Art Exhibits Planned For Annual Tea

Eighteenth century bronze works of art, copper handcraft, modern sculptures and wood carvings, old miniature looms, modern paintings from Medford and the West Coast and old paintings from Germany, theater and concert posters, programs, photographs and scrapbooks will be a part of the potpourri of art objects collected to interest guests at the coming annual cancer tea. It will be held at Hillcrest house on Wednesday, April 17. The theme of the tea this year is "The World of Art".

Mrs. Nell Davidson will display her collection of bronze figures dating from the early 18th century. These works of art were made by French, German and Italian artists. The smaller pieces are suitable for display in the home, but the larger figures are shown to best advantage in a garden setting. Mrs. Davidson will also exhibit a modern German bronze figure for contrast.

Mrs. Eric W. Allen Jr., will loan some of her modern sculptures, and William Fontaine will display his wood carvings.

Alexander Diepenbroek will exhibit several miniature icons which are very old. He will design the setting for the icons, and for an old German painting, which will be shown by the courtesy of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Anton Prack. The painting was in the collection of the Boisseree brothers in the Rhineland in the early 18th century, but it has been in the possession of Mrs. Prack's family for generations. It depicts famous historical personages of the 10th century, and is known to be very old.

Other private collections will be shown, in addition to paintings exhibited by the Rogue Valley Art association, the Southern Oregon Society of Artists, and the Senior Cit-

izens, who will also display handcraft. Flower arrangements will be entered in the annual contest, which is decided by popular vote. Valley clubs and organizations are cooperating with the contest, and entries are still being accepted.

Flowers to decorate the rooms of Hillcrest house are being donated by Mrs. William Clark, Mrs. John Holmer, Mrs. L. G. Gentner and Mrs. Hanley Heffernan.

Mrs. Dorothy Ginn will ar-

range the centerpiece for the tea table, which will be decorated in gold and white. Tea refreshments are provided each year by Mrs. Ida Wharton and by members of the Hillcrest tea committee, who sponsor the annual silver tea for the benefit of the American Cancer society.

The public is invited to attend the tea, which will be held from 2 to 4:30 in the afternoon on Wednesday, April 17, at Hillcrest house in Hillcrest Orchards.

For her wedding the bride chose a light blue linen suit with white and green accessories. Her corsage was a white orchid.

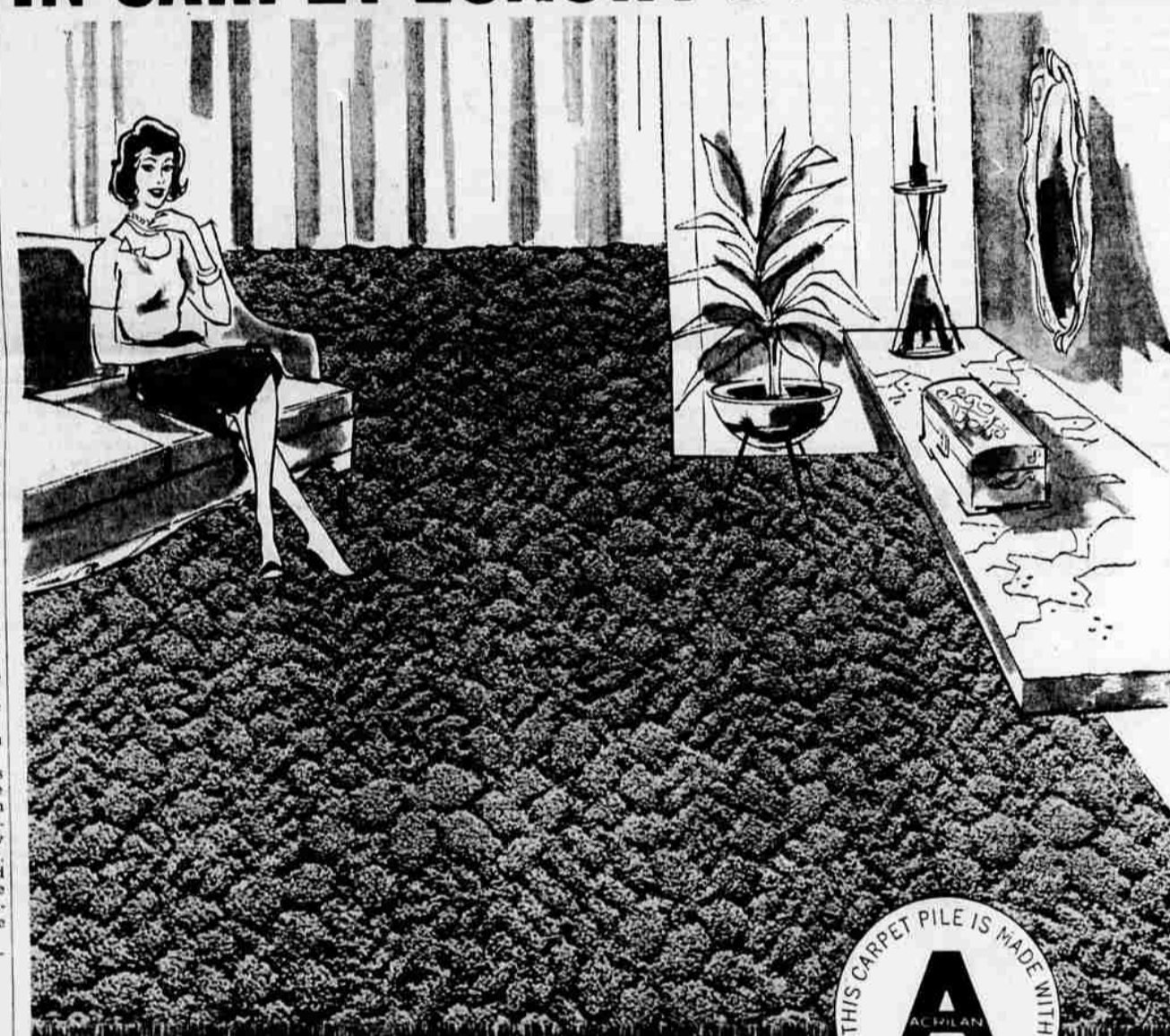
