

Cal Fraternities To Drop Clauses

Berkeley, Calif. — All fraternities and sororities at the University of California, the nation's largest university, were ordered Tuesday to drop their discrimination clauses by Sept. 1, 1964.

President Clark Kerr said the fraternal groups will not be permitted to practice discrimination because of race, religion or national origin af-

ter the date specified. He noted that an anti-discrimination policy originally was adopted by the UC Board of Regents in 1959.

Many of the chapters of the seven UC campuses are affiliated with national organizations with charter clauses banning various minority groups.

Manslaughter Charged

Moro, Ore. — Dolphus Baker, 53, Rufus, was taken into custody Tuesday by Sherman County Sheriff Leo Roberts on a manslaughter charge in connection with the gunshot death last week of Edward R. Bisig, 31.

Bisig was shot last Tuesday in front of Baker's garage and died in a hospital Friday. Baker claimed self defense. Bail was set at \$2,500.

Russian Trawlers Near JFK's Home

Palm Beach, Fla. — Two Russian trawlers loaded with electronic equipment cruised within sight of President Kennedy's ocean-front vacation home Tuesday.

The Coast Guard sent patrol boats to watch the Soviet ships but reported the trawlers were in international waters and no attempt was made to stop them.

The boy's mother, Mrs. Ralph Fulbright, was shot and killed by a rifle in her home here March 20. Authorities said the boy admitted holding the rifle but said he only wanted to frighten his mother.

Park, Recreation Bond Issue Urged By Gov. Brown

Sacramento — Gov. Edmund G. Brown, determined to save California's nat-

ural resources from exploitation, has proposed a new \$150 million park and recreation bond issue.

It would go on the November 1964 ballot.

In a special message, Brown blamed defeat of a similar bond issue in June 1962 —

1,886,915 to 1,693,703 — on an overloaded bond ballot.

"The shock waves of California's population boom have already affected all our recreational resources," the governor said.

"Just in the last decade 27 million people swarmed into our beaches and parks, a gain of 359 per cent. Yet we increased our beach and park acreage only by 19 per cent."

As a stopgap, the governor asked the lawmakers to approve augmentation of his fiscal 1963-64 budget by \$19.1 million.

This money would be used in 21 specific areas to acquire beach and park property. It particularly would pay attention to needs of population centers.

Brown said the price of land in California is increasing at a rate of 10 per cent a year and urged the state to begin acquiring land before it is "gobbled up by private developers."

Proposal includes grants Under the \$150 million bond proposal, \$40 million would be set aside for state grants to local governments he called this "an essential means of developing regional parks for the use of Californians close to home."

In other action the governor said he had received "firm assurance that significant action will be taken at this session to combat California's rising traffic toll." He made the statement after a special meeting with his legislative leaders.

Assemblyman Charles B. Garrigus (D-Reedley) introduced a bill to allow a 1 per cent sales tax on food to raise money for school support. He made no estimate of the amount of money his plan would raise.

Jackie Cruises With President

Palm Beach, Fla. — Jacqueline Kennedy beamed happily Tuesday in her first appearance outside the vacation White House since the announcement she was expecting a third child in August.

She waved and smiled at dockside spectators after returning from a cruise with the President and guests aboard the presidential yacht Honey Fitz.

She sat near her husband at the stern of the 92-foot yacht. Five-year-old Caroline, dressed in a bathing suit and tee shirt, accompanied her parents on the two-hour cruise in the inland waterway.

Mrs. Kennedy has canceled all official functions because of her condition and other government wives will substitute for her as official hostess at formal White House affairs.

Limited Emergency Set in Argentina

Buenos Aires — The army announced today it has proclaimed a limited emergency in Argentina, placing all of the nation's police forces under military control.

An army communique said garrisons throughout the country have been informed that a state of "internal commotion" exists, justifying the use of emergency powers granted to the army last fall.
