

BIG D PUTS ON ONE MAN SHOW

You've only to look at Don Demeter's 474 batting average to understand why Manager Gene Mauch of the Philadelphia Phillies calls him "Big D."

Big D is a sort of Jack of all trades with the Phillies but fortunately no matter where he plays he's become a master of the bat. And he's the most important reason why the Phillies were the hottest team in the National League over the second half of the 1962 season and today are in a three-way tie for first place with the San Francisco Giants and Pittsburgh Pirates.

Demeter owes his development as a hitter directly to Mauch. Don used to be a free swinger who tried to pull every pitch. On Mauch's advice, he started to "hit with the pitch" last year and he wound up the season with a .307 average, 29 homers and 107 runs batted in.

Stages One-Man Show

Demeter staged virtually a one-man show in St. Louis Sunday when he collected six hits in nine at-bats and drove in three runs as the Phillies downed the Cardinals, 4-3 in 10 innings, and 5-4. Chief beneficiary of Demeter's blasting was relief ace Jack Baldschun, who received credit for both victories although he worked a total of only 2½ innings.

The Chicago Cubs snapped the San Francisco Giants' four-game winning streak, 3-1, the Pittsburgh Pirates shaded the Cincinnati Reds, 1-0, the Houston Astros defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers, 5-4, and the Milwaukee Braves topped the New York Mets, 1-0, in 10 innings in other NL games.

In the American league, the

New York Yankees beat the Baltimore Orioles, 5-1, the Cleveland Indians scored a 6-0 victory over the Detroit Tigers, the Washington Senators edged out the Boston Red Sox, 7-6, and the Kansas City Athletics beat the Minnesota Twins, 5-4.

Plays Three Positions

Demeter singled the winning run to third base in the 10th inning of Sunday's first game. Then he homered in the eighth inning to tie the nightcap and singled home the decisive run in the ninth. During the afternoon he also played first base, left field and center field.

Ron Santo scored one run on a double by Ernie Banks and drove in another with a solo homer to help the Cubs' Larry Jackson gain his first win of the season. Willie McCovey doubled home the only run for the Giants, who had won their first four games.

Al McBean yielded 10 hits but struck out five and walked only one in outpitching his second straight decision. A walk to Bob Skinner and singles by Smokey Burgess, Donn Clendenon and Bill Virdon produced the game's only run in the fourth inning.

Colts Kayo Koufax The Colts kayoed strikeout King Sandy Koufax in 5½ innings and then hung on for the victory with Don McMahon shutting out the Dodgers on one hit for the last 1½ innings. Pete Runnels and Howie Gosch had two hits each for the Colts and Frank Howard and Dick Tracewski had three each for the Dodgers.

Bob Hendley pitched a four-hitter against the Mets and finally won out in the 10th when the Braves scored on a walk to Lee Maye, Hendley's sacrifice and a single by Ty

Cline. Roger Craig, a 24-game loser in 1962, allowed only seven hits but suffered his second straight loss.

The Hawaii Islanders have established a new season's record in the Pacific Coast league—and they haven't even been to bat yet.

The Islanders and the visiting Salt Lake City Bees have watched restlessly while their first three scheduled games were washed out by tropical downpours. Hawaii had only one game postponed by rain during its first two seasons in the PCL.

But the other eight teams in the wide-spread loop are swinging for the fences.

The Oklahoma City 89ers hammered out five homers Sunday to defeat Seattle, 9-5, and take over the lead in the Southern Division with two victories and no defeats.

Dallas-Ft. Worth and Portland split a doubleheader, with the Rangers taking the afternoon contest, 5-4, and the Beavers winning the night game, 9-5.

Spokane, Denver Divide In another twinbill, Spokane edged Denver, 1-0, in the opener and lost to the Bears, 4-1, in the nightcap.

Tacoma defeated San Diego, but the nightcap was postponed because of wet grounds.

The rained-out Hawaii-Salt Lake doubleheader was scheduled for today. Other games on the schedule include Spokane at San Diego, Seattle at Oklahoma City, and Portland at Dallas.

Portland jumped out to a four-run lead in both of its games at Dallas, but had to struggle to earn a split. The Rangers rallied for five runs to take the opener and tied the nightcap with Ray Jablon's homer in the eighth. But the Beavers bounced back with five runs in the top of the ninth to ice the contest.

Tornadoes Establish Two Marks

Medford high trackmen established school records in two events Saturday while contending in the muddy Hayward relays at Eugene.

The Black Tornado team of Frank and Steve Toews, Jim Snodgrass and Dennis Brumback ran the two-mile relay in 8:08.5 in taking second place. In the distance medley Greg Swanson, Snodgrass, Doug Aiken and Brumback teamed for 10:52.8 in gaining fourth.

Lloyd Hammons' 12-foot, eight-inch pole vault to tie for first in the relays was not quite a school record as indicated in a Sunday story. The Medford high mark is 12-9 set in 1956 by Lew Breazeale.

However, Coach Dean Benson told the Medford Linebackers on Friday that the vault record "should go" this year. On his Saturday effort, Hammons appears a good bet to break it. He tied with Gary Van Koten, Grants Pass, in the Haywards. Hammons had fewer misses.

Of the Tornado track team in general Coach Benson said, "I was real pleased with the kids. They did a real fine job up there. They improved on just about everything." Roy Shaw, Don Driskell and Dave Durant were members of the shuttle hurdles crew which tied with South Salem for first.

Half-mile times for Medford runners in the two-mile relay were Brumback 1:58, Steve Toews 2:00.7, Snodgrass 2:01.2 and Frank Toews 2:08.6. In the distance medley Swanson had a 3:19 three-quarter-mile, Snodgrass a 52.6 quarter, Aiken a 2:08.2 half and Brumback a 4:33 mile.

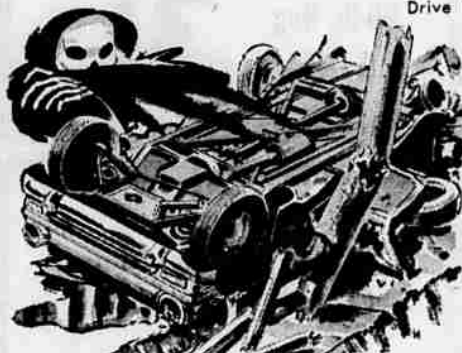
OSU Trips Chieftains
