Giants Return To Candlestick; Get Welcoming Parade

San Francisco (UPI)—The San Francisco Giants today returned to windy Candlestick park—the place where they won the National League flag.

Last year, the Giants completed a spectacular 61-21 mark in the much discussed ballpark and a full house of 40,000-plus was certain to show up for today's home opener against Houston, unless rain washed out the proceedings.

Manager Al Dark held out the brilliant southpaw, Billy Pierce, all last week to enable him to pitch the home opener. Last year Pierce was 12-0 during the season at Candlestick Park and won number 13 against the New York Yanks in the World Series, Houston named Bob Bruce as its starter.

The Giants were 4-1 on the road last week and moved into a tie for first in the crowded National League chase, but Dark is not happy with his troops' performance to date.

The Giants' power boys have been carrying the team with Felipe Alou, Orlando Cepeda and Willie McCovey all hitting .400 or better. Willie Mays is hitting only .222 but has hit two homers and scored six runs.

What has distressed Dark has been the collapse of his infield both in the field and

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Beavers Score Three In 11th, Still Lose To Dallas-Ft. Worth

Portland scored three runs in the top of the 11th and still managed to lose at Dallas in the wildest game yet of the new Pacific Coast League campaign.

The game took 5 hours and 20 minutes and did not end until early today, but it goes into the book as a mere 4 hours 30 minutes long. Fifty minutes of delay occurred when half the lights at Burnet Field went out.

The lights went out for Portland in the bottom of the 12th when Dallas loaded the

bases on a walk and two singles and Ron Henry singled home the winning tally.

The regular contest ended 7-7 after nine innings and the Beavers seemed to wrap things up with three in the 11th. But old pro Ray Jablonsky's homer sparked a three-run Ranger burst in the 11th.

Bruce Swango, a busy reliever who seems to figure in just about every Dallas-Ft. Worth decision, got the win, while Bill Kirtk took the loss.

Jay Ward of the Rangers crashed a pair of homers and Portland's Bill Kern also lost one in a wild battle that saw a dozen pitchers touched for 33 hits.

In other action Monday night, San Diego nudged Spokane 3-2 in 13 innings. Seattle slid by Oklahoma City 6-3, and Salt Lake was again washed out at stormy Honolulu.

Deron Johnson did most of the damage for San Diego. He followed Art Shamsky's triple with a single in the 13th after having delivered a big single during the Padres' two-run rally in the seventh.

The former USC athletic ace John Werhas drove in both the loser's runs.

Dick Luebke, third Padre hurler, picked up the win after a nice relief job.

Seattle broke a 5-5 tie at Oklahoma City with a run in the top of the ninth. Archie Skeen led off with a double, took third on a sacrifice play and then went home on a long drive by Rac Slider.

Dave Roberts and John Weekly homered for the losers, who absorbed their first defeat after two wins.

Former big leaguers George Spencer of Seattle and Gordon Jones of the 89ers picked up the decisions to both emerge with 1-1 marks.

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Web Ewbank Takes Over As Boss of NY Jets, Talks About Rebuilding

New York - (UPI) - Bustling Web Ewbank, new boss of the New York Jets (neo Titans), today began a search for another Johnny Unitas to help him beat the five-year championship timetable he once wrote for the Baltimore Colts.

The odds are strictly against Ewbank, of course, but he feels that with a few "sleepers" like Unitas, can "start a new era in the American Football league.

And who can blame Web for hoping?
The 55-year-old Ewbank, dismissed by the Colts at the close of the last National Football league season, Monday signed a three-year contract calling for an estimated \$100,000 to serve as coach, general manager and vice president of New York's AFL entry.

At the same time, Dave (Sonny) Werblin, new president of the club, announced that the nickname would be changed to Jets, rhyming with Mets. The Mets and Jets jointly will occupy the new stadium now under construction on Long Island.

Ewbank readily admitted that the Jets' biggest problem is players. The old regime headed by tempestuous Harry Wismer did not sign a single member of last season's college crop.

"But this club is not any worse than the Colts when I took them over in 1954," Ewbank insisted. "Talk about a challenge. Well, this is no tougher than a lot of others I've faced."

"I've seen sicker cows than this one get well," he gaged in an allusion to his Hoosier farm-boy upbringing.

The pudgy Ewbank said that in his efforts to rebuild the Jets, for this year at least he would have to rely heavily on free agents, rejects, from other pro clubs, fugitives from Canadian football and other sleeper-type players.



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
