

# Grants Pass, Bend Capture Diadems In Metro, Class A Hayward Relays

University of Oregon, Eugene — Favored defending champion South Salem was dethroned here yesterday afternoon when the Grants Pass High Cavemen and the Bend Lava Bears garnered the championships in the 27th annual Hayward track and field relays.

Grants Pass, reportedly hampered by injuries, sounded a warning to mid and late season rivals by taking the metropolitan division banner. But, the Cavemen had to fight off the bid of hometown North Eugene to claim top prize. The southern Oregon power totaled 48 points, North Eugene had 47 1/2.

South Salem, the 1962 crown-holder, was third with 43 1/2. Medford and North Salem followed, each with 34 1/2.

Bend won the Class A honors by nine points over seven-

times-in-a-row victor Cottage Grove. The Bears had 55 points and the Lions 46. Pendleton took third with 36 and Crater fourth with 32 1/2.

One record fell in the metro class when South Salem bettered its last year's two-mile mark by one-tenth of a second. The new time is 8:03.8. Cottage Grove's Jim Henningsgaard set a new mark of 12 feet, 8 inches in the Class A pole vault, and Bend established a new mile relay time of 3:32.5.

Grants Pass had firsts in the high jump relay and ties for first in the 440 relay and pole vault, second in the mile relay, thirds in the javelin and shuttle hurdles, fourths in the 880 and two-mile relays and fifth in the shot put relay.

Bend had firsts in the mile, two-mile and shuttle hurdles, second in the 880 and shot

put, third in the broad jump, fourth in the distance medley, fifth in the 440 and sixth in the javelin.

Medford had two ties for first. Lloyd Hammons went 12 feet 8 inches in the pole vault to set a new school mark and knot with Gary Van Koten, Grants Pass. Medford and South Salem had like times of 36.0 in the shuttle hurdles.

The Black Tornado of Medford took a second in the two-mile, a fourth in the distance medley and a fifth in

the 880. It was sixth in the shot put with 134 1/4 and second in the broad jump with 59-11 1/4. Tim Murray of Medford heaved the discus 134-4 for third and Don Driskell was fifth in the high hurdles for the Wind.

Crater's team of Paul Bransom, Mike Mowry, Denny Ryerson and Gary Wald won the 440 Class A relay. Crater got a second in the broad jump at 57-1, fourths in the 880 and mile, a tie for third in the high jump, and a fifth in the shot put at 132-2 1/4 and a tie fifth in the shuttle hurdles. John Harris had a second place discus heave of 141-7.

Tom Huff won the javelin for Ashland with 185-10 1/4. The Grizzlies copped sixths in the 880 and two-mile.

## Pointer 8th Tops South In Track

Central Point — Central Point eighth grade whipped South Grants Pass 83-31 Thursday in a track meet here.

South won the seventh grade tussle 67 to 10.

Terry Pierce paced the Pointer eighth with victories in the 150 and 330-yard runs and the broad jump. Glenn Gueringer won the pole vault and 660, while Joe Cavin took the shot put and javelin.

Grants Pass' Beckwith won the low hurdles and 75.

South won all firsts in the seventh grade competition.

### Medford Defeats Ashland Twice; Crater, KF Split

Medford high bolstered its league leadership Saturday by taking two Southern Oregon conference baseball games from Ashland, while Crater and Klamath Falls were splitting.

The Black Tornado of Medford blanked Ashland 8 to 0 in the opener at Ashland and had to come from behind and go an extra inning to win 6 to 4 in the second.

Klamath Falls scored a pair of runs in the fourth extra frame, the 11th, to beat Crater 6 to 4. Crater rallied from a 0-3 deficit in the concluding 9 to 4.

Medford is now 6-0 in the league and the only unbeaten team. Klamath Falls is 3-1, Crater 4-4, Ashland 1-3 and Grants Pass 0-4.

The Pelicans used singles by Gary Smith and Bud Bath in the top of the 11th for two runs which broke a 4-all tie with Crater. There was a walk, a groundout, a sacrifice by Lanny Guyer and a stolen base in the panel.

Klamath pitchers Gary Benson and Rich Jackson fanned 18 and walked five in the contest. Crater's Larry Pepper whiffed 10 and free-passed three. Mike Kitching had three hits and Rick Horn two for the Pelicans and Pat Pepper two hits, one a double for Crater.

Crater got three runs in the fifth inning on a single by Pat Pepper, two walks, an error, a steal and a groundout. KF went on top again in the sixth but Crater got two runs in the bottom of the stanza on a triple by Mike Glines, singles by Neil Rivenburg and Lou Alvarez, Larry Mason's sacrifice and a groundout.

Alvarez had two hits in the game. Crater pitchers Wayne Clay and Mason struck out five and walked four while Benson and Jackson recorded four fans and one base on balls.

Bill Enyart pitched fourth ball for Medford in the Ashland starter. He issued only one base on balls while striking out seven. Medford got eight hits off Ashland's John Rhodes and Dane Smith who gave up seven walks while fanning the same number.

Gary Miller tripled for Medford. He and Mike Barnes each had two hits.

Medford went into the seventh inning trailing 3 to 4. But Stuart Young singled and Dick Deffley tripled him home to tie the game. Deffley was out at the plate trying to make his hit a homer.

In the eighth for two runs the Tornado had singles by Mike Neathamer, Darryl Stockten and Herb Vallee and steals by Neathamer and Edmonds, running for Stockton. Deffley, Ken Phipps and Vallee each had two hits for Medford. Rick Pierce hit safely three times for the Grizzlies and Dean Samuelson twice. Four Medford pitchers gave a total of three free trips to the bases and fanned 11. John Barger went the distance on the hill for Ashland, allowing one base on balls while striking out 4.

## Sanders Ups Lead

Greenboro, N. C. — (UPI) — Handsome Doug Sanders, playing brilliant golf through a afternoon thundershowers and dropping temperatures, fired four consecutive birdies for a 68 Saturday to increase his lead in the third round of the \$35,000 greater Greensboro open to five strikes.

Sanders, who carried a three-stroke lead into the third round, parred the first five holes and then birdied the sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth holes to go four under par with a 32 on the front nine of the par-71, 7,017-yard Sedgefield Country Club course.

The 29-year-old Ojai, Calif., pro had two bogies for a one over par 36 on the backside and a three-round total of 201.

Five strokes back at 206 after 54 holes of the 72-hole tournament which ends Sunday were Kel Nagle and Jimmy Clark. Nagle carried a two under par 34-35—69 on five birdies and three bogies while Clark, 41, was three under for the day with a 68.
