and other types of non-monetary recognition, were presented.

According to Jack Stewart, personnel officer, the employee presented an award for the most federal service, 35 years, was John Strebinger, food service worker, in the dietetic service. Strebinger has been with the domiciliary since Jan. 7, 1949. Prior to that time he served with the United States Navy.

Has 30 Years Service
Thomas J. Andrews, chief, radiology service, was next with 30 years of federal service, all with the Veterans Administration.
