Influenza Cases Continue Increase

Influenza cases continued on the increase during the past week with the Jackson county public health department reporting 27.

Twenty-three cases were reported from Medford and two each from Jacksonville and Ashland.

Sixteen measles cases were reported, nine in Medford and seven in Central Point. Ashland reported 10 cases of German measles and Medford and Applegate one each.

Medford reported four mumps cases, Prospect one and Central Point seven.

Other communicable diseases were two cases of pneumonia in Medford and one in Ashland; four impetigo cases in Rogue River; one infectious hepatitis case in Medford, one chicken pox case in Rogue River and two gonorrhoea cases.

Peterson will have an opportunity to become acquainted with development of a new area and a new climatic situation, Yeager noted. He entered the National Park Service in 1952 after graduation from the University of Puget Sound, majoring in sociology.
